

## HAWAII CHURCHES MEET AT KALAPANA

SEMI-ANNUAL MEETING OF THE EVANGELICAL ASSOCIATION OF THE ISLAND OF HAWAII

The semi-annual meeting of the Evangelical Association of the Island of Hawaii will begin next Thursday with the Kalapana church in Puna. It will probably last over Sunday.

Quite a number of people are going from here by the Kinohiwa tomorrow to attend. Among them are Rev. Dr. O. H. Gulick, Rev. Dr. Doremus Seuder, representing the Hawaiian Board, and John Martin, representing the Anti-Saloon League. Dr. Baker of the Kona church will also be present. Dr. Gulick speaks Hawaiian and Dr. Seuder Japanese.

The church at Kalapana was organized in 1868, though it had long existed prior to that as a part of the Hilo church. Dr. Sereno E. Bishop thinks the church probably dates from the thirties or possibly not earlier than the forties.

John Martin goes to the meeting to arouse interest in the Anti-Saloon movement. He will probably make a rather complete tour of the Island of Hawaii.

## CARTER GOES TO A BIG CALIFORNIA RANCH

MANAGER OF THE PARKER RANCH GOES TO THE BIG CONE RANCH NEAR RED BLUFF.

Fred W. Carter who has been manager of the Parker Ranch for a number of years has resigned to accept the management of the Cone ranch near Red Bluff, California. This is one of the most important ranches in California. With his family, Mr. Carter will probably sail from Kahului by the Nebraska, or if not, by the Siberia from Honolulu March 23.

In the recent Parker ranch litigation an attack was made on Carter's management of the ranch, but both he and his management were fully vindicated. Mr. Carter was born in the Islands. He is a brother of A. W. Carter and a cousin of Governor George Carter. For many years he was in the police service of Hawaii being Deputy Sheriff on Maui and Sheriff of Kauai for a long time. He afterwards went into the service of the American Sugar Company, and afterwards became manager of the Parker Ranch. He lived a number of years in the state of Washington where he married. Mrs. Carter has many friends in all parts of Hawaii. Mr. and Mrs. Carter have three children.

### OLD LAND RECORDS.

The Foundation of All Hawaiian Land Titles Being Looked Over.

Secretary Lydecker of the Board of Archives is now engaged in examining the records of the Hawaiian land commission, from the organization of the first one over sixty years ago. The documents contain a general history of all the government land policies and actions since the Hawaiian monarchy began to enact laws, and there is considerable researching to be done. Mingled with the land documents are many other documents of more or less historical interest and value. Lydecker will sort out the papers and prepare them for their places in the archives building.

### THE KA MOI LABEL.

The libel case of the Inter-Island Steamship Company vs. the schooner Ka Mo'i, in which the libellant claims \$4250 for having, as is alleged, saved the schooner, has been set for next Monday by stipulation. Smith & Lewis and Holmes & Stanley appear for the schooner.

## PALOLO VALLEY TO FIGHT COOKE

SETTLERS APPEAR BEFORE MRS. NAKUNA, COMMISSIONER OF WATER RIGHTS.

About fifteen Palolo valley taro planters and other settlers appeared before Mrs. Emma M. Nakuna this morning, to present their complaint against the proposed water development operations of A. F. Cooke, who wants to do some tunneling on his upland property to develop a supply which he proposes to use below. It is claimed that the tunneling will stop certain springs, from which the settlers claim to be entitled to a supply and Mrs. Nakuna, as Commissioner of Water Rights, is to determine to whom the available supply belongs.

Attorney General Peters appeared for the territory, representing in fact the settlers, who are all homesteaders given the land by the government. Cooke appeared in person. Peters said he was investigating the matter, and asked that the hearing be postponed for a week, by which time he will be able to decide what position the government will take in the matter.

## KAHUKU ANNUAL MEETING TODAY

THE PLANTATION REPORTED IN GOOD CONDITION FOR ECONOMIC PRODUCTION OF SUGAR.

The annual meeting of Kahuku Plantation Company was held at 2 o'clock this afternoon at the office of Alexander & Baldwin. Reports were made and officers elected.

