MOLOKANS ALSO FAIL TO AGREE

LETTER FROM LOS ANGELES SHOWS THEY ARE CONSIDERING A TEXAS PROPOSITION.

A letter received by Governor Carter from Los Angeles shows that the Russian Molokans are divided as to whether they want to come here and take up the Kaula lands or not. The letter also shows that when the Russian representatives left here it was with the understanding that there was a complete agreement with the Makee Sugar Company as to cane contracts, which have been a subject of disagreement here ever since they left.

The letter is from M. Shiofokoff, one of the delegates from Los Angeles who discussed the matter here. He is strongly in favor of having the Russian colony come here, and says that he regards the opportunity as one not to be missed. He says, however, that the report given by him and associate on returning from Hawaii led to a division. Incidentally, his letter reveals the fact that the appraised value of the lands as reported to the Russians was \$30,000. This means an appraisement of about \$6 per acre.

Shiofokoff writes with great enthusiasm of the desire of the Russians to make their homes permanently on the Kaula lands, and to settle a colony that will last. He says his people are willing to defer the matter of securing an absolute title to the land for ten years if it is desired that they do so. He also says that the Russians want to make he land their "home forever."

"I beg of you to work quickly," says the Russian delegate in his letter "and I feel that we shall be happy on your island, and we do not wish to miss the opportunity."

The writer also says that an offer of lands in Texas is being considered. It appears that there was a division in the colony as to whether the Hawaiian offer should be accepted or not, and whether the Texas offer should be taken up. There was no idea at all that any question had arisen here regarding the terms of the cane contracts. The writer speaks of "contracts as agreed upon by Mr. Fairbaird."

The letter was sent to Carter by P. A. Demens, the Russian who originated the Molokan proposition. It will evidently be a great surprise to the Russians to learn that the parties here are in disagreement as to the terms to be offered them.

HENRY MAY MAKE CHANGES

HIGH SHERIFF GOING TO HILO AS A RESULT OF GRAND JURY CHARGES.

High Sheriff Henry left for Hilo today to investigate the charges in the Hilo Grand Jury's report against Jailer Maby and deputies of the Hilo jail. The jury charged gross brutality in assaults upon prisoners. A copy of the report of the jury was officially sent to Henry, who has general charge of the jails, and as a result he will go to make a personal investigation.

"If the charges are true of course there will have to be some changes," said the high sheriff this morning. "I am much surprised at hearing of such charges against Jailer Maby. I have known him for a long time and always considered him a very even tempered man. It is my intention to make a thorough investigation on the spot and act according to the results thereof."

Henry expects to return on the Kilauea this week.

MORE PEOPLE WANTING LAND

IMMIGRATION BOARD WILL DISCUSS FURTHER APPLICATIONS WHICH ATKINSON RECEIVED.

Tomorrow morning there will be the usual meeting of the Immigration Commissioners though there seems little beyond routine business to be gone over.

"I have received a letter from Secretary Atkinson dated in New York," said J. P. Cooke this morning but it was of a private nature and did not bear on the immigration business at all.

Clarence Crabbe also heard from Atkinson.

"He enclosed a number of applications for land which had been sent to him and I expect the board will answer them in a similar manner to those previously received," he said when asked as to their disposition.

TAHITI MAY BECOME AMERICAN

FRANCE SAID TO BE NEGOTIATING FOR ITS SALE TO THE UNITED STATES.

SAN FRANCISCO, December 21—The Oceanic steamer Mariposa, Captain Lawless, arrived yesterday direct from the island of Tahiti, brought the news that a rumor is current throughout Tahiti that the United States Government has offered France 20,000,000 francs for this island. This amounts to only about \$4,000,000, and absurd as it appears to be, the residents of this magnificent island, even to the French residents, appear to be pleased over the prospect that the island might come under the jurisdiction of Uncle Sam. The source of this rumor could not be traced, but everybody arriving on the Mariposa had heard it in Tahiti.

It is worthy of note, however, that the French Government lately has removed its military garrison at Tahiti to another island some few hundred miles away and that orders have been received to send the gunboat Zelee to another French island. As Tahiti has always been the best French possession in the South Seas, the removal of the garrison and stationship would appear to be some confirmation for the report that negotiations regarding this island might possibly be under way.

Tahiti is 120 miles in circumference and has always been regarded as the most beautiful, as well as most fertile, island in the South Seas. It is in almost a direct line between Panama and Australia, and its coast line has more harbor facilities than the entire Pacific coast of this country. But under French dominion Tahiti has never been prosperous and has been a white elephant on the hands of France. Although the very home of the sugar cane, the island does not produce enough cane to meet the wants of its inhabitants.
