

Judge De Bolt this morning approved the final accounts of W. Protenhauer and F. Klamp in the estate of Johanna Wicke, deceased.

Charges of vagrancy against Miss Cornelia and Adele Rosario, Porto Ricans, were nolle prossed in the Circuit Court this morning, by Deputy County Attorney Cathcart.

Deputy Attorney General Milverton and Carl S. Smith, for the respective parties, agreed in the Supreme Court yesterday to submit on briefs the murder case of Territory vs. Keiso, exceptions from the Hilo Circuit Court.

The Stock Exchange banquet will take place at the Moana Hotel tonight, commencing at 8 o'clock. The guests are promised an interesting time. Manager J. H. Hertsche and his able assistants will give their personal attention to this affair—the first banquet given by the Honolulu Stock Exchange.

NOLLE PROSSED. The case of Ah Tong, charged with selling poisonous drugs without a license, was nolle prossed in Judge Linday's court this morning by Deputy Attorney General W. S. Fleming. Similar action was taken in the cases of Tat Kung and 43 others, charged with violating the County ordinance which prohibits the display of gambling apparatus behind barred or barricaded doors.

INDICTMENTS IN FEDERAL COURT

Twelve indictments were returned this morning by the federal Grand Jury and one nolle prosequi. The latter was in the case of Chun Pon, who was charged with buying army clothing from a soldier. He was held on account of an alleged purchase of a blouse, part of an army uniform, from a soldier named Alonzo Bolin. The jury declined, however, to return an indictment.

An indictment containing two counts was returned against E. Knust, for misuse of the mails, the charge being based on his alleged sale through the mails of a receipt for making whiskey. F. C. Bertelmann is once more on the list, on a new charge of impersonating a federal officer in the same old way, to get \$1 for a "license."

Ogino is charged with forging a signature of H. Matsuo on a money order for \$45.00.

Smuggling 275 cigars, worth \$20.31, is the charge against Alabl. He is alleged to have taken them from the steamer Dorie, on April 30.

George Naaleono and John Puana are charged with breaking into the post office at Waialoa, Maui, with intent to commit larceny.

Indictments for perjuries alleged to have been committed before George S. Curry, Chinese immigration inspector, were returned against Ah Mol, Wong Nin and Young Tan. Joe Cahina, Tsuya Ogawa and Takao were indicted for adultery.

Apu was indicted for smuggling as a result of the alleged bringing ashore of 200 cigars, worth \$13.91, from the steamer Dorie on her April 20 call here.

THE STOCK EXCHANGE REPORTS MANY SALES

The stock market shows evidence of an upward tendency, it being very firm and doing a good business. The reported sales this morning were the highest for some time. There were 772 shares of various stocks sold, 345 of which were Ookala at \$4.

Following are the sales reported: 250 Ewa at 26, 49 Oahu at 117 1/2; 345 Ookala at \$4, 100 Onomea at 39, 50 McBryde at 5 1/2, and 51 Hawaiian Agricultural at 120.

The market seems to be making amends for the slowness of the previous slump two weeks ago. The price of sugar remains at \$80 and as the Cuban situation remains brighter the threatened panic is speedily becoming a thing of the past.

To-night the Stock and Bond Exchange give their banquet at the Moana Hotel. They should be able to do a good deal of celebrating on the strength of the sales reported this morning. All of the brokers are elated over the turn things have taken the past few days. Prospects are bright for a continued firm market.

POPULAR YOUNG MAN DIED THIS MORNING

Samuel K. Dwight passed away this morning at Miss Johnson's Sanatorium after a short illness. He was operated upon for appendicitis and did not recover. The young man's death came as a sudden shock to his friends, many of whom did not know that he was ailing. He had only been ill a few days.

For the past year Samuel Dwight has been a stenographer in the offices of the law firm of Atkinson, Judd & Mott-Smith. He is spoken of very highly by his many friends in the city.

Young Dwight was cut off in the very prime of his young manhood. He was 19 years of age on the 29th of last January. He was born in this city and grew up here receiving his education in the common schools. He took a commercial course in the High School and then took the position he held at his death.

He was one of the most popular young men of the city and has a very large circle of friends.

The funeral will probably be held tomorrow afternoon.
