Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time which flows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 9 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

## U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE-WEATHER BUREAU.

The following data, covering a period of 29 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month, March, for 29 years. Temperature. (1890-1905). Mean or normal temperature, 71°. The warmest month was that of 1897, with an average of 73°. The coldest month was that of 1905, with an average of 68°. The highest temperature was 82° on March 18, 1893, and March 30, 1901. The lowest temperature was 53° on March 4, 1891. Precipitation (rain). 1877-89 & 1905. Average for the month, 2.53 inches. Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 11. The greatest monthly precipitation was 13.29 inches in 1890. The least monthly precipitation was 0.13 inches in 1878. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 5.62 inches on March 7, 1890. Relative Humidity.\* Average, 9 a. m., 70% 8 a. m., 65%; average, 8 p. m., 76% (1890-1904); 8 p. m., 68% (1905).

Clouds and Weather. (1890-1905). Average number of clear days, 9; partly cloudy days, 15; cloudy days, 7. Wind. The prevailing winds have been from the northeast. The average hourly velocity of the wind during March, 1905, was 8.5 miles. The highest velocity of the wind during March, 1905, was 34 miles from the west on the 10th. Station: Honolulu, T. H. ## LABOR SHORT IN WESTERN STATES

APPEALS TO CHICAGO EMPLOYMENT BUREAUS SHOW SCARCITY HAS ALMOST REACHED FAMINE

CHICAGO, March 16.—From all over the West appeals are being made to the employment bureaus of Chicago for laborers. The scarcity of labor has almost reached the point of famine and there is already great alarm lest it be impossible next July to get men enough to gather the wheat crop of the Middle West. St. Louis, Kansas City and San Francisco are the three cities that have made the most urgent calls for help. Mechanics and unskilled laborers are in great demand, and the employment bureaus are unable to meet the calls.

The Western railroads are in distress on account of this lack of labor. It is said by men conversant with the general situation that 250,000 additional men are needed for building operations. From San Francisco and other Coast cities appeals are being made for domestic help. There is unusual scarcity of female laborers for housework.

## NO MORE PASSES.

The remark is not uncommon these days that there is a marked improvement in the newspapers of the state since the editors have discontinued traveling on railroads. The presumption is that they have now more time to devote to their editorial work.—Wheeling (W. Va.) Register.
