Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 6 hours, 6 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

## U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.

Local Office, Weather Bureau. The following data, covering a period of 23 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month December for 23 years. TEMPERATURE. (1890-1904.) Mean or normal temperature, 72°. The warmest month was that of 1891, with an average of 74°. The coldest month was that of 1902, with an average of 71°. The highest temperature was 84° on December 2, 1890. The lowest temperature was 55° on December 30, 1902.

PRECIPITATION (rain). (1877-1893 & 1904.) Average for the month, 3.57 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 14. The greatest monthly precipitation was 8.86 inches in 1879. The least monthly precipitation was 1.17 inches in 1888. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 4.39 inches on December 22, 1879.

CLOUDS AND WEATHER. (1890-1904.) Average number of clear days, 143; partly cloudy days, 14; cloudy days, 4.

WIND. The prevailing winds have been from the northeast. The average hourly velocity of the wind during December, 1904, was 8.3 miles. The highest velocity of the wind during December, 1904, was 35 miles from the northeast on the 29th. Station: Honolulu, T. H. Date of issue: November 29, 1905. ALEX. McC. ## GOLF THE LAST DAY OF THE YEAR

### PROBABLY THE LAST GAME FOR THE HALEIWA CUP—COMPETITIVE GOLF IN MANOA SUNDAY.

The next golf tournament for the Haleiwa Cup will be played over the Waialeale links on December 31st, and already great interest is taken in the event as this promises to be the last match for the cup. This cup has to be won three times and four players each have two legs. Frank Armstrong, Judge Mahaulu, Horace Mahaulu and Q. H. Berrey.

On Sunday next the Manoa Club will give a tournament to decide who shall receive the eight free trips to represent the club at the Waialeale tournament; also Woods & Sheldon will give a dozen hand-made golf balls for the best gross score, so a big crowd is expected. James Melville has decided to remain over until January 3rd.

# The Isle Of Pines

The Isla de Pinos or Isle de Pines, off Cuba, is, according to the report issued by the United States Consul General at Havana, a veritable paradise in climate, resources, and other respects. How long it will remain so, now that the fact is known, remains to be seen. South of the west end of Cuba, 35 miles from shore, it is 43 by 33 miles in extent. It has not the low coral and mangrove-swamp character of neighboring formations, but is a plateau 50 to 100 feet high with ridges and cliffs. Some summits are over 1500 feet; but the southern part is flat and low. There are several rivers.

The climate is described as one of the finest on earth. The thermometer seldom goes above 90 and never below 58, the average being about 75, or somewhat lower than that of Cuba.

Sea breezes penetrate every part of the island, and gather healthful fragrance from the pines. There are warm mineral springs of magnesia and iron, with a reputation for stomachic and rheumatic complaints. The nights are cool and pleasant. Fever and epidemics are unknown.

The hills are composed of most beautiful marbles of various colors, coarse and fine grain, remarkably free from cracks. The veins are from 5 to 25 feet thick. There are green rock crystals, manganese in thick deposit, haematite ore in a matrix of silicious schist, sharp white quartz sand for building purposes or artificial stone, and red and gray clay for bricks. Fruits of all kinds are produced, and the soil is adapted for both tobacco and sugar. There are grazing and other facilities for live-stock. The pines cover the northern part of the island, and the soil would support all the kinds of wood grown in Cuba.

There are good harbors and the island is accessible. The population is about 3600. The capital, Nueva Gerona, has baths and six schools; and an Isle of Pines Bank has been opened.

## A CHANCE FOR AMERICANS.

The French parliament will be asked to offer a prize of \$200,000 for a cure for consumption. The government approves and the amount will be voted. It is hoped that the prize will so stimulate research that a positive cure will be announced at the tuberculosis congress to meet at our national capital. It is presumed that the prize is open to the world, and therefore American investigators have an opportunity to win both wealth and immortality of fame.—Newark Advertiser.

# JUSTICES ON CODE PLEADING

## TERRITORY LOSES A PRELIMINARY MOTION IN THE LAHAINALUNA SEMINARY CASE.

An oral decision of the Supreme court has been given in the case of F. J. Lowrey, G. P. Castle and W. O. Smith, trustees, vs the Territory of Hawaii, in which the plaintiffs claim \$15,000 for the American Board of Missions, on account of alleged violation of an agreement to teach the Christian religion, as given in the old missionary faith at Lahainaluna Seminary. A motion was made by the Territory to strike out some portions of the bill of complaint. The motion was denied in a ruling announced by Chief Justice Freer, after Justice Hartwell had made a statement giving his views, which were substantially those of the ruling. Justice Hartwell said that the motion was in line with a system of code pleading which he did not consider should be allowed here. The chief justice in comment agreed in the main with Hartwell, but said there were some features of the system of code pleading which he regarded as valuable, and that some were being introduced here by statute.
