Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 0 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

METEOROLOGY OF NOVEMBER  
Local Office U. S. Weather Bureau.  
The following data, covering a period of 29 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month November for 29 years.  
TEMPERATURE (1890-1904).  
Mean or normal temperature, 74°  
The warmest month was that of 1896 with an average of 76°  
The coldest month was that of 1893 with an average of 73°  
The highest temperature was 86° on 14th and 23rd of 1891 21st of 1896.  
The lowest temperature was 59° on 20th of 1892; 17th of 1895; 24th of 1897; 25th and 26th of 1902.

PRECIPITATION (rain, 1877-1894 and 1904).  
Average for the month, 4.58 inches.  
Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 13.  
The greatest monthly precipitation was 15.40 inches in 1887.  
The least monthly precipitation was 0.54 inches in 1891.  
The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 5.22 inches on November 30, 1880.

Average number of clear days, 10; partly cloudy days, 14; cloudy days, 6.

# MEDICAL SESSION IS AT AN END

HAWAIIAN ASSOCIATION CLOSED ITS PROCEEDINGS WITH A BANQUET LAST EVENING.

The annual convention of the Hawaiian Territorial Medical Association was concluded last evening with a banquet at the Young hotel when the medics showed themselves to be as efficient at the dining table as they unquestionably are at the operating table. During the afternoon session the following were elected officers for the ensuing year: President, Dr. J. T. Wayson; vice-president, Dr. Edward Armitage of Waialua, Maui; secretary, Dr. A. N. Sinclair; executive committee, Drs. George Herberg and W. E. Taylor.  
The most important matter during the afternoon was the adoption of the following resolution, submitted by Dr. Wood, chairman of the special committee on the Nuuanu water supply: "Whereas, The government has now under construction in Nuuanu valley, about Luakaha, a large reservoir, to be used when completed for the storage of surface water which is designed to be the main water supply of the city of Honolulu; and,

# FOREIGN NEWS BY CABLE

CHINA'S LOSSES BY THE WAR.  
WASHINGTON, November 21.—China estimates her damages by the recent Russo-Japanese war to be twenty million dollars. She claims that twenty thousand Chinese non-combatants were killed by one side or the other.  
She expects to reach a settlement without referring the matter to The Hague tribunal.

DISSENSION IN THE ZEMSTVO.  
MOSCOW, November 21.—The sessions of the Zemstvo have not resulted in any definite good. There are two irreconcilable parties, one of which is supporting the De Witte government and the other is opposing it.

AMERICAN WARSHIPS FOR RUSSIA.  
WASHINGTON, November 21.—The American warships have as yet been unable to reach St. Petersburg, owing to the mouth of the river Neva at Cronstadt being icebound.

RUSSIA GROWING MORE QUIET.  
ST. PETERSBURG, November 21.—Affairs are quieting down and normal conditions are returning.

PAVING PATH FOR SHAW'S CANDIDACY.  
WASHINGTON, November 21.—It is expected that Leslie M. Shaw will resign his post as Secretary of the Treasury several months prior to the Republican presidential convention in order to the better promote his candidacy for the presidential nomination.

POLITICS BREWING IN NEW YORK.  
WASHINGTON, November 21.—President Roosevelt has been in conference with Governor Frank Higgins of New York in regard to New York politics.

MORE DELAY FOR THE CANAL.  
WASHINGTON, November 21.—The report of the Panama Canal Commission is not final. Majority and minority reports are expected.

HALF OF THE BODIES RECOVERED.  
PARIS, November 21.—Sixty bodies of the victims of the disaster off St. Mado to the British steamer Hilda have so far been washed ashore.

"Whereas, It has been demonstrated in many cities at great cost in human lives that the only safety from typhoid fever, dysentery and cholera and other water-borne diseases to communities depending upon a surface water supply lies in the filtration of the water used for domestic purposes; there for be it Resolved, That the Hawaiian Territorial Medical Society call to the attention of the government the necessity of immediate action in the matter of establishing a filtration plant for the Nuuanu water supply; and, be it Resolved, That a committee of three be appointed to act for this society and authorized to confer with the Governor of the Territory and the President of the Board of Health in carrying out the purpose of these resolutions."  
During the afternoon Surgeon Vladimir of the Russian cruiser Lena paid a visit to the meeting and was heartily received. He appeared in full uniform and made a graceful little speech in which he said that there were no nationalities in the medical profession, all were an international red cross society.  
The following papers were read: "Acquired Race Immunity," Dr. Carl Ramus, U. S. Marine Hospital Service; "Purulent Inflammation of the Middle Ear and Mastoid Cells," Dr. W. G. Rogers, Honolulu; "Injuries of Bones,

Muscles and Ligaments and Their Treatment by Massage and Movement" Dr. Edward Armitage, Waialua, Maui; "Constipation—Its Cause, Effects and Treatment," Dr. F. Howard Humphris, Honolulu; "Beriberi, and Some of its Clinical Aspects from Personal Observation," Dr. C. B. Cooper, Honolulu. "Hawaiian Fever and Typhoid Fever" by Drs. Mori, Uchida and Kuramoto was read by Dr. Mori, Honolulu.
