HAS THREE WIVES, TWENTY-TWO CHILDREN, SO IS ANXIOUS TO GO TO OAHU JAIL

THE STRANGE CASE OF A MAUI CHINESE WHO HAS FALLEN INTO THE CLUTCHES OF THE FEDERAL COURT--HASTENS TO PLEAD GUILTY TO AVOID HAVING THE WIVES SENT FOR AS WITNESSES.

Three wives and twenty-two children comprise the family of which Goo Akuna is the honored head, and he is looking after them all and according to all accounts, is a good husband and a good father all round. In spite of his domestic virtues, however, he has been arrested by the federal authorities and will have to take a sentence for unlawful cohabitation.

Goo is a wealthy and influential Chinese of Makawao, Maui. As soon as he found himself in the toils and learned that his wives had been subpoenaed as witnesses he hastened to offer to plead guilty. "Let the women stay at home and look after the children," he said, "I'll plead guilty."

Wireless messages were at once sent to Maui, giving notice that the women were not wanted as witnesses, and Goo Akuna expresses himself as satisfied to plead guilty and throw himself upon the mercy of the court, or if the court is too severe, to ask a pardon of President Roosevelt.

"Reminds me of Mark Twain's nigger's comment on Solomon," said a court employe this morning. "The nigger when he heard that Solomon had over a hundred wives said he didn't see why Solomon didn't start a bler factory if he wanted noise, because he could stop the factory when he had enough."

Goo married his first wife, a Hawaiian woman, 25 years ago. She had ten children, all of whom are growing up as citizens of Maui. Ten years ago Goo married a Chinese woman and six more children came into the world to call him father. The home appears to

have been a happy one, but Goo Akuna was evidently not satisfied and about three years ago he took a third spouse, a Hawaiian woman. She increased the population of the happy home at the start, for she had four adopted children. Goo took them all in. Two more were born, making a total of twenty-two children for Goo to look after.

It was the last so-called marriage that got Goo into trouble. The matter was reported to District Attorney Breckons and he began a prosecution. As a rule prosecutions in such cases, if the cases are of long standing, are not undertaken, the policy apparently being not to disturb old family relations of ante-annexation days, even if they are a trifle irregular. But the last marriage was subsequent to annexation and was a clear violation of the federal law, so Goo Akuna will have to suffer for his too great anxiety to found a family.

Goo insisted upon taking his medicine as soon as he was arrested. He was ready to plead guilty of any old thing if the wives could only be left free to look after the children. The penalty for the offense with which he is charged is light, the maximum being six months' imprisonment, so that however severely Judge Dole may look upon his offense Goo will soon be back in the bosoms of his families, and to speak, and will be hustling again for means to provide for three wives and twenty-two children. Goo appears to be suspiciously anxious to go to jail, but this is not thought to have anything to do with the fact that three wives await him at Makawao.

LARGE INCREASE IN HAWAIIAN VOTERS

STATISTICS SHOW AN INCREASE OF 498 VOTERS AMONG THE HAWAIIANS SINCE 1904.

The work of compiling the tables showing the nationality of the voters of the Fourth District was completed this morning by the workers at the Republican headquarters. The table is as follows:

There is also one Japanese voter in the Ninth Precinct of the Fourth. These totals compare with the figures of last election as follows: Hawaiians in 1904, 1402; in 1906, 1616; Foreigners in 1904, 1712; in 1906, 1451; Portuguese in 1904, 319; in 1906, 296; Chinese in 1904, 77; in 1906, 50; Japanese in 1904, 3; in 1906, 1. This shows that there has been a big increase in Hawaiians and a decrease in all the other races.

Some days ago the figures for the Fifth District were compiled and published. The totals for the whole County show 4102 Hawaiians, 1899 Haoles, 473 Portuguese, 154 Chinese and 3 Japanese.

SAYS HE STOLE A BUTCHER SHOP

YOOZO SUES A FELLOW COUNTRY-MAN FOR TAKING HIS MEAT MARKET.

