

## ANARCHISTS ESCAPED HERE

PECULIAR ESCAPE OF THREE RUSSIAN PRISONERS FROM THE TRANSPORT SHERMAN—NOT ALLOWED TO LAND IN AMERICA. THEY WERE BEING RETURNED TO THE ORIENT AS STOWAWAYS AND GOT AWAY YESTERDAY.

There are three Russians alleged anarchists in town, escapes from the transport Sherman, who are said to have been not allowed to land in America on account of their undesirable character. Their escape from the transport Sherman was under very peculiar circumstances, and is a good deal of a mystery.

The three men got out of the brig yesterday in some unknown manner and got ashore, and the steamer left without them. They had been carried all the way from the Orient to San Francisco, to Seattle and back here, the intention being to take them back to

Japan where they had stowed away, but in some way or other, with the assistance of some outsider, they got away here.

That they were regarded as important prisoners is shown by the fact the officer responsible for them made a personal offer of a hundred dollars for their recapture. Just before the transport sailed. It is also said that the national authorities on the Mainland had information regarding them and that President Roosevelt was in part responsible for instructions that they be not allowed to land at San Francisco, but instead be returned to the Orient.

## Fusion Is Assured

WHAT COL. CURTIS P. IAUKEA SAYS ABOUT POLITICAL CONDITIONS ON THE BIG ISLAND.

"Fusion between the Democrats and Home Rulers is an assured condition on the island of Hawaii," said Col. Curtis P. Iaukea yesterday. "I returned last Saturday from a three weeks tour of the Big Islands. During that trip I visited every district in the island and in every district is the sentiment in favor of fusion predominating. The sentiment of the people on that island, and especially the Home Rulers, was that they would not allow the Honolulu people to dictate to them in the matter and that they would conduct their own affairs.

"I have been given to understand that the delegates to the coming Home Rule Territorial convention which meets in July, are to be instructed to favor fusion with the Democrats. Efforts have been made by prominent Home Rulers on this island, to persuade the Home Rulers on Hawaii not to fuse but the indications are that these efforts will be fruitless. There is the utmost feeling of cordiality among the Democrats and Home Rulers of Hawaii. In some places they have joined the game precinct club and have divided the offices, a Democrat being president for instance and a Home Ruler vice president. The prospects are very bright, so far as the big island is concerned.

"I did not advise the people to support Kubio for renomination. Fusion in that respect was not a matter that I was concerned with. I was asked by Hawaiian Democrats to go to Hawaii to make a tour of the island in the interest of fusion and the general proposition of fusion as regards the delegate was not the object of my trip. That is a matter that will be discussed by the territorial conventions. I told them that I was not to be a candidate for delegate.

## BAND BOYS AT CAMP M'KINLEY

ALL THE MEMBERS OF THE BAND ARE QUARTERED AT THE CAMP CANTEN OF CAMP M'KINLEY.

All of the band boys are quartered at Camp McKinley awaiting the sailing of the S. S. Korea tomorrow. They have been there since yesterday noon.

The boys are quartered in the Camp Canteen about half of which building is given over to their use. Each member of the band has a cot to himself and is provided with a mosquito net. At the canteen one can buy soft drinks and the like, while their sustenance is furnished them. Joe Cohen made arrangements with Major Van Vliet for quartering the boys here while waiting for their steamer. The boys who are married have been given more private quarters. The boys amuse themselves by giving concerts and the like.

## COURT AIDS SAILING SHIP

JUDGE DERBY DECIDES TO TRY ASSAULT CASE IMMEDIATELY NOT TO DETAIN DIRIGO.

Jim Davis the second mate of the ship Dirigo was arrested this afternoon on warrant charging him with assault and battery. The warrant was issued on complaint of James Thomas a negro sailor on the vessel.

Judge Derby decided to take up the case immediately as the vessel was ready for sea and if the case were not held until tomorrow, an unnecessary delay in her departure would occur. It is expected that she will be able to get away for Delaware Breakwater this afternoon.

The boys will be brought in tomorrow morning as the Korea sails at noon.

## BEST TO ERR ON THE SIDE OF MERCY

ACTING GOVERNOR ATKINSON ON THE KOREAN COMMUTATIONS— EVIDENCE SHOWS THE TWO SAVED FROM HANGING LESS GUILTY THAN THE REST AND THE EXECUTIVE FEELS THAT THE RECORD STILL SHOWS MUCH SEVERITY.

"It was better to err if at all on the side of mercy," said Acting Governor Atkinson today in discussing his action with regard to the Koreans whose sentences he commuted. "I can only say that I used my best judgment. The evidence in the case certainly shows much less guilt on the part of the two men commuted. One of them actually used violence to stop the crime at one time,—he took a stick away from a man who was using it to beat the victim, and broke it up.

"It is a serious matter to have the responsibility for human lives, and though criticisms may be passed, I am satisfied with what I did. As I have said, it is best to feel that there was too much leniency rather than that we took lives unjustly, and after all there is not much sign of leniency in administration of the law when we hang three men and give two others fifteen years hard labor for the murder of one."

## MURDERERS' ROW FILLS UP AGAIN

TWO KOREANS TAKEN FROM THE DEATH WATCH TO HARD LABOR GANGS AND THEIR PLACES ARE IMMEDIATELY FILLED BY TWO OTHER MEN UNDER DEATH SENTENCE, BROUGHT FROM HAWAII THIS MORNING.

After a month under the death watch from their gloomy murderers' cells this morning and they saw the light of day again, as fifteen year term convicts. High Sheriff Henry had them dressed in the garb of long term men and put to work this morning. They vacated their cells just in time, for Murders' Row was overcrowded and two more men under death sentence arrived by the Mauna Loa this morning. The Row is full again and the death watches pace to and fro guarding eight condemned men, four of whose dates of execution have already been fixed.

"The two reprieved men received the news of their commutation calmly," said the high sheriff this morning. "They seemed to think fifteen years a long time. As far as I am concerned I feel that the action of the executive

was right. It seems that the records from Hilo and the letter of defendant's counsel operated to give a wrong impression of the case. A study of the complete transcript placed the matter in a different light."

The gallows will be erected in the yard of the prison early tomorrow morning, for the execution of the three Koreans remaining under death sentence. The warrants provide for their execution at any time between the hours of eight and five, and the high sheriff intends to proceed with the matter after eight o'clock. The men will be allowed such religious attendance as they desire.

The two murderers to arrive this morning are Okumoto and Lorenzo Colon, Japanese and Porto Rican, convicted at the recent term of the Kailua circuit court. The death warrants in their cases have not yet been signed.

## THE PRECINCTS

Acting Governor Atkinson says that the precinct matter is to be taken up by him again and it is not at all settled that there will be no changes in the precinct boundaries. "I stated to the County Committee that I had not acted in the matter," said the executive, "and that statement is true. It is a fact that the office force has been at work upon new maps, under general instructions to go ahead with such preparations, but I have not yet personally gone over their plans. It was therefore not just for the County committee to criticize me as if I had already acted."

In the window of M. McNerny's establishment on the corner of Fort and Merchant streets is a group picture of the members of the National Republican committee. Among them is A. G. M. Robertson.

## TO DELAY DIRIGO

It is likely that the ship Dirigo will not depart on time this afternoon for Delaware Breakwater. A warrant was sworn out just before she was to be towed out, against the second mate charging him with assault and battery. One of the sailors swore to the complaint.
