PLANTATIONS OFFERING LAND

BIG EMPLOYERS OF LABOR ARE MEETING THE VIEWS OF THE ACTING GOVERNOR.

Acting Governor Atkinson has received assurances from several planters of their support of the policy of giving imported settlers land in fee simple, as insisted upon by Atkinson at the last meeting of the Board of Immigration. W. M. Giffard of W. G. Irwin & Company stated to Atkinson yesterday that the company's plantations were all preparing to meet the condition. Oloa Sugar Company has not only decided to meet the condition of one acre, but is offering two acres, both to assisted immigrants whom the Board may bring here and to laborers already on the ground.

The acting governor says that in cases where plantations have only leased lands, the government will endeavor to assist them to secure titles so that they may supply the settlers with land.


