M'CANDLESS OUT FOR ANOTHER TERM

LINCOLN L. M'CANDLESS ADMITS TO ACHI THAT HE WILL STRIVE FOR ANOTHER TERM IN THE SENATE AND WILL RUN FOR DELEGATE TO THE TERRITORIAL CONVENTION FROM EWA DISTRICT—ACHI SAYS CANDIDACY OF VIDA IS A BLIND.

Lincoln L. McCandless this morning admitted to Senator Achi that he would be a candidate for renomination to the Senate and that he would run for delegate to the Territorial convention. For some time past McCandless has been mentioned for a second term but it was not until this morning that his intentions became known. He had been mentioned as a possible delegate to Congress and it was understood that he would accept that nomination if it were offered to him. Now he evidently realizes that it will not be offered to him so he will come out for the Senate.

Mr. McCandless is serving his first term in the Senate and it is thought that he will be returned if he gets the nomination, as he is a good man and has the party back of him.

Achi stated this morning that the candidacy of Vida for Deputy Sheriff is nothing but a blind to fool Captain Sam Johnson. Achi said: "Of course it is a blind and Johnson is killing himself thought he does not realize it."

Vida is after the road supervisorship and he will get it. Johnson is helping them only to get thrown down after election. If Johnson cannot see it he is a very foolish man.

"I am asked why I know it. It is because where the Johnson men are strong and where the police are weak, the two combine. But where the condition is the other way Brown will not let his men combine. That means but one thing, that Johnson will get thrown and thrown hard. I know."

The senator was asked who would get the deputy sheriffship if Vida did not take it. He replied: "I do not know for a certainty, but perhaps A. S. Kalelopu will take it. There has been a rumor about the streets that he is to run for some time. I am working for Jack Kalakalea. He is honest and is well educated. I think he would be a good man to return to that office."

"Link McCandless told me this morning that he was going to try for the nomination to the Senate. He will also run for delegate to the convention from the district of Ewa."

WHAT POLITICIANS HAVE BEEN DOING

GEAR THE LATEST CANDIDATE FOR THE LEGISLATURE—CRABBE DENIES THAT HE HAD A PARTNERSHIP WITH ACHI OR HAS SPLIT WITH HIM—THE REPUBLICAN MASS MEETING CALLED FOR THIS EVENING.

Judge Gear is among the Fourth district men mentioned as a candidate for the House. The judge, it is thought, would make up the threatened deficiency in legal talent in the legislature and he may be out for a nomination.

When asked about the report that he would be, Gear modestly disclaimed any idea that he was to be called by the people and said he wasn't after a nomination.

The local county fight remains about the same, after a quiet week. Senator Crabbe said this morning that he saw no change in the situation and that there was nothing in reports that he and Achi had split. Moreover, Crabbe said, there was nothing in the reports that they had a partnership. "Achi and I were never tied up," said Crabbe. "And we have not had any split. I am glad to have his help if he is willing to give it to me and that is all."

Considerable urging has been done, it is said, to induce Brown to drop Vida as a candidate for deputy sheriff. There has been a tolerably unanimous "knock" of Vida, which makes him a weight for Brown to carry, and it is not certain that he will run. Harry Murray has been talked of for deputy sheriff but does not want to run. Murray would rather stay where he is, and perhaps some day he might

graduate from his present position to that of sheriff.

The Republican mass meeting at Aala park this evening is expected to draw a large crowd, and there is considerable interest in the addresses of Kuhio and other party leaders, as starters of the campaign.

The Fifth district committee in charge has issued the following call for the meeting:

"A Republican rally will be held at Aala Park, Saturday evening, August 11, 1906, at 7:30 o'clock p. m. at which Delegate J. Kuhio Kalaniana'ole will speak of the work done in Congress at Washington."

Besides the Delegate the following gentlemen will also speak: A. G. M. Robertson, chairman Territorial Central Committee and National Committeeman; W. O. Smith, Rev. S. L. Desha, George W. Smith, Chairman Board of Supervisors; David Kanaha, John C. Lane, President.

Teachers' Salaries Changes

FEW SLIGHT RAISES, BUT THE LEGISLATURE IS EXPECTED TO BOOST THEM ALL.

A few of the public school teachers got small raises in the readjustments of salaries for the coming term, and it was found that there was a slight surplus in the available fund, owing to savings from the vacation salaries account. The total sum of the raises is only about \$600 per month, divided among about 550 teachers, so that there is little real difference.

The salaries being paid run as low as \$25 per month in some cases. This is for uncertificated teachers, and is the poorest salary ever paid here. The highest paid is \$200 per month. In rearranging the salaries for the coming term, the Board did not raise any of the higher salaries, but put the extra money where it seemed to be the most called for.

A general raising of salaries is expected to take place after the legislative meets, for all parties have declared for it. The new appropriations will allow them better wages throughout, and it would not be a surprise to many if there is a special appropriation act passed at once, making the desired changes. The cutting down of the salaries has proved generally unpopular and the legislators will all come to the session prepared to boost them.
