BOARD OF IMPEACHMENT FAIL TO FINISH CASE LAST EVENING.

The Board of Impeachment met last evening and resumed the case of trying George Kekauoha for malfeasance in office.

Those present were Chairman George W. Smith, Supervisors, Moore, Archer, Paule, Cox, Lucas and Moore.

Judge Waihana resumed the stand and was cross examined by the county attorney. He told of the happenings in his court at Laie.

Eddie Peters an eight year old boy in whose custody it was said that Kekauoha left the Japanese murderer was called to the stand. He said that there were other guards beside him with the Japanese. He was simply playing around the house.

Charles Cash an employ of the Telephone Company was called. He testified that the Japanese prisoner was guarded by a man. This rather shattered the evidence that the murderer was left unguarded.

Kaahue the man who was said to be in charge of the prisoner was called. He testified he was in charge of the prisoner at the time Sheriff Brown and Chester Doyle came to the place. He testified further that Brown had asked him if he was guarding the prisoner. Hamana was called to the stand. He corroborated the statement of Kaahue, as regards the guarding of the prisoner.

Sam Lua was the next witness called. He testified that Kekauoha called at the church to get him to serve on a coroner's jury.

The Board adjourned until Monday evening at 7:30 o'clock.

Korean Claim Proves False

FIVE KOREANS ARRESTED FOR GAMBLING—FOUND IT WAS A TRUMPED UP SCHEME.

LIHUE, Kauai, May 28.—Sheriff Rice went over to Kapaa last Wednesday to investigate the charges brought against the police in Kawaihau district by five Koreans, one of whom was arrested the previous week for gambling.

The Korean in question was at the time convicted and sentenced to pay a fine of \$20 and costs. After the case some other Koreans claimed to have been robbed by the police of \$105 which they claimed to have left on the floor, when the police came. The sheriff was notified and went over to look into the matter. The amount lost had by this time been changed to \$150 and this circumstance gave it a very fishy appearance. The investigation was not successful owing to the fact that no interpreter was available at least not a competent man. The matter was therefore left for a week, until a satisfactory one could be secured.

With assistance of County Attorney Willard and the interpreter the accused and his witnesses were thoroughly examined. At first they stuck to the story told last week but soon began to tell different versions. Besides the accused nobody remembered having seen any money on the floor. There might have been 25 cents or a dollar in the game, but they had not seen anything left behind, and gradually the whole story evaporated.

The five Koreans who at the examination had admitted that they were gambling were arrested and brought before Judge Kevelo, who sentenced the whole lot to fifteen days in jail—Garden Island.


