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THE LA PALOMA COMES IN ALEAK BUT GAME SAILED ALMOST 6,000 MILES

THE STURDY ISLAND ENTRY CROSSED THE FINISHING LINE LAST NIGHT—HAS SAILED NEARLY 6,000 MILES SINCE LEAVING HERE TWO MONTHS AND A HALF A GO—CHRONOMETER WENT WRONG AND YACHT GOT OUT OF HER COURSE.

La Paloma, Hawaii's representative in the trans-Pacific Ocean Yacht Race, crossed the finishing line last night at 11:35 p. m., and finished third and last in the race. Her time was 15 days, 11 hours and 35 minutes.

The La Paloma had a hard trip down, having to ball something like 180 gallons of water per day from her hold. The third day out she encountered a gale and could not carry her mainsail for fear that it would be carried away. Aside from that the trip was a pleasant one and fairly good time was made. The little yacht as she lies alongside of the other yachts looks like a model and not like a challenger.

The La Paloma was not only short-handed in coming down but was also

very foul. Captain Macfarlane expected to put her on the ways in San Pedro and have her cleaned, but as she drew too much water it could not be done. He also had engaged another sailor, but he backed out at the last moment and could not come. Under these handicaps however the plucky little craft entered the race and made remarkable time for her.

Last evening when the La Paloma was reported as crossing the line about midnight a large party gathered at Young Brothers' boat house to go out and welcome the yacht. They went out and failed to find her, although they cruised about for nearly two hours.

COURT QUOTES HUMORIST

SUPREME JUSTICES ASK MANY QUESTIONS OF COUNSEL ACQUIRING THE KAPIOLANI PARK TEST CASE—COUNTY APPROPRIATIONS FOR A PARK OVER WHICH THE COUNTY HAS NO CONTROL ARE CALLED IN QUESTION.

Justice Hartwell quoted Artemus Ward to counsel in the Kapiolani Park funds case in the Supreme Court this morning, during the argument over the question of whether the County of Oahu has power to appropriate funds for the park. His Honor was discussing with Attorney General Peters the character of "holding" of the park by the County, under which it could be claimed that the County had control over it, justifying expenditure of County money. Peters suggested that the County did "hold" the park in a certain sense, enabling it to make appropriations for it.

Justice Hartwell didn't seem to think there was much holding, acquiring or leasing of the property, which, as a matter of fact, is the property of the Territory and is under the control of a territorial board. He suggested that it was a reminder of Artemus Ward's hero, who held a bear captive by firmly maintaining his nose between the animal's teeth.

The entire argument was replete with questions from the bench, all the three justices asking numerous questions of both Peters and County Attorney Douthitt. Justice Hartwell asked some

questions of counsel which indicated that he was not disposed to favor the idea that the County could set aside its money for a concern over which it had no control at all.

Justice Wilder questioned Douthitt about the bond. He wanted to know how it was that County appropriations were considered legal for the bond and for other parks not County property. Douthitt side-stepped by saying that the question didn't matter in the Kapiolani Park case, but also stated in answer to questions that the bond had been made a County institution.

The discussion appeared to turn largely on the question of the powers of the supervisors to appropriate money for a park which they have not acquired and over which they have no control. The argument was finished by noon, and the matter was submitted.

The suit is a test case, to decide whether the supervisors may continue to allow money for the park, as they did for some months. Pending a decision no more money is being allowed. If the Board's power is sustained the appropriations will be resumed, it is understood, and the Kunst beach lot will be improved.

EXPECT MANGA REVA TO MAKE THE RECORD

SOME LOCAL PEOPLE SEEM TO THINK THAT BOAT NOW AT KAAANAPALI WILL BEAT RECORD

A great deal of interest is being taken to local seafaring and shipping people over the showing that will be made by the sailing fleet bound to the Atlantic seaboard this season. The ship Erskine M. Phelps, the "White Flyer" was the first to arrive from Honolulu. She made the run in 105 days which is very fast time. The bark Nuuanu arrived June 17 at the Breakwater 132 days from Kaaanapali.

It is predicted by many that the ship Manga Reva now at Kaaanapali will make the record run for the season. She made it last season with 109 days, while the Phelps took over 130 days. Still the Phelps has just set a mark that will be very difficult to beat.

The ship Hawaiian Isles which left Kahului last week made the run last year to the Breakwater in 119 days. She had the second best passage.

WHO ARE AGENTS FOR HIND ROLPH?

JUDGE DOLE TAKES UP A QUESTION OF SERVICE IN LIBEL RECENTLY FILED.

United States Judge Dole this morning took up the libel case of Lawwell-H, whose name means "take little" and is the subject of considerable joking as to its application to the result of his suit, against the Hind, Rolph & Company. Lewis, Jr., for Bellant, on questions of admission of evidence, while Low sat in the witness box and enjoyed the oratory.

