TO BETTER BASE BALL

THE TRUSTEES FAILED TO REACH AN AGREEMENT THIS NOON AND WILL MEET AGAIN.

The trustees of the baseball grounds met this noon to discuss the advisability of allowing the winter league to use the ball grounds on Sundays during the winter for the games played by the league.

It is thought that if the league obtains the grounds that it will materially benefit baseball in the islands.

The teams yesterday met, with the exception of the Kaimosi and Punaluu and adopted resolutions favoring the letting of the grounds to the winter league as it was thought that this would raise baseball to a higher level in Honolulu.

After a lengthy discussion the trustees decided to call a meeting of the entire league tomorrow at 5 o'clock so that the other two teams would be allowed to express their views. The trustees will meet with the league this afternoon and the matter will be further discussed.

Some of the trustees do not favor the idea of baseball games being played on Sunday and this may stop the entire proceedings.

It is thought that a settlement will be reached this afternoon.

SLATTERY TO 'FRISCO

LOCAL OFFICER WILL GO TO SAN FRANCISCO FOR EXAMINATIONS AND TO REPORT TO COL. HEUER

Lieut. J. R. Slattery is to leave for the coast on June 10. He goes to take examination on fortification matters there which the United States government requires of experts on such matters at stated times.

To take the examination is the principal reason for the visit of Lieut. Slattery to the coast but while he is there he will report to Colonel Heuer on the locations chosen by Major General Story a few days ago for the coast defenses at Pearl Harbor. Col. Heuer was to have visited Honolulu with General Story but was unable to do so. Col. Heuer is the senior officer of the United States Engineering corps for this district.

The Troquois which goes to Midway today will carry the plant which Lieut. Slattery intends to install there soon. The Lieutenant will not go to Midway until July after he returns from the coast.

PAPERS BROUGHT TO BE FILED AWAY

MR. LYDECKER, IN CHARGE OF ARCHIVES, RETURNED FROM HILO WITH PAPERS

Robert C. Lydecker, who has charge of the archives of the government, returned Saturday from Hilo where he went to obtain the government records from that place. He brought a great number of these back with him.

Mr. Lydecker this morning stated that he thought that a great many of the valuable papers which were in Hilo were destroyed when the new police station was built there some years ago. All of the old papers which were in the garret of the old court house were removed to the new station and a great number of them were burned by the people who had charge of the removal because they were so old and rat-eaten that they were thought to be of no account. Mr. Lydecker thinks that in this manner the government lost some very valuable papers and records of early history of the islands. The papers which Mr. Lydecker brought back with him from Hilo are of a much later period.

Mr. Lydecker has not thoroughly examined his latest bunch of manuscripts as he has not had the time. Two months will be required for the purpose.

It was thought that the new quarters would be ready for occupancy next month, but at the present rate of progress the building will not be ready for two or three months. After that is completed the work of filing the papers away will begin.

Mr. Lydecker has such an abundance of material on hand than some years must elapse before it can be properly sorted and filed away for safe keeping. He has found it necessary to make an index of his indices in order to keep the matter straight.

ISLAND STEAMER DEPARTING. The Kinaiu and Mauna Loa departed at noon today on their respective runs. Large crowds departed by both boats. A number of those departing were children from Kamehameha Schools who are going home for their summer vacations.

HONOLULU IS SUPPLYING FRISCO

SPECIAL RUSH SHIPMENT OF 50 TONS OF CORRUGATED IRON ROOFING SENT ON ENTERPRISE

Honolulu is supplying San Francisco with some of its building materials. By the S. S. Enterprise the firm of T. H. Davies & Company, shipped 50 tons of corrugated iron to their branch house in San Francisco. The branch office cabled to the local firm for that amount of corrugated material, as it has been sold to buyers in San Francisco for the purpose evidently of erecting some temporary structures in the wholesale district of the city. The value of the shipment was \$5000. The material covers a space of 96,000 square feet and will be sufficient to erect several large warehouses or other structures.
