KAM SQUAD IS A STURDY BUNCH

BOYS SHOW UP WELL IN PRACTICE AND WILL NO DOUBT GIVE GOOD ACCOUNT OF THEMSELVES

The new football rules have no terrors for the Kamehameha school boys and on November 3 they will be on hand with the goods. If Punahou wins the championship this year it will be through hard work. The Kams may go down to defeat but they will go fighting and they will always have a chance until the end.

There is a large squad of boys who turn out every day on the school campus for practice and Coach Hopwood puts them through their paces with a will. The boys get in and work for an hour and finish with some good cross country running around the campus. They seem to be in perfect physical shape. The boys are a bit heavier than the Punahou youngsters and they are of a necessity a bit slower. It means that there will be a royal contest.

The backs of the Kam team, those who play in the first team in practice for the regulars haven't been chosen yet, are a sturdy set of backs. The quarter-back is fast and the other three men are hard to stop when they get started. There will be plenty doing when they get a good interference started around the end.

Kams have taken to the new rules as ducks take to water. They speedily learned them under the direction of Coach Hopwood until now they do not have any difficulty at all. They are trying to do a good deal of work with the forward pass but they find, as other teams have, that it is a dangerous thing to fool with. If it works it means a probable touchdown, but it is a difficult play to make.

It will not be long now before the boys go into secret practice. This will allow them to learn their signals without any outside troubles. They are bound to be in fine shape by the time the game comes.

One of the most favorable things about the Kam squad is the number of men they have. It would be difficult to choose a first team with only one day's watching of the practice. The second team is hard to tell from the first.

The Kams will make a creditable showing on November 3 if they only do

as well in the game as they do in practice.

ANOTHER VICTIM OF REFORMED FOOTBALL

DEATH OF CAPTAIN OF THE LAWRENCEVILLE TEAM DUE TO NEW RULES OF THE GAME.

TRENTON, N. J., October 2.—The coaches of the Lawrenceville Preparatory School football team testified today at a coroner's inquest that the recent killing of Captain John P. Kennedy of Troy, N. Y., was indirectly due to the new rules of the game, but in spite of this, Coroner J. R. Bower and his jury returned a verdict of accidental death with no one in particular to blame for the fatality.

The coaches who testified were Dana Kafer, Frederick Kafer and Perry Colwell. They declared there was more brutality in the new open playing than in the old mass maneuvers because the men put more speed into their running and when tackled the result was often disastrous.

THE II ESTATE.

Irene H. Holloway has filed accounts as guardian of the Brown minors. In the case of Francis Hyde II Brown she received \$6178.27 and expended \$2183.22, of which about \$3000 represents investment of surplus income. In the case of George H. Brown the guardian received \$6999.84 and expended \$6377.44. About \$4000 of the expenditure consisted of investments of surplus income.

DOLE WAS MERCIFUL.

United States Judge Dole yesterday sentenced George Naaleono and John Puana, who pleaded guilty to a charge of breaking into a mail post-office. The judge gave the youths a lecture, in which he said that it appeared that their offense was in the nature of a boyish prank, but drew attention to the federal law on the subject. He gave them a sentence of one month in jail and a fine of \$1 each.