The total operating expenses of Kahuku plantation for the year were \$568,828.09. The gross receipts from the sale of 7,749,312 tons of sugar at \$81.249 a ton was \$629,627.81. The marketing expenses were \$114,025.30. The total net proceeds were \$517,579.92.

The following is the report made by Manager Andrew Adams.

Crop of 1905: This crop was estimated to yield from Kahuku cane 7,000 tons, from Lala cane 450 tons sugar, a total of 7,450 tons sugar. The actual yield, as per Exhibit "G," was, from Kahuku cane 7,431 tons from Lala cane 341 tons sugar, a total of 7,772 tons sugar. Grinding on this crop was finished on September 20th, considerably later than is usual or generally advisable. The short ratoons were harvested last and as very little of this cane tassel, the tops were used for seed cane. The mill was grinding during this period only about 12 hours daily. The yield from the short ratoons was 3.93 tons per acre. The average yield of the entire area of plant cane, long ratoons and short ratoons was 5.01 tons sugar per acre.

Crop of 1906: During the warm summer months this crop had a very good growth. The short ratoons were more heavily fertilized than usual and "made cane" rapidly. The area of cane for this crop is as follows: Plant cane 428 acres, long ratoons 565 acres, short ratoons 619 acres, a total of 1,552 acres. The yield of sugar should be approximately the same as that of the 1905 crop, or 7,400 tons from Kahuku cane.

Crop of 1907: The area of this crop will be 245 acres plant cane, 815 acres long ratoons and at least 600 acres short ratoons. Especial care was taken in the selection of seed cane for the planting. Tops from the short ratoons of the 1905 crop were used almost exclusively. The long ratoons were all heavily replanted and brought under cultivation early. The amount of fertilizer per acre was increased considerably for this crop. The year was a dry one and the weather was favorable to this young crop, so that it is on the whole in excellent condition. There is very little leaf-hopper in evidence as yet and almost no rust. A systematic and thorough attempt was made to keep this crop free from borer. A gang of Portuguese boys with a luna was constantly employed collecting borer beetles in the young cane. During the year in the neighborhood of two million of borer beetles were collected from all crops.

Some 35 acres of land has been planted in cane by the Boys' Industrial School at Waialea adjoining Field No. 8. This cane will be purchased for this crop.

Repairs: Over \$8000 was spent during the year on repairs to buildings. Most of this sum was for repairs to buildings occupied by the employees of the company. Nearly \$3,000 was spent on repairs to steam plows, the principal items of which were for practically renewing the two boilers of the older set of plows. Both sets were also equipped for burning fuel oil. Between seasons the No. 1 locomotive was furnished with a set of new driving wheel tires and a new rear truck. The boiler was also partly retubed. The No. 2 locomotive was given a new boiler. Both locomotives were equipped for burning oil. The boilers at two of the pumping stations were furnished with new tubes.

New tubes were also purchased for the six boilers at the factory and the old mill house was renovated to make the change from the open clarified to the D-ming system. This change makes it possible to use all the exhaust steam from the main engines with great economy. At the present writing only five boilers are being used instead of the six at last season, and an extraction of over 95.5 per cent is being obtained daily without the use of auxiliary fuel.

All the machinery and the buildings of the plantation are now in thorough repair and there should be little expense for this item for several years other than for general wear and tear. Improvement: A Deming juice heater and three large filter-presses made up the principal items in the factory. New houses for employees were built during the year at a cost of \$12,400. A new 200-ton oil-burning Baldwin locomotive was added to the rolling stock equipment. About 60 acres of new land were cleared and the necessary flumes for conveying water thereto were built. Your plantation is now very fully equipped and is in excellent condition for producing sugar economically. There should be no material additions to the factory or other machinery.

### WORK STARTED.

Work on the construction of improvements at Quarantine Island were commenced this morning by Cotton Brothers. The preliminary work on the sea wall was begun. The schooner Alice Cooke, which arrived yesterday after a very long passage from Port Gamble brought the bulk of the lumber materials for the construction of the various improvements and there will no longer be any delay.

The vessel brought about 800,000 feet of lumber. The piles for the construction of the wharf formed part of the cargo as did the heavy lumber for that section of the work. The runway is also to be built, as is a bundry on the island. The iron for the work arrived some weeks ago.

Five drunks were fined \$5 and costs each this morning by Judge Whitney.
