## What Fred. T. P. Waterhouse Says

EDITOR STAR: In today's issue of the Advertiser appears a signed statement by the Civic Federation's Committee on candidates, in which they refuse to endorse me and give their reasons. I did not ask the Civic Federation endorsement and that organization is at liberty to endorse and to withhold its

signers of the report having in its text endorsement as it pleases. I do object, however, when the Civic Federation gives as its reason for not endorsing me statements that are not so, involving a discreditable inference which all the facts disprove.

It may not have been within the knowledge of the Civic Federation but it was a fact known to my friends that

I would not accept the nomination for Representative for the reason that I could not spare the time from my office necessary to conscientiously perform the duties of a member of the Legislature. Months before the convention, I let it be known that I would seek the nomination for county treasurer. This appeared in the daily press and a member of the Civic Federation, one of the

a paragraph charging treachery, on meeting me, asked if I did not think I was making a mistake.

I never sought the endorsement of the Civic Federation relying rather upon the Republican party for support and upon the general public which the Civic Federation says I have served well.

## WHAT DR. SCUDDER SAYS

Dr. Doremus Scudder a member of the committee on endorsements of the Civic Federation was interviewed today in regard to the report published this morning and an endeavor made to ascertain why certain candidates had been left out of the list prepared by the Civic Federation.

"The reason why each man is approved or disapproved is stated in the report," said Dr. Scudder, "and I have absolutely nothing further to say. Of course there is the third list of candidates whom we neither disapprove of or endorse."

The doctor was then told of the statement in the report which is alleged to be a mistake by F. T. P. Waterhouse

and his friends. The report says that it was a matter of machinery in the convention that kept the nomination for the legislature from Mr. Waterhouse and that in order to defeat R. H. Trent he was nominated county treasurer. The friends of Waterhouse say that this is a mistake for Waterhouse sought the nomination as treasurer and was the first man out for a nomination and

that he refused to go to the legislature.

Dr. Scudder had nothing to say in regard to the mistake. He said that the matter had passed out of his hands now and that the report embodied every thing relative to the situation that he wished to say. He would neither assert nor deny that it was a mistake. He washed his hands of the whole affair.

## WHAT F. B. M'STOCKER SAYS

F. B. McStocker was one of the Civic Federation's Committee on Candidates and he signed the report of the Federation relative to the position of the organization on candidates.

"The facts as given to us," he said,

"regarding the matter of Mr. Waterhouse were as were stated in our report. I have since been informed by Mr. Waterhouse that the statements relative to himself were not correct. It might perhaps have been better for us

to have interviewed him before the report was made, but such course was not pursued.

"There was no reflection intended upon Mr. Waterhouse. But in reaching a decision regarding the candidates of

a treasurer we were largely governed by the Civil Service principle. Trent had served with credit as treasurer and we decided that we ought to do what we could to secure his re-election."

## MONEY MAKING TUG FEARLESS TO LEAVE SOON

CHARLES COUNSELMAN WHICH IS TO REPLACE FEARLESS LEFT SAN FRANCISCO SATURDAY.

The career of the tug Fearless in Hawaiian waters is rapidly drawing to a close. By the end of the month or soon after the vessel will leave Honolulu on her way back to San Francisco where she is to be on duty with the Spreckels tow boat company.

She is to be relieved at Honolulu by the tug Charles Counselman. The Counselman is now on her way to Honolulu in tow of the S. S. Enterprise, both vessels having left San Francisco last Saturday. They ought to reach Honolulu next Sunday or Monday.

Captain Olsson of the Fearless will be transferred to the command of the Counselman and will therefore, continue to reside in Honolulu. The crew of the Fearless will also be transferred to the Counselman. The latter's crew will take the Fearless to San Francisco. The Fearless has been in these waters about six years. From the start, she proved a profitable venture, although in recent years the regular towing business has dropped off so materially that she will be a more profitable craft in the California coast waters. The vessel was first under command of the late Captain Gilbert Brokaw. When

## P. C. JONES ON THE CIVIC FED'S ACTION

DOES NOT LIKE ENDORSEMENT OF A LIQUOR MAN—OTHER MATTERS DO NOT MEET HIS VIEWS.

P. C. Jones was asked this morning what his views were on the adoption of the report on candidates by the Civic Federation. He replied that he was not satisfied with it.

"I am not satisfied with the action taken by the Federation," said Mr. Jones, "and the chief thing that I have against the report is the endorsement of a liquor man."

"Do you mean C. J. McCarthy?" was asked.

"I said a 'liquor' man. I am not mentioning any names. The Civic Federation is supposed to stand for purity and the best in a community and still they have endorsed a liquor man who is bound to always look out for his own interests. I say nothing in regard to the private life of the man. That does not figure for he is almost bound to look out for his interests."

## BURGLARS GALORE IN COURT

BIG BUNCH OF MEN CHARGED WITH VARIOUS KINDS OF BURGLARIES AND LARCENIES ARE ARRAIGNED BEFORE JUDGE LINDSAY THIS MORNING—ONE PLEA OF GUILTY BRINGS A HEAVY SENTENCE FROM THE COURT.

A considerable reduction in the population of burglars and other thieves at large is indicated by the indictments by the Territorial grand jury which were presented to a hard-looking crowd of defendants in Judge Lindsay's court this morning. The indictments of Japanese, Hawaiian, Porto Rican and Chinese took turns in reading indictments which charged burglary and larceny in various degrees.

Juanita Ramon and Pacheco were jointly indicted for a burglary in Ewa, August 21. They pleaded not guilty and Judge Lindsay assigned W. H. Smith to defend them.

Shujoka pleaded guilty to larceny of a valuable watch and other property from the premises of Queen Liliuokalani, where he was formerly a servant. Then he said he didn't do it. "I did not take the things," he said. "I could not find the man who took them, so I have to suffer."

Deputy Attorney General Fleming cross-examined the prisoner a bit, and his story didn't seem to impress the court. Judge Lindsay gave a sentence of two years' hard labor. "Could I appeal again?" the Jap asked as soon as he heard the heavy sentence. Judge Lindsay assured him that he could hire a lawyer and appeal to the Supreme Court of the United States if he wished. In the meantime jail is the place for Shujoka.

Kahahawai pleaded not guilty of burglary. He said he proposed to get W. O. Smith to defend him, and his case was postponed to give him time to get Smith.

Joe Manuel was the next alleged burglar. He had, as the grand jury found, burgled a Japanese store, on June 13. He pleaded not guilty and the court named Samuel Noar as his defender. Noar is the Home Rule candidate for County attorney.

Ah Chin came up for burglary in the first degree. He pleaded not guilty. He was out on \$750 bond from the police court. Judge Lindsay characterized
