

ONLY ENGLISH IN PUBLIC SCHOOLS

BOARD OF EDUCATION WILL NOT
LEND BUILDING FOR JAPANESE
TEACHING.

The Board of Education yesterday afternoon turned down an application from an Ewa Japanese for permission to use the school house there, after the regular school hours, for a Japanese school. Superintendent Babbitt reported that he had replied to the application stating that he did not think the Board would allow use of the school except for regular English courses, and this letter was unanimously approved, on motion of Farrington.

The Teachers' committee report was approved, as follows:

That a life certificate be granted Miss Bertha Ben Taylor.

That Mrs. Vierra of the Kaapahu school be granted six weeks leave of absence, from January 8th, on account of ill health, and that Mrs. William Onley be appointed as substitute.

That Miss Menicke be transferred from Waioli to Kakaia school at a salary of \$50 per month.

That Miss Macomber be released.

That Miss Gertrude McCarrison be transferred from Kamalo to Kaili-huana school at \$42.50.

That J. B. Kuhns be appointed as principal to Kamalo vice Miss McCarrison at a salary of \$42.50.

That the application of Miss Lydia Macy be placed on file.

That resignation of Mrs. W. A. Anderson be accepted.

That Miss Maud Lovejoy be appointed temporarily as teacher of English in the High School at a salary of \$50.

That the request of Miss de Carmo and Miss de Lima to leave three days early be granted on condition of their making up the extra time by teaching on Saturdays or holidays.

That the resignation of Miss McCrossen, who leaves on account of small salary to accept a position more commensurate with her needs, be accepted.

That Miss M. H. Douglas be appointed temporarily to Miss McCrossen's position at a salary of \$44.

That Miss Blanche Horner be granted leave of absence for five months from February 5 and that Mrs. Kenway be appointed principal in her place at her present salary. That Miss Maud Horner be appointed assistant at two-thirds of Miss Blanche Horner's salary for two months and at a salary of \$42.50 for the remainder of the time.

That leave of absence for one month be granted Mrs. Capellas, assistant Hakalau school, and that Miss Farquhar or J. B. Oliver be appointed substitute.

That resignation of Miss M. R. Fountain of Lihue school be accepted.

That Miss Kabele be appointed assistant in the Lihue school vice Miss Fountain resigned, at a salary of \$25.

That resignation of Mrs. Rhodes be accepted.

That Mrs. L. N. Smith be appointed principal of Hauula vice Mrs. Rhodes resigned, at a salary of \$60.

That Mrs. Eldora Deacon be appointed assistant at Waialua school vice Mrs. Smith transferred, at a salary of \$44.

That resignation of Miss Laughlin be accepted.

That Miss Ekstrand be transferred from Waimanalo to Waioli vice Miss Laughlin resigned, at a salary of \$44.

That Miss Marcos be granted leave of absence for one week as requested.

That Miss Elizabeth Cameron be appointed assistant in the new room at the Royal school at a salary of \$40.

That Mrs. Jack Bergstrom be appointed substitute for Miss Anna Sorenson, assistant Royal school.

That Rev. Kaunohelwa be appointed temporary assistant in the Hana school at a salary of \$30 a month, vice D. P. Kapewa resigned.

That Miss Lillian Pihl be appointed principal of Nohokowai at a salary of \$35.

That Mrs. Weir be transferred from Moliili to Waipahu school, at a salary of \$44.

That Miss A. J. Gault be transferred from Waipahu school to Moliili school at a salary of \$42.50.



APPEAL WITHDRAWN.

Kum Lun, who appealed from a fine of \$10 for assault and battery, withdrew his appeal yesterday in Judge De Bolt's court. He told the court that the appeal had been for the purpose of delay, until he could raise money to pay the fine. He had never intended to stand a jury trial. County Attorney Douthitt suggested that such an appeal should be treated as a contempt of court, but Judge De Bolt said the defendant had a right to appeal and then withdraw the appeal and that if anything wrong it was with the law.

ANIN GOES BACK TO JAIL

SENTENCED FOR TELLING HIS
ATTORNEY ABOUT HIS TESTI-
MONY BEFORE GRAND JURY.

Y. Anin was committed again for contempt late yesterday afternoon, for having told his attorney what his testimony had been in the Grand Jury room. During the noon recess yesterday he saw his attorney and when the jury met in the afternoon he was asked if he had told anyone what his testimony had been. He admitted that he had, whereupon the jury took him over to Judge Lindsay and made the following report:

To the Honorable Alexander Lindsay Jr., Second Judge of the Circuit Court of the First Judicial Circuit, Territory of Hawaii:

The Grand Jury, duly empaneled and sworn, do hereby certify that Y. Anin, defendant in the case of the People vs. Y. Anin, did testify before the Grand Jury on January 10, 1926, in the morning in the Supreme Court, was issued by Chief Justice Frear.

Judge Lindsay committed Anin for three days for contempt. A writ of habeas corpus, returnable at 10 this morning in the Supreme Court, was issued by Chief Justice Frear.
