Mrs. A. R. Arleigh and her daughter leave by the Sierra this afternoon, for a visit in California. Mele Kahalolei was arraigned before United States Judge Dole this morning on a charge of bigamy.

The gasoline launch Brothers returned last night with a crowd of sight-seers from Rabbit Island. Mrs. K. Pfeil sails by the Sierra this afternoon. She has been visiting her daughter Mrs. E. A. Berndt.

The ship Dirigo will be dispatched the end of the week with 5,500 tons of sugar for Delaware Breakwater. The steamers W. G. Hall, Likelike, Nooua, and Nihau depart this afternoon for various island ports.

The steamer Kinau departed today at noon for Hilo and way ports, with a fair sized crowd of passengers. The Promotion Committee meets this afternoon at 4 o'clock in their rooms in the Young building.

Valuable assistance was rendered at San Francisco during the disaster by the officers of the S. S. Sonoma. The steamer Mauna Loa departed at noon today for Maui and Hawaii ports with a small crowd of passengers.

The San Jose Mercury has a number of earthquake pictures which are reproductions of "photos by Davey." The Daughters of Hawaii will hold a meeting tomorrow morning at the residence of Mrs. Coney, at 10 o'clock. A reward of \$25 will be paid by Sheriff Brown for the return to his office of the gold watch with the initials M. H. on fob.

J. G. Rothwell was made a citizen of the United States this morning in the federal court, his sponsors being Marshall Hendry and F. T. P. Waterhouse. The regular bi-monthly meeting of the Honolulu Chamber of Commerce will be held tomorrow afternoon at 3 o'clock.

There will be a special meeting of the Woman's Guild of St. Clement's this afternoon at 3 o'clock in the parish house. The offices of the Union Oil Company burned in the San Francisco fire but the tanks and warehouses of the company are intact.

The S. S. Sierra arrived from the Colonies this morning with four passengers for this port.

Mrs. E. R. Stackable has received a cablegram from her husband, the Collector, who departed from Honolulu by the R. S. Manchuria, to the effect that the Manchuria had arrived at San Francisco Sunday afternoon.

Chickering and Gregory, attorneys in San Francisco sent notices to their friends here that they have established temporary offices on Washington street in Oakland. Mr. Chickering was at one time a teacher at Punahou. Mr. Gregory married the daughter of Judge Harry of Kauai.

Captain Jensen of the German bark Paul Isenberg will give a reception tomorrow evening at the rooms of the German school at half past seven. All the people belonging to the German church are cordially invited.

Judge Lindsay has summoned the following additional jurors: William Allen, Fred J. Smith, T. H. McKenzie, Thomas H. Kennedy, Richard Wadson, J. A. McConville, Frank J. Wallace, A. M. Mellis, T. W. Chase, Frank Darling, R. P. Boardman and E. F. Rice.

The old George Patterson cottage at Waikiki, just south of Kalaheua avenue and facing the Kapohani Park was totally destroyed, together with contents this morning, by fire. The cause of the fire is unknown. No one had been living in the place for some weeks as Mrs. Patterson was in town, owing to sickness. The loss will be at least \$1,500.

The contract calls for raising all of the various houses on the island from five to six feet. There are from 20 to 25 buildings that will have to be raised.

CONTRACT LET FOR MORE IMPROVEMETS

The contracts for raising the various buildings on Quarantine Island in order that the land can be reclaimed under the recent appropriation by Congress, has been let by Dr. L. E. Cofer (the head of the quarantine service in these islands). John Ouderkerk secured the contract which is for about \$7,000.

There are 12,000 tons of sugar on hand at the Railway warehouses awaiting shipment. No more will be received for the American-Hawaiian vessel until some introad has been made on this supply.

LOTS OF SUGAR ON HAND NOW

The S. S. American and S. S. Nebraskan are due here May 28 and 27 respectively from Seattle. The American will take about 5,000 tons and the other vessel will take about 1,400 tons. The Nebraskan goes to Kahului to complete the remainder of her load for San Francisco and the American goes to Kahului and Hilo to load 3,000 tons additional for Delaware Breakwater.

The ship Aeme will soon start to load 5,400 tons of sugar for the Breakwater and the bark Willcott and ship Hawaiian Isles will take on sugar stiffening to enable them to go to Kahului to load the bulk of their cargoes. Neither of these vessel are ready yet however, to load sugar.

The bark Edward May will haul over to the Railway wharf tomorrow to take on sugar ballast, to go to Makawell to load the bulk of her cargo for San Francisco.

STODDARD LOST HIS MANUSCRIPT

SAN JOSE, May 1—Charles Warren Stoddard, the well-known author, is at Congress Springs. The O'Connor Sanatorium, where he was residing at the time of the earthquake, passed unscathed through the shock. Two of Mr. Stoddard's books "For the Pleasure of His Company," and "The Footprints of the Padres," have gone up in smoke in San Francisco. So also has the manuscript of an unpublished volume of sketches, "Having rubbed out," Mr. Stoddard writes to the Chronicle representative "I may now begin again."

The Argonaut of San Francisco is being published under difficulties in this city. Jerome Hart, the proprietor, is at the Clark residence, the home of his wife. He saved one book containing a list of subscribers. Mrs. Hart owns a piece of property opposite the Fairmont, upon which she proposes to build at once.
