Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 0 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

Local Office, Weather Bureau.

The following data, covering a period of 28 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month:

Month December for 28 years.

TEMPERATURE. (1890-1904.)

Mean or normal temperature, 72°.

The warmest month was that of 1891, with an average of 74°.

The coldest month was that of 1902, with an average of 71°.

The highest temperature was 84° on December 2, 1890.

The lowest temperature was 55° on December 30, 1902.

PRECIPITATION (rain). (1877-1893 & 1904.)

Average for the month, 3.57 inches.

Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 14.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 8.86 inches in 1879.

The least monthly precipitation was 1.17 inches in 1888.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 4.30 inches on December 22, 1879.

CLOUDS AND WEATHER. (1890-1904.)

Average number of clear days, 143; partly cloudy days, 14; cloudy days, 4.

WIND.

The prevailing winds have been from the northeast.

The average hourly velocity of the wind during December, 1904, was 8.3 miles.

The highest velocity of the wind during December, 1904, was 35 miles from the northeast on the 26th.

Supervisors Turned Down Claims Of The Treasurer

SAID HE HAD EMPLOYED PRIVATE COUNSEL IN OPPOSITION TO THEIR WISHES AND COULD PUNGE THE FEE HIMSELF—OTHER MATTERS TRANSACTED BY THE BOARD AT MEETING LAST NIGHT.

Considerable business of importance was transacted by the board of supervisors at the meeting last night. All of the members were present.

Appropriations for the month of November were made as follows, for salaries, garbage department \$638.90; 34 demands; Waiwala Road district 56 demands \$1,041.50; Waiwala road district 15 demands, \$349.65; Ewa and Waiwala road district, 80 demands \$2,356.85; Road Department 312 demands for last half of the month, \$4,107.16; police and fire alarm system 4 demands \$75.45; electric light department, 6 demands, \$157.75; Pupukea Homestead road, 1 demand, \$58.65; for materials and supplies fire department 21 demands \$772.20; poundmaster 2 demands \$25.35; county office rent 1 demand \$100; Kapiolani park 9 demands, \$428.25; county treasurer, 4 demands, \$19.25; Koolauapo road district, 7 demands, \$35.39; Koolauapo road district (special) 4 demands \$98; Koolauloa district, 7 demands, \$135.80; Hawaiian band, 2 demands, \$146.44; Waiwala road district, 10 demands, \$75.48; county attorney, 7 demands \$79.10; county auditor, 6 demands, \$28.88; county clerk, 8 demands, \$101.50; Waiwala road district, 2 demands, \$83.42; garbage department, 15 demands \$392.05; Kailua bridge, 1 demand, \$87.

Estimates for the month of December were allowed as follows:

Road Department, material and supplies \$17,500; police department, payroll \$7,165, supplies \$1,000; fire department payroll \$3,875, supplies \$875; electric light department payroll \$570, supplies \$1100; garbage department payroll \$1450, supplies \$500; Hawaiian band payroll \$1550, supplies \$100; police and fire alarm system payroll \$100, supplies \$175; keepers of parks payroll, \$200; expenses (parks) \$50; county office rent, \$100; poundmaster payroll \$30; house numbering \$125; Ewa road district \$2,000; Waiwala road district \$2,900; Waiwala road district \$600; Koolauapo road district \$800; Koolauloa road district, \$1,000; County clerk office clerks \$195; county clerk expenses \$150; county auditor, clerk \$100; county auditor expenses \$200; county attorney, clerks \$425; county attorney expenses \$100; county treasurer, clerk \$100; county treasurer expenses \$25; Kapiolani park \$1,000; special road tax Honolulu \$1,670; total \$47,630.

The report from the County Treasurer for the month of November was read showing that the receipts to the general funds had amounted to \$60,709.15 which with the cash on hand on November 1, amounting to \$43,575.37 brought the total receipts up to \$104,284.52. The expenditures amounted to \$39,482.92, leaving a balance of \$66,482.92. The report showed that in the special road tax funds, there was on hand to the credit of the Honolulu district \$7,741.94 and the outside districts \$1737.27.

An extended and interesting report from the County Attorney dealing with conditions of his department, and what had been accomplished during the past month was read and placed on file. The report also told of correspondence that the attorney had had with the Dowsett estate, relative to securing a price on some land belonging to the estate, which was to be used in the extension of Smith street. The figure named was for 7700 square feet at the rate of \$2 a square foot. The sentiment of the board seemed to be that this would be a pretty steep price for the improvements contemplated.

Treasurer Trent came in for some handling without gloves, when a communication was received from him, requesting that the board appropriate \$200 for the purpose of paying the bill of Judge W. H. Whiting for legal services in behalf of the treasurer in defending the recent McClanahan injunction suit before the Supreme Court. The treasurer stated that the county attorney had declined to defend him and he had been, therefore, compelled to seek outside counsel.

County Attorney Douthitt was present and was asked regarding the matter. He addressed the board and said that it was hardly necessary for him to enter into a discussion of the details of the blanket warrant controversy. The members of the board were perfectly familiar with it and with all of its phases. As far as his refusing to defend Mr. Trent, nothing of the kind had occurred. Trent had gone in opposition to the wishes of the board in the matter and had gone contrary to the advice of the county attorney. The treasurer had refused to take the advice of Douthitt in the matter and when Mr. Trent had acted in that way the county attorney naturally could not advise him further. In answer to a question by Lucas, Douthitt said that his recollection of the matter was that Trent had taken the action into the courts in opposition to a resolution passed by the board.

Lucas expressed the opinion that they should not pay the claim. If Trent wanted to go outside and employ private counsel, let him pay for it.

Moore suggested that the matter go over until the next meeting, in order

that the treasurer might be present and make a statement regarding the matter. Chairman Smith said that he would in the meanwhile, direct the clerk to have all of the resolutions and correspondence relative to the blanket warrant controversy, prepared for the assistance of the supervisors.

But the board did not wish any postponement. Adams said he was not in favor of postponing action. The board might as well settle the thing then.

Lucas expressed the same opinion. "We may as well knock it out now," he said "for we will knock it out at the next meeting."

Adams finally clinched matters by offering a resolution directing that the treasurer be notified of the receipt of his letter and that the board of supervisors could not appropriate county money to pay personal bills. Lucas seconded the motion. Moore was the only one to offer any opposition. He did not approve of paying the bill he explained, but he wanted to give Trent a fair show to come before the board to explain matters. Smith, Archer, Lucas, and Adams spoke in opposition and called attention to the fact that there had been every attempt made by the board to reach an amicable adjustment of the controversy without the expense of going into court but this had failed. The motion then passed.

Several reports were received from Acting Fire Chief Deering.

A communication was received from Superintendent of Public Instruction Babbitt asking that Hackfeld street be macadamized. A petition relative to the same matter, from property owners on the street, was also received. Road Supervisor Johnson said that the street would have to be drained first before it could be macadamized.

J. P. Mendonca wrote to the board asking that they appropriate \$150 to pay for damages done to his building at 1112 Smith street by the police during a raid on a gambling joint which had been protected by barred doors. The communication was referred to the police committee.

The board passed a resolution to enter into a contract with the Rapid Transit Company to haul coral from the South street dump for the Walkiki Road improvement, the pond at the Hotel Annex, to Kaimuki Hill and to Kahauiki where road improvements are contemplated. The company agreed to haul the stuff at 16 cents per cubic yard. Road Supervisor Johnson said that the deal would be a great saving to the county in the matter of cost of hauling. Six months would be required to perform the work. About 50,000 cubic yards of the coral was to be hauled.
