CONVICTIONS IN RIOT CASES

DISBARRED ATTORNEY MILLS IS FINED \$250 AND JACOB COERPER THE SAME.

Deputy Attorney General Prosser returned this morning from Kohala where he has been trying the riot cases. In two of the cases he has been successful. Henry T. Mills and Jacob Coerper were each fined \$250. Judge Mathewmann presided at the trial. The other cases which were on the calendar all received a change of venue.

The riot cases grew out of a dispute over the ownership of the Kona school-house, the claimants forbiddingly taking possession and arming themselves to retain it. When the district magistrate tried to interfere he was threatened with a revolver. The Attorney General's Department, by sending Prosser to the scene, got possession and subsequently there were thirteen indictments for riot, besides several for assault and battery and assaults with weapons, some of the defendants being among the most prominent residents in the district.

Mills, who was convicted, is the attorney who was recently disbarred by the Supreme Court, for alleged unprofessional conduct in connection with the circulation of a petition for a liquor license.

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Everybody Should Have Stone House

LOCAL BUILDING MATERIAL SUCCESSFULLY MANUFACTURED BY CONTRACTOR WALKER.

Contractor John Walker has been experimenting for some months with the making of stone building blocks from local material, and with the aid of an imported machine he is now making the first hollow stone blocks ever made here. Hollow blocks are a comparatively new thing in building, but they have rapidly been recognized as of much greater value than solid blocks, and are being generally used in large buildings. Owing to the cheapness of the local blocks, and their beauty and strength, Walker thinks they will eventually almost revolutionize local residence building.

The blocks are being made on Walker's place on Pihok street, makai of King, where he has already put up a handsome stone fence, which has the appearance of fine English sandstone. In this place of work are many samples of the blocks, of various sizes and with various "faces," stamped instead of cut out. The blocks have been tested in fire and water. In some of them, there is sand imported from California, but Hawaiian sand has also been used with success, and Walker expects to go a big business in the manufacture of building material.

Everybody ought to have a handsome stone dwelling, according to Walker, for he says that with the local material the difference between a stone house and a wooden one is only about fifteen per cent, whereas the stone is of course more lasting, and with the fine sandstone appearance and an artistic face, it makes very attractive-looking buildings. Crushed rock from local quarries, and cement, are most of the ingredients of the blocks.

"It has been found that the hollow blocks have far greater power to resist fire," said the contractor. "There is always air in the center, and this undoubtedly accounts for it. Experience has shown that the large buildings which stand the best in case of disaster of any kind, are those composed of these hollow blocks, bound by steel."

Walker's block-making is the first of the kind attempted here and his experiment has attracted considerable interest.

Counties Have Been A Success

HAWAII HERALD SAYS WORK HAS BEEN BETTER DONE AT SMALLER COST.

HILO, August 2.—The Herald says: "Without going into the matter of the figuring at all and accepting it in the meantime as correct, it is safe to say that even at that the County of Hawaii will be satisfied that County Government is a success. Never before have the roads of this island been so well looked after. Never before have public works been attended to with due regard for expedition and economy. Never before have funds collected on this island been applied to this island's needs and, while mistakes have been made by supervisors whose duties were unfamiliar to them, there has been a steady improvement all along the line.

"The trouble with Carter is that he does not see the real reason that the expenses of the Government are larger. The beam is altogether in his own eyes. Despite the fact that there have been erected forms of government in the different counties charged with the care of roads, for instance, the Territorial Department of Public Works remains, incompetent as ever, with the same staff of high-salaried individuals. Just how useless that department is, Hilo has good cause to know. Incidentally Oahu has been winking up to it recently. With County Government the different County Attorneys became deputies to the Attorney General, but did Governor Carter suggest the cutting down of expenses in the Attorney General's Department? Certainly not, there are still four deputies. These are merely samples of Carter's ideas of the encouragement and practice of economy, though it might be added that he thinks that his cousin in the Education department should have an assistant, doubtless at a good round salary."

Sterling of Piedmont was recently announced appeared before "Cupid" William Zambresky of the county clerk's office this morning but did not secure a license because he admitted that he was but 19 years of age and he did not have the written consent of either of his parents.

Both Mr. Cunha and his intended bride are prominent socially, and it was only two weeks ago that the engagement was announced, at which time nothing was said of an early marriage. Until recently he was a student at the University of California where he was a member of the class of 1908, well known socially and as an athlete. He plays on the Freshman football team of his class. Cunha was also prominent as a fraternity man. Of late Cunha has been connected with one of the allied corporations of the Realty Syndicate.

Miss Sterling is the daughter of the late Dr. George Sterling and a niece of Frank C. Havens of the Realty Syndicate. George Sterling, the famous poet, is her brother and Mrs. Madeline Dimond a sister. The Sterlings live at Piedmont.

Deputy Clerk Zambresky gave Cunha a certificate which the young man will have to send to his parents in Honolulu for their signature. It is not thought that the young man's parents will refuse their consent.

HAWAII CAN AMEND LAW OF ELECTIONS

ACT PROVIDING FOR DELEGATE'S ELECTION CARRIES WITH IT IMPORTANT PROVISION.

HILO, August 2.—The Herald says. "Somehow or other it seems to have escaped general attention that Hawaii was given power to change its own election laws at the last session of Congress of the United States.

"Notwithstanding the fatherly regard for Hawaii which many persons profess, there has been no parade of the act, an excellent act, by the way, which appears as under the title 'Public-Act-331' in the record.

"The act in itself is worthy of the reproduction in full as it appears below. The first paragraphs contain nothing that is new, but the last paragraph is of extreme importance, inasmuch as it gives to the Legislature of Hawaii the right to amend any of the election laws of the Territory of Hawaii, specifically including those providing for the election of a Delegate to Congress."

The final clause of the act is as follows: "The legislature of the Territory of Hawaii shall have the right to alter or amend any part of the election laws of said Territory, including those providing for an election of Delegate to Congress, and its action shall be the law, with full binding force, until altered, amended, or repealed by Congress."
