TWO THOUSAND AT DEMOCRATIC RALLY

BIG CROWD AT AALA PARK TO HEAR THE DEMOCRATIC SPELL-BINDERS SATURDAY NIGHT.

There were between fifteen hundred and two thousand people at the Democratic rally at Aala Park Saturday evening. It is claimed that there was a much larger crowd than was present at the Republican rally the week before. According to some this is to be accounted for by the fact that the controversy about what occurred at the Republican meeting served to advertise the fact of the Democratic meeting and many went to it to see if anything exciting would happen.

The best of order prevailed at the Democratic rally. There were seats for about three hundred directly in front of the band stand which was used as a speakers' stand. Surrounding this arrangement of chairs, people stood up in a semi-circle eight or ten deep and back of this still they stood in groups in more open order. In large numbers. Still further back there were scores of women and children usually in family groups, and other scores of boys and girls running about, all doubtless attracted by the lights, the crowd, the activity and the excitement.

Are lights arranged about the grounds lighted up the space in front of the band stand very brightly. Notwithstanding the large crowd and the fact that children were running and playing about all over the park, there were no interruptions to the speakers, nor any disturbances that interfered with the progress of the meeting or with the speakers.

There was excellent attention paid to the speakers from the beginning, but there was little enthusiasm shown until Curtis P. Laukea spoke. He was loudly and repeatedly cheered.

On the platform were seated all of the county and legislative candidates besides a number of other Democrats, including many members of the County and Territorial committees. H. J. Mossman, chairman of the County Committee presided. Rev. J. W. Biplane opened the meeting with prayer. In opening the meeting Chairman Mossman spoke of the Democratic platform as one that represented the real wishes of the people and one that would be lived up to. Frank R. Harvey elicited an enthusiastic response when he gave an account of the incidents that led to his selection as the candidate of the party for Supervisor at large instead of Fernandez. He said he had been willing that Fernandez should have the nomination but the party insisted on his taking it and he had obeyed the will of the party.

W. A. Kinney made a stirring address in Hawaiian especially relative to the candidacy of Curtis P. Laukea for sheriff. Following Kinney, Laukea spoke for himself and was most enthusiastically received.

M. A. Silva scored the Republicans, whom he said had used the Portuguese voters, but had never done anything for them. He charged the Republicans with acting in bad faith toward the natives and the Portuguese in passing them over to give good lands to the alien and religious fanatics, the Molokans. H. T. Moore spoke effectively of his record in the Board of Supervisors. R. H. Trent captivated the crowd with a humorous handling of Hawaiian words and half-white talk.

C. J. McCarthy made an effective speech on the legislation needed in the territory to which the party stood pledged.

Other speeches were made by S. K. Hul, Fred W. Weed, David L. Kahalehale, Edward Like, editor of the Aloha Aina, Charles B. Rose, W. P. Jarret, Edward Ingham, Thomas Gandall, M. G. K. Hopkins, Joe Fern, Jesse Uihihii, W. W. Thayer, Daniel L. Kamahu, Moses Palau, J. K. Napaulohau and S. K. Mahoe.

There was singing during the evening by Madame Alapai and Madame Kaul and by the Kaul glee club and music by the glee club and the Concordia band.

THE AUTOMOBILE CASE.

Supporters of Frank Harvey as well as other delegates who attended the recent Democratic county convention and caucus, are indignant over the insinuation made by A. Fernandez that Harvey had "ginned up" delegates in order to get them to support him against Fernandez for the nomination for supervisor at large.

Harvey stated to the convention that he was willing that the delegates should give the nomination to Fernandez instead of him, Harvey, but the delegates did not seem to want to give Fernandez such nomination.

A RICH CARGO.

NEW YORK, September 19.—The Cunard steamship Carmania, which docked this morning from Liverpool, brought in her specie room \$10,328,500 in gold, the largest consignment of the precious metal ever brought by a single vessel. The shipment was made up of gold coins and bars.

The gold was imported under the Treasury ruling permitting banks to obtain from the Subtreasury in this city special deposits of Government money covering foreign gold engagements, and was consigned mainly to the National City Bank and to Kuhn, Loeb & Co., but small lots were shipped to private banking houses of this city. The bankers were eager to ship as much as possible, since the vessel was the first to leave the other side after the Treasury ruling became effective.

Heavily armed men guarded the gold as it was placed on the ship and night and day on its passage. Today a strong guard, armed with Winchesters, attended to its safe transfer from the ship.

The Carmania's cargo was the most valuable that ever passed through the Narrows. The liner had a big passenger list, including wealthy folks from all over the country, who brought back large purchases of jewelry and costly apparel. A big mail and express consignment, a highclass cargo and the \$10,000,000 of gold are believed to bring the total up to \$25,000,000.

BROUGHT OIL CARGOES.

After an uneventful trip of 12 days, the S. S. Argyll with the barkentine Fullerton in tow, arrived here Saturday afternoon with fuel oil cargoes for the Union Oil Company. The Fullerton discharges here, while the Argyll departed Saturday night for Kihel to discharge her cargo. The Argyll will return to Honolulu after the Fullerton and tow her back to Port Harford.

BROUGHT SUGAR YESTERDAY.

The steamers Helene and Maui arrived yesterday morning from Hawaii and Kauai ports respectively with cargoes of sugar for the ship Arthur Sewall. The Sewall is expected to depart at the end of the week for Delaware Breakwater.
