YACHT RACE STARTS

LA PALOMA CROSSES THE LINE FIRST

(Associated Press Cable to The Star.)

SAN PEDRO, June 11.—The great trans-Pacific Yacht race for the trophy offered by the Hawaii Yacht Club was started at noon today from this place.

La Paloma left her anchorage at 11:30. She was followed shortly afterwards by the Anemone and the Lurline. All the yachts passed the Judges who are B. B. Gregory and W. B. Sylvester, and who were stationed on the end of the Breakwater. They reported to the Starter Judge A. Lester.

The first preliminary gun was fired at 11:30 o'clock. The Lurline came up first, and La Paloma a moment later, jockeying for position. The Anemone did not leave her anchorage until later.

The Starting gun was fired at noon.

La Paloma lay directly behind the starting line, and crossed first.

The Lurline crossed close behind, and the Anemone at 12:04 1/2.

The wind has freshened from six miles an hour to fifteen.

The Anemone has begun to pick up the distance which La Paloma and the Lurline had gained at the start.

La Paloma is laying to the windward of the Lurline, which seemed to be drawing away when the yachts passed out of sight.

The scene at the start of the race was magnificent. The day was ideal. All the yachts of the South Coast were present, and some of the larger yachts followed the racers far out to sea.

The following are the yachts entered: The Lurline, once owned by Commodore John D. Spreckels, is now owned by H. H. Sinclair; a sturdy boat and well used to showing her heels (for so sailors phrase it) to her rivals. She is 83 feet over all and is full 21 feet beam.

La Paloma is a Honolulu boat of some forty-five tons burden and but 49 feet in length, but a cracking good sailer in fair or stormy weather. She is owned by Clarence L. Macfarlane.

The Anemone is an auxiliary boat of 116 feet length which came all the way from New York to contest for the handsome trophy. She is ketch rigged and her length is supposed to give her an advantage, although there will be a handicap of one hour to reach foot of length. She is owned by Charles L. Tutt.

As there is a vast difference in the size of the yachts it was agreed that for each foot of length one hour would be allowed for each foot of difference between the yachts. Therefore it is possible that if the La Paloma is the last one sighted she may be the winner of the race.

The finish will be off the Diamond Head light house where a lookout will be stationed day and night. As soon as the yacht is reported she will proceed leisurely to the harbor.

It is to be arranged by the committee in charge of the affair for the blowing of five long blasts of the whistle when the first yacht is sighted.

HAWAIIANS HOLDING CANOE RACES

BIG CROWD AT AQUATIC EVENTS TODAY OFF KALIHU UNDER AUSPICES OF KAMEHAMEHA CLUB.

The Kamehameha Aquatic Club is holding sports today at Kahakaulana. The events is the first celebration of the kind in the history of the organization. It is especially interesting, and typical of the day from the fact that the sports are Hawaiian entirely. Native canoe races predominate on the program of sports. There are paddling and sailing canoe races. The sailing race is for the championship of the Hawaiian Islands. The event has to be won three times by the same entry before the silver cup passes from the control of the club. Money prizes are also offered.

There will be lots of general aquatic sports on the program in addition to the big canoe features. Prince David Kawananakoa is connected with the club, but owing to his absence in Kohala attending the ceremonies of the opening of the Kohala Ditch, he was unable to be present. The sports at Kahakaulana started shortly after 9 o'clock and continued until after the noon hour. A big luau of which the public generally partook was served following the races. Sports were resumed in the afternoon. A large number of people went from Honolulu to attend the sports.

A luau will be served this evening about 6 o'clock when the contestants and officials of the event will participate. The prizes will then be distributed.

MRS. PARKER FORMALLY OPENS THE KOHALA DITCH

(Special Wireless to The Star.)

KOHALA, Hawaii, June 11.—The Kohala Ditch, which has been under construction for more than a year, was formally opened here this morning by Mrs. Abigail Campbell Parker, who has backed the enterprise, with her own fortune.

There is present an immense crowd, which in addition to the many who arrived by the Kinau yesterday, includes people from all over the Island of Hawaii who have come to take part in this epoch making ceremony.

The Hilo Band is in attendance furnishing the music. Speeches were made by John Hind, Col. Samuel Parker, Abram Lewis, Jr., Secretary of the Territory, Atkinson, and Land Commissioner Pratt.

The ditch is now running water in the volume of 20,000,000 gallons a day. It will supply irrigation for ten thousand acres of cane now in cultivation and in addition for a vast area of cane land now lying uncultivated.

The day is a gala day for this district, and the most intense interest centers in the formal opening of the ditch.

The Kohala Ditch, which was thus formally opened today in Kohala with much ceremony, has for its purpose the collection and conservation of the waters of the windward side of the Kohala mountains, to the westward of Waipio Gulch, and conveying it to the Kohala plantations to the westward, to be there used for fluming and irrigation.

The ditch project had its inception soon after the annexation of the islands. A great many surveys were made and negotiations were entered into with the government and with the Bishop estate for the right to construct the ditch and use the water. There was a good deal of controversy over the form of the franchise or license under which the company should operate, and the matter got into congress and was ultimately settled, as to its fundamental legal propositions by a ruling of the department of the Interior.

Rival interests after a while struggled for the franchise, and finally, this, in the shape of a fifty year license was sold at auction, the interests represented by John T. McCrosson and Col. Sam Parker being the successful bidders. The license provides that the Territory may at any time purchase the ditch by giving notice of its intention to do so and complying with the conditions set forth in the license.

The financing of the enterprise was largely accomplished through Mrs. Campbell Parker's efforts, some of the San Francisco banks taking the enterprise up.
