SUNBURN CAUSES BLINDNESS

A. D. BALDWIN STRICKEN WITH BLINDNESS WHILE ON THE SLOPES OF HALEAKALA.

A. D. Baldwin was brought down from Maui this morning on the Kinau and taken to the Queen's Hospital. He is suffering with an attack of temporary blindness brought about by becoming sunburned on the slopes of Haleakala which brought about tumor of the eye.

Mr. Baldwin is attended by Dr. W. D. Baldwin who has every hope for the recovery of his patient. The delay in getting medical attention however made the case much more precarious than it would have been had there been no delay. Mr. Baldwin is resting easily at the hospital.

CREW OF ATLAS ON THE MONTARA

TEN SAILORS FROM STANDARD OIL SHIP TAKEN FROM YOKOHAMA TO SEATTLE.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 27.—Ten sailors from the alleged "hell ship" Atlas were brought across the Pacific from Japan by the steamer Montara and landed at Seattle. The story of the cruelty practiced upon these men by Captain Amberman and his mates during the passage of the Atlas from New York to Yokohama was recently published. The entire crew of more than a score of men left the ship at her destination, and their complaints were thoroughly investigated by Consul-General Miller.

When the Montara was about to leave Yokohama for this Coast, eight of the Americans from the Atlas were provided by Consul-General Miller with passage home on the vessel. Twelve others from the Atlas stowed away on the Montara, but they were subsequently discovered and put ashore at Mororan. Two of them, an American and an Australian, succeeded in hiding away again on the Montara, finally reaching Seattle. The Australian, being classed as a foreigner, will be sent back to Japan.

The ten sailors repeated to the officers and men of the Montara the story of inhuman treatment of the Atlas. Such cruelty, if half is true that the men tell, is seldom encountered in ships of the present day, and will effectively "quell" the Standard Oil ship under her present management whenever a crew is needed.
