Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 50 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 6 hours, 6 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE.—WEATHER BUREAU.

The following data, covering a period of 29 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month May for 29 years.

TEMPERATURE. (1890-1905.)

Mean or normal temperature, 75°.

The warmest month was that of 1895, with an average of 76°.

The coldest month was that of 1905, with an average of 73°.

The highest temperature was 87° on May 28, 1897.

The lowest temperature was 60°, on May 5 and 6, 1902.

PRECIPITATION (rain 1877-1894 and 1905.)

Average for the month, 2.27 inches.

Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 12.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 11.29 in 1885.

The least monthly precipitation was 0.23 inches in 1878.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 9.65 inches on May 16, 1885.

Dr. Brinkerhoff who has charge of the work of building the new Leprosy experiment station on Molokai, left today for a visit to the station that is to be. He has gone for the purpose of taking pictures of the different sites so that he can forward them to the authorities in Washington. He had had luck with his former pictures taken on his last trip and he goes prepared on this trip to take a large number so that there will be some good ones. The doctor does not know when he will return.

The plans of the new station are still being formulated. Such an undertaking as building a station that is to remain for many years must necessarily take much time. The doctor has not yet received replies to his first bunch of correspondence sent to Washington notifying the authorities of the changes which were necessary on account of the natural lay of the land.

HEAVY SHOWERS REPORTED IN KAU—MAUNA LOA ARRIVED THIS MORNING.

Hawaii has had considerable rain during the last week. The steamer Mauna Loa arrived this morning from her run to Maui and Hawaii ports with the news. Pleasant weather was experienced during the trip. Purser Friel reports that there have been very heavy showers in Kau, considerable rain in Kona, mauka, and also some rains in Hamakua.

The vessel brought a large assortment of freight, the largest in fact that she has landed here in many trips. She brought also a fair sized crowd of passengers.

The schooner Minnie E. Caine was loading sugar at Mahukona and was expected to depart tomorrow for San Francisco.

The steamer Nocuau arrived this morning from a special trip to Hanalei and Anahola. She brought back a cargo of sugar. Purser Wilberton reports rainy weather about Kauai.

Caughy of Auckland who is a delegate to the world's convention of the Y. M. C. A. At this convention a successor is to be elected as the head of the institution in the place of Sir George Williams the founder of the Y. M. C. A. now deceased.

TO HAND OVER CASH.
