The federal grand jury was in session all this morning and then adjourned until half past two this afternoon. Japanese cases were being heard this morning. The jury still has considerable work to do and will probably sit several days next week.

LIBEL CASES ARE DISMISSED

END OF CONSUL SAITO'S PROSECUTIONS OF EDITOR SHIOZAWA AND HIS ASSISTANT.
The Shiozawa and Nozawa criminal libel cases were disposed of this morning by the entering of a nolle prosequi in each case, by Deputy Attorney General Fleming. The charges were brought by Consul Miki Saito, on account of some articles about him which appeared in the Hawaii Rhinoceros, of which Shiozawa is editor and Nozawa one of the

assistants. Since the indictments were found the consul and the factions of Japanese which opposed him have made friends and the local war is over.
Fleming stated in court that the consul no longer wanted to prosecute the case, and that the special counsel he had employed had withdrawn as prosecutors. The attorney General's department didn't want to prosecute either.

HAS RECOVERED GEAR USED ON MANCHURIA

STEAMER JAMES MAKEE OF THE SALVING CONCERN COMPLETES WORK OFF WAIMANALO REEF.

The steamer James Makee returned last night from Waimanalo Reef. She has completed the work of recovering the extensive gear left about that part of the coast, after the floating of the S. S. Manchuria. The Makee which is owned by the new salving concern, has done splendid work in recovering the gear. She has recovered ten anchors weighing from 3 to 7 tons each and has recovered various lines.

The steamer Iwalandi is engaged in recovering the gear used in connection with the floating of the transport Sheridan. The Iwalandi went to Barber's Point this morning.

Submitted Opinion In The Court

ATTORNEYS GET AN AUTHORITY TO WRITE REGARDING GALBRAITH WILL TRUST.

An opinion on the Galbraith will trust by Professor John C. Gray, of Harvard University is one of the features of a brief filed in the case, in the Supreme Court, by Ballou and Marx. Gray is a brother of former Justice Gray of the United States Supreme Court, and the author of a standard work on some of the law questions involved in the Galbraith case, and the will was submitted to him for an opinion.

The Galbraith will is a peculiar one in the form of trust it attempts to create. It says that the trust shall last as long as the law allows, and the question of how long this is, is one of the main problems just argued before the Supreme Court in the proceeding to construe the will. Other questions were argued as to the validity of the proposed trust. The estate is worth over \$250,000.

Gray wrote an opinion favoring the validity of the trust, and his opinion was filed with the court by Ballou and Marx, in behalf of the Hawaiian Trust Company, trustee.

PETERSON BOUGHT LOTS FOR OTHERS

MAKIKI LOTS WERE BID IN FOR PROPERTY OWNERS OF THAT SECTION.

R. C. A. Peterson, who bought in all of the Makiki lots which were placed on sale yesterday by Land Commissioner Pratt, at the upset price, did not buy the property for himself, but he acted for the residents of Makiki whose property adjoins that which was sold.

A. Hooking, J. P. Cooke, Mrs. B. M. Allen and Mr. Howard were the property owners interested. They had Peterson buy in the land in preference to bidding for it themselves and against each other.

There is no plan between the property to improve the property. It will not be made into a park but each will improve it as he sees fit. Each wished the property directly back of their residence and so they bought it in.

The people who bought it in say that they paid a very high price for it, something like \$1000 more than the government appraised it for per acre. If they would have had to pay more than \$1 above the upset price they would not have taken it.