Uchiyama Yoozo has brought a suit against Takahashi Kotaro for \$1,600 damages and \$490 for the loss of a Waiwala butcher shop, which the plaintiff declares was taken from him by defendant without authority. Yoozo says that Kotaro assumed to show him the authority of a district magistrate for taking possession of the shop. Yoozo was new to the country and ignorant of the law but anxious to obey its mandates and be allowed Kotaro to take possession, when as a matter of fact there was no authorization for so doing, says the complaint.

Yoozo says that the shop was torn down and that its value was \$490. He asks this sum and \$1,600 damages. P. L. Weaver is his attorney.

INSPECTORS COMING

From private correspondence the indications are that the Federal inspectors of hulls and boilers will come to Honolulu in November. They will remain here some months making examinations of various gasoline and steam powered vessels and also in examining the men in the deck and engineering departments for their qualifications to hold those positions.

WANTS A DIVORCE.

Mary Ilwailant has sued Charles Ilwailant for a divorce on the ground of failure to provide. The couple were married here in February, 1904, and the plaintiff charges that she was treated so cruelly by her husband that she had to leave him.

ANOTHER VICTIM IDENTIFIES COLON

JAPANESE WATCHMAN WHO WAS STABBED EARLY THIS MONTH SAYS THE PRISONER IS EVIDENTLY THE SAME MAN WHO WANTONLY STABBED HIM--POLICE WAITING THE CONDITION OF COLON'S VICTIMS BEFORE CHARGING HIM.

No charge has been preferred against Montaro Colon the murderous Porto Rican knife welder. He is being detained at the police station pending the condition of his latest Japanese victims. No charge is to be preferred against the man until the condition of these victims either terminates fatally or else they are out of danger of death. In the meanwhile Colon is being "sweated" by the police and the evidence against him is being worked up.

face were identical with those of his assailant.

The police are making a strong case against the man. Not only has the evidence of his having stabbed Mrs. Akahoshi and Shizo early Monday morning been definitely secured, but evidence of other similar crimes committed by Colon is being secured. This morning a Japanese named Tanaka was taken to the cell of Colon to see whether the prisoner was the same man who had slashed Tanaka across the face the early part of this month. Tanaka stated that he believed Colon was his assailant. The walk, height, and general features of the prisoner's

The cutting of Tanaka was fully as wanton as that of Mrs. Akahoshi. The Japanese man was employed as a night watchman in a building on Beretania street near River. He discovered a man trying to get under the building and inquired his business. For reply the man drew a knife and slashed the Japanese across the right side of the face and ear and then escaped in the darkness.

Colon is one of the most dangerous criminals that has ever operated in these islands. Aside from the mere work of committing robbery, he goes armed and always goes with the intention of doing murder if there is any prospect of his being apprehended. In fact the man attempts murder upon the slightest provocation. With such a criminal at liberty life in the community is unsafe. He is a criminal who invades the house after nightfall to bring possible death to any of the inmates who may interfere with him in his acts of robbery.

A WORLD'S RECORD BROKEN

BELMONT PARK, N. Y., October 17.--The world's record for six and a half furlongs was today broken over the local track by Voorhees. The time was 1 minute, 17-5 seconds.

The previous record for six and one-half furlongs was one minute and 13 seconds. It was held by Van Ness, a four year old. The previous race was run at Sheepshead Bay, September 11, 1903. Voorhees lowered the record just 4-5 of a second.

MORE EVIDENCE AGAINST COLON

JAPANESE VICTIM IDENTIFIES THE WATCH FOUND ON COLON WHEN HE WAS ARRESTED.

A watch which was found on Montaro Colon, the Porto Rican who was arrested as the murderous burglar by the police yesterday, was taken up to the Japanese who is lying at Death's door at the Japanese Hospital and it was identified by him as his watch which was taken the night that he was stabbed.

The condition of the Japanese has not improved much. There is but small hope for his recovery. He has made a complete ante-mortem statement which has been typewritten and then read back to him. He swore to it before a notary.

When arrested Montaro Colon was found to have on him two silver watches. It was one of these that was so completely identified by the Japanese victim this morning.

The case against Colon at present is very strong. Unless he can prove that he is not the man that both of the wounded Japanese swear he is, unless he can explain why the Japanese's watch was found on his person and why he was so anxious to avoid arrest it will go hard with him.

The Japanese nurse is a little better than she was yesterday and it is thought that she will now recover.
