Iwalani To Midway

CABLE COMPANY WILL SEND THE REGULAR BATCH OF SUPPLIES TO MIDWAY STATION IN MAY.

The Cable Company will send the regular supplies to Midway early next month. The steamer Iwalani is to be chartered to make the trip to Midway from Honolulu, with supplies for the cable station at Midway.

The Iwalani will also carry coal to enable the refrigerating and other plants at Midway to be operated. Six months' supplies for the station will also be taken out. The date of the departure of the Iwalani has not been settled yet, but she will load and depart early next month.

The trip will be independent of the trip of the U. S. S. Iroquois. The government vessel is not likely to depart for Midway until July. She will take supplies for the marine guard at Midway.

DORIC BROKE HER RECORD

VESSEL ARRIVED THIS MORNING FROM ORIENT—SAILED FOR SAN FRANCISCO THIS EVENING.

With a new record for the run from Yokohama to Honolulu the S. S. Doric arrived off the port this morning from the Orient. She made the run from Yokohama in 9 days, 5 hours and 8 minutes which is 45 minutes better than her best previous record. The vessel left Hongkong April 10; Shanghai April 13; Nagasaki April 15; Kobe April 18 and Yokohama April 21. She experienced good weather from Yokohama.

Naturally there was the greatest possible interest among those aboard to learn news of the disaster at San Francisco. There were some San Francisco people aboard the vessel. Brief news of the disaster, decidedly misleading, had been learned at Yokohama and it was not until Honolulu was reached that the more complete news of the affair was learned.

The vessel has 870 tons of freight for this port. She brought 2 cabin passengers for Honolulu and has a good sized crowd of through passengers. Among the through passengers is Commander G. W. McElroy of the Navy who is returning from service on the Asiatic station.

Sir Hubert Jerningham is a member of Parliament. E. Faymonville is the vice president of the Firemen's Fund Insurance Company of San Francisco. He is going home after a business trip in the Orient.

W. J. D. Young is the ticket auditor of the O. and O. S. S. Company. He and his wife are going to San Francisco.

The Doric is scheduled to sail for San Francisco at 9 o'clock tonight from the Hackfeld wharf.

LOCKED IN THE VAULT JUST BUILT BY HIM FOR THE WATERHOUSE TRUST COMPANY.

As it was Mr. Harrison and his friend were behind the bars for thirty-five minutes.

Late Saturday evening Harrison accompanied by a friend went into the new vault just built for the Waterhouse Trust Company. Harrison went in first and his friend followed. Before Harrison could interfere his friend had let go of the door which shut the spring lock locking them in. Needless to say the men stopped inspecting the vault and began to wonder about getting out. The prospects were good that they would remain there until Monday morning by which time they would be slightly hungry to say the least. They

were helpless as they had nothing whatever to assist them in any way, and all attempts to escape seemed hopeless.

But as it happened P. J. Cross who is connected with the Wireless Telegraph Company happened to want something in the office. He proved to be their angel of mercy, for through him their escape was effected. First he went to the telephone and rang up E. M. Campbell of the Waterhouse Trust Company who phoned that he would be right down as the key to the door was locked in his desk.

As it happened however Harrison and his friend did not give up their schemes for escaping and finally they decided that if they had a screw-driver they could get out by taking off the locks of the door. Cross after some trouble found the necessary article and passed it to the prisoners through the bars. With it they made a speedy escape, and Mr. Campbell was informed that he need not come down. The men had been behind the bars just thirty-five minutes when released.

Trachoma Very Bad

LARGE NUMBER OF JAPANESE HELD AT THE IMMIGRATION STATION SENDING DIAGNOSIS.

Trachoma is again very prevalent among Japanese immigrants. The two last boats that have arrived from Japan with immigrants have brought an unusually heavy proportion of suspects. Thirty-five people suspected of being afflicted with this disease of the eyes were held up by the local immigration authorities from the batch that arrived by the S. S. Nippon Maru last week.

Today about 250 Japanese arrived by the S. S. Doric and out of this number 31 were refused a landing on suspicion that they had trachoma. Examinations of them will be made. In event of any of them being found affected, they will be deported to Japan by the next outward vessel.

CHARGED WITH SMUGGLING. Two men employed as water carriers about the Hackfeld wharf in connection with the discharge of the vessels, were arrested at the S. S. Doric this morning. They were charged with smuggling. They were alleged to have secreted a quantity of cigars about their clothes and were trying to get the stuff ashore from the British steamer.

MUIR BACK.

Mr. Muir, who has been in Fiji studying sugar cane pests and remedies therefor for the Planters' Association arrived this morning by the Maheno. He was not expected to day, as it was not thought that he could get accommodations of the crowded Maheno.
