**LOCAL JAPANESE HOLD MASS MEETING**

ABOUT 40 JAPANESE MET LAST NIGHT TO CONSIDER MATTER OF RELIEF FOR COUNTRYMEN.

About forty Japanese gathered at the Japanese Primary School last evening to discuss the plan of sending relief to the suffering Japanese in San Francisco.

Two factions were present. One wishing to send immediate relief and the other wishing to wait until more definite news be received. Several of the prominent Japanese of the town made addresses and after a long discussion it was decided to await further news from the Japanese consul in Oakland. Meanwhile those wishing to contribute can do so, making their subscription to the general relief fund. The cable received by the Consul here in regard to the matter as reported in yesterday's Star, said that 10,000 Japanese were starving to death and immediate aid was requested.

**ODD FELLOWS ACT**

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**ODDITIES.**  
It is not now for the first time that London's council is proposing to take over the responsibility of lighting its streets and houses. In 1716 the old common council thought itself most public-spirited in passing an act by which "all housekeepers whose house, door or gateway fronts or lies next to any street, lane or public passage or place of the said city, shall in every dark night, that is, every night between the second night after each full moon and the seventh night after each new moon, set or hang out one or more lights, with sufficient cotton wicks, on penalty of 1 shilling."

In San Francisco the other day the fish and game commissioner found a sack of owls on the counters of a commission house. The buyer of a French restaurant was negotiating for their purchase. If the trade had not been interrupted they would have been transferred into "broiled quail" under the hands of an expert chef. One man in Fresno has made a livelihood for several years by shipping owls to tickle the palates of the San Francisco epicures. The ground squirrel, too, is equal." Many sacks of these are received in San Francisco daily.

It is estimated that 25,000 habitual criminals, persons who at one time or another have been sentenced for serious offenses, are now committing depredations in Paris. In order to check their exploits the number of cyclist policemen is to be increased to 620.

**HELPLESSNESS AT THE POST OFFICE**

POSTMASTER PRATT AND EVERY EMPLOYEE DOING ALL POSSIBLE TO ASSIST THE PUBLIC.

The Post Office officials did everything in their power this morning to assist the public in the matter of getting mail matter into the mails in the best possible shape. There was not an unusually large mail, but there was an unusual amount of incoherence in the minds of people concerning mail, because of the effects of the San Francisco disaster.

Scores of people were sending letters to friends and relatives in the stricken city. The great destruction there, and the uncertainty as to what parts are still standing, and the necessary result of chaos, perplexed people as to how to address their letters.

Many likewise were sending money by registered mail, and of course were anxious that it should get to the loved ones without delay.

Postmaster Pratt was down at the office early this morning and both he and every post office employee did everything in their power to assist people in getting their mail off. Advice was sought as to the best thing to do under every conceivable circumstance due to the present disturbance. It was helpfully given whenever asked, and every effort was made to facilitate and simplify matters.

They were to go to Southern California and the fact that they did not is sufficient to cause Mr. Kimball to believe that they were in San Francisco at the time of the earthquake.
