Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time standard is at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 8 hours, 6 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

### U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE—WEATHER BUREAU.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 2.95 inches in 1888.

The least monthly precipitation was 0.36 inches in 1883.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 1.27 inches on September 8, 1888.

# American Princess on a "Surprise Visit"



Prince Michael Cantacuzene and the Princess Cantacuzene have arrived from Europe for a six months visit. The Princess was Miss Julia Dent Grant, daughter of Gen. and Mrs. Frederick Dent Grant, and granddaughter of Gen. U. S. Grant.

This is the first visit of Prince and Princess Cantacuzene to America since their wedding at Newport in September, 1899. Their two children, Prince Michel Cantacuzene, six years old, and the Princess Berthe, two years and four months, have been the guests of their grandparents on Governor's Island in New York harbor since last December.

The visit which was not previously announced was made it is said because of the disorder in the Province of Poltava, Russia, where the Prince has his estate.

# THE WEATHER BULLETIN

For the Week Ending September 22, 1906  
Honolulu, T. H., September 24, 1906.

#### GENERAL SUMMARY.

A less amount of rainfall than during last week was reported from all stations on Hawaii, excepting 1.07 and 2.05 inches, more at Pauilo and Hakalau, respectively. In the southeastern portion of the Hilo district the deficiencies ranged from 2.2 to 3.4 inches, and 1.7 inches in the extreme eastern portion of the Puna district. In the remaining sections the deficiencies did not exceed .3 inch. The stations in the Wailuku and Hamakua districts of Maui report less rainfall, and the remaining stations somewhat more. All stations on Oahu, excepting Honolulu and Ewa, report more rainfall than during the preceding week, as also does Mapelehu, Molokai.

All stations on the island of Hawaii report mean temperatures lower than those of the preceding week, except those in the extreme northeastern portion. Paaulo temperature was 1.4 deg lower, and Waimea, 1.3 deg higher, than last week's. At the remaining stations the changes did not exceed .4 deg. At the remaining stations in the several islands, excepting Waialua, Oahu, the mean temperatures were lower, the majority of them appreciably so, due to cooler nights, and indicating that the fall season is at hand.

# Alden Besse Is Warship

FORMER SUGAR PACKET IS NOW A JAPANESE TRAINING SHIP—SHE IS ON PUGET SOUND.

SEATTLE, Sept. 12.—The bark Alden Besse, formerly an American, but now a Japanese vessel, is on the Sound carrying a crew of twenty Japanese cadets, who are later to enter the Mikado's navy as officers. These young men are to serve one year on the windjammer, when they will be transferred to a steamer to spend two years studying navigation and engineering. After this they will finish their education in one of the Japanese naval colleges and will be transferred to warships as lieutenants.

The scheme is highly commended by shipping men who have heard of it, and they state that it shows that the Japanese intend to make their junior officers efficient in all that pertains to naval affairs. The training in the sailing vessel and later in the steamer makes the cadets familiar with the nautical life. The lack of such thorough training is one point on which the American and British officers are frequently severely criticized.

The Alden Besse was built in Bath, Me., in 1871. For many years she was used in the China tea trade. Less than two years ago she was almost destroyed on the coast of Japan. Her cargo of guano took fire and she was beached in a sinking condition. The hull was purchased and turned into a new system training ship. The vessel is now in Vancouver, where she is loading lumber for Yokohama. She may come to Seattle before leaving for home, in order to give the cadets a chance to see this city. She sailed from Otaru, Japan, June 13, and arrived at Port Townsend August 11.
