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MANGOES ARE BADLY AFFECTED

PEST SO BAD, SAYS CRAW, THAT IT IS USELESS TO FIGHT IT.

Alexander Crow, entomologist, made a report to the Board of Agriculture and Forestry yesterday. After reporting new arrivals and quarantine work, Crow told of a mango weevil, which has become so prevalent here that he declared it useless to attempt to stamp it out. The report says:

"During 1905, Mr. D. L. Van Dine first called public attention to this beetle on Oahu, but previous to that Mr. S. G. Wilder called the attention of his brother, Gerritt, to a beetle found by him in a mango seed from Moanalua, which he submitted to Prof. R. C. L. Perkins of the Hawaiian Sugar Planters' Association. Mr. Van Dine estimated that sixty per cent of the fruit was attacked, which indicated that the beetle had been here for some time. An elderly Hawaiian living at the head of a small valley we visited informed us that he found the beetle three seasons ago. As mangoes have been freely sold and distributed from the infected districts, I fear that it has now been scattered over this island and probably carried to others of the group. As the mango trees loaded with fruit in the infected district overhanging the public thoroughfare and at district school is located in the midst every facility has been given for the pest's distribution. Our inspection extended from Palama valley in Honolulu to within a mile of Pearl City, wherein we found the pest, so I feel confident from the large size of the trees and character of the soil and underground that it will be impossible to stamp it out of the Territory, even by the destruction of the present or two succeeding crops, so on that account I would not advise your Board to expend any money in the attempt.

While the weevil is found inside there is no evidence of where it entered and no damage appears to be inflicted upon the fruit other than destroying the germination of the seed. "In my last report to you I referred to the receipt of several beneficial insects from Prof. Koebele, which were turned over to Mr. Kotinsky for propagation. The past two weeks he has liberated two colonies out of doors and has others in breeding jars in the office. "Respectfully yours, "ALEXANDER CRAW, "Superintendent of Entomology and Inspector."

LUCAS BROTHERS GET OAHU CONTRACT

PUT IN THE LOWEST BID AND AGREE TO FINISH THE WORK IN 270 DAYS FROM TIME OF AWARD.

Bids for the construction of two dormitories and a refectory building for Oahu College were opened yesterday. Bids were submitted as follows, first for the construction of both boys' and girls' dormitories and second, for the construction of both the dormitories and the refectory.

ASSIGNMENTS OF CASES.
The following order was made by the circuit judges yesterday:

"It is hereby ordered that all equity, probate, divorce, jury-waived cases triable in vacation, and all other cases and matters, of whatever kind or character, coming on for hearing, trial, or other disposition, subsequent to the termination of the April, 1906, term of this court, and until and including the 14th day of August, 1906, shall be and are hereby assigned and transferred to the Hon. W. J. Robinson, third judge of this court, who is hereby authorized and empowered to hear and determine, try or otherwise dispose of all said cases and matters coming on for hearing, trial or other disposition, during said period of time; and that all equity, probate, divorce, jury-waived cases triable in vacation, and all other cases and matters, of whatever kind or character, coming on for hearing, trial or other disposition, from and including the 15th day of August, 1906, to and including the commencement of the September, 1906, term of this court, shall be and are hereby assigned and transferred to the Hon. John T. De Bolt, first judge of this court, who is hereby authorized and empowered to hear and determine, try, or otherwise dispose of all said matters and cases coming on for hearing, trial or other disposition, during said last-mentioned period of time.

THE NEW MAUI SUPERVISOR

Governor Carter was not happy in his choice of a supervisor for Hana district to succeed the late J. H. Hualani. There is nothing against Henry Reuter, but his qualifications are not those of a county supervisor. The governor may have gotten him confused with his brother M. H. Reuter, the Deputy Tax Assessor of Hono, who is more of the County Supervisor calibre than his brother Henry. However the choice of the people was W. P. Hala and the governor made a great, big mistake in not appointing him. The fact that a number of legislators have been holding the office of county supervisors in different parts of the Territory ever since the beginning of County government, rather weakens the governor's stand in this case, and further it is evident that Mr. Hala will not sit in the house again as his term is just about up.
