The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 6 hours, 9 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.



HOFGAARDS ARE TO LEAVE KIHEI—NEW KIHEI SCHOOLHOUSE SOON TO BE COMPLETED.

KAHULUI, Sept. 20.—Mr. and Mrs. G. C. Hofgaard of Kihai expect to leave here soon after October 1st. Mr. Hofgaard has for several years past been manager of the plantation store there, but now to reduce expenses the plantation has decided to put the store in charge of the bookkeeper of the plantation and thus do away with the services of one man. Mr. Sparkes will thus be in charge of the store after October 1. Mr. Hofgaard has made many friends on this island, who will also be the loser, as Mrs. Hofgaard is a very good teacher and it will be very hard to replace her in the school there. Mr. and Mrs. James Scott and children of Kihai are on Molokai at present for a vacation of a couple of weeks, and are enjoying the shooting there, at which sport both are equally expert.

Mr. Sullivan, the contractor for the new Kihai school house, has his lumber on the ground and expects to have the building completed by November 1. The school house is to be located on a new lot adjoining the premises of the book-keeper, Mr. Sparkes, and will be the regulation two-room building.
Miss Mary E. Fleming, for some years past first assistant in the Makawao school, has been appointed principal of the Hamakua school in place of D. D. Baldwin, resigned. In the temporary absence of Miss Nellie Smith of the same school, Miss Hattie Kallino of Paia is filling the place.
R. A. Wadsworth of Waikuku and C. L. Scrimger of Lahaina start tomorrow morning for a trip to Nahiku to visit the rubber plantations in that locality, both gentlemen having rubber interests. Every one who visits the plantation is astounded at the remarkable growth of the trees.