The log of the La Paloma will also be sent out to all of the clubs in America and England.

COAL SHORTAGE AT MAKEAWELI

ALEXANDER & BALDWIN BOUGHT 2,000 TONS FOR JUNE DELIVERY BUT CARGO HAS NOT ARRIVED.

There is a shortage of coal at Makeaweli and in consequence Alexander & Baldwin are making special shipments of fuel by the island steamers. The plantation is short about 2,000 tons of coal. The firm ordered a cargo of 2,000 tons of coal for June delivery by the ship Emily Reed. Instead of giving the plantation June delivery its gets May loading. The result is that the boat is now only 25 days out from Newcastle, bound for Makeaweli and is not expected to reach her Kuaial destination before the latter part of July. Coal has therefore to be sent from Honolulu.

The steamer Niihau has made several trips to Makeaweli recently with coal and the steamer Iwaini goes out tomorrow afternoon on a special trip to Makeaweli with coal. Other island steamers will operate at intervals with coal cargoes until the arrival of the belated coal vessel.

GOUVEIA NOT IN CONTEMPT

ESCAPES JUDICIAL WRATH BECAUSE THE SUIT AGAINST HIM WAS WITHDRAWN.

Frank Gouveia, who was before Judge Lindsay this morning on a citation for contempt for failing to pay attorney's fees in the divorce suit brought against him recently, was discharged because it was found that the case had lost jurisdiction of the court by the dismissal of the suit. He was apparently in contempt all right, if, as appeared, he had failed to pay the alimony. But Mrs. Gouveia had withdrawn her suit and the whole proceeding had been dropped. Judge Gear claimed that this caused the court to lose all jurisdiction, and the court agreed with this view. A. G. Correa was the attorney to whom the fee had been ordered paid.

YACHTSMEN TO BE SHOWN GOOD TIME

PLANS ALL ON FOOT TO SHOW THE VISITING YACHTSMEN A GOOD TIME WHILE THEY ARE HERE.

The plans for the entertainment of the visiting yachtsmen are all on foot and the expectations are that they will be run off without a hitch. This afternoon the visitors are all to be taken out around Diamond Head in Automobiles and back over the city. They are to see everything to be seen from the Museum to the Aquarium. What cannot be reached today will be shown to them tomorrow.

On Saturday afternoon the yachtsmen will be taken to Honolulu Plantation and will be shown how sugar is made. After they have inspected the mills and the refinery they will be taken to Aiea where they will be met by gasoline launches and taken to Pearl Harbor.

A huge luau is planned for the evening of the 30th. A special train will be on hand to bring them in from the harbor.

On Sunday all of the visitors will return to Pearl City where all of the yachts of the Hawaii Yacht Club will be on hand. The visitors will be taken for a cruise about the harbor and will be brought back to Honolulu late Sunday evening.

The directors of the Hawaii Yacht Club will meet this afternoon at 5 o'clock at McInerney's Shoe Store and will make further arrangements for the entertainment of the yachtsmen.

MARINES HIKING AWAY TODAY.

A force of 39 marines under command of Lieutenant Bigler left the naval station barracks this morning for a practice march to Ahulimau on the other side of the island. They will camp out until Friday and return in the afternoon to this place. The men who had been at Midway as the marine guard accompany the expedition.

VENTURA DUE AT ANY TIME.

The S. S. Ventura is due any time from San Francisco. She sailed five hours late from San Francisco and ought to have made port before this hour.

QUAKES TERRIFY WALES

CARDIFF, Wales, June 27.—Earthquakes were felt throughout South Wales this morning at 8:43 o'clock. Many houses were damaged and hundreds of chimneys fell to the ground. Occupants of dwellings were thrown down by the force of the earthquake. A panic ensued. All of the collieries have been deserted by the miners. No deaths resulted from the earthquakes.

TO MANDAMUS PRATT

Attorney C. W. Ashford this afternoon secured a writ of mandamus against Land Commissioner Pratt, in behalf of the Thompson Settlement Association of Hawaii, to compel the land commissioner to open about 1100 acres of land in Naalehu, in accordance with the petition of Thompson and others. The petitioners asked for the land some time ago, each members of the association wanting about 100 100 acres. Pratt offered to open the lands on a basis of about 25 acres for each applicant, and refused to open it on the larger basis. The petitioners claim that he has no right to limit them and will test the matter in court. Judge De Bolt signed an alternative writ returnable July 7. The petitioners, applicants for the land, are, L. S. Thompson, Lon H. Rogers, S. E. Rogers, P. C. Eaton, C. G. Macumber, Thomas Martin, B. H. Taylor, G. C. Hewitt, G. J. Green, L. K. Auld, J. B. Jones, John Kekuna.




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PRECINCT CHANGES
