AIR OF SUSPENSE HUNG OVER THE CITY TODAY

THE VARIOUS BUSINESS HOUSES OF THE TOWN WERE FOR THE MOST PART CLOSED—THOSE THAT WERE OPEN DID BUT LITTLE BUSINESS—LADIES INTERESTED IN THE OUTCOME—STREETS ALMOST DESERTED.

The entire town stopped for a day and either talked or did politics. Business was absolutely dead while the business men stood around on the street corners and speculated as to the winners. Not all of the houses closed doors but the ones which remained open did not do enough business to pay them for opening up.

Over the whole city hung an air of suspense. Every one seemed to be waiting for the outcome with abated breath and with the greatest of expectancy. In the language of the street there was "absolutely nothing done."

Many a wager was laid this morning. One man claimed to have obtained a bet of 2 to 1 on Brown's election. Other bets were made but the interest seemed to hover over the outcome of the fight for County Sheriff.

As the morning wore away the confidence displayed by the Brown men earlier in the day seemed to give place to an uncertainty. It is predicted that before the polls close that the Brown forces will lose confidence and will become afraid of the returns.

The headquarters of the two parties this morning were deserted with the exception of one or two workers who remained to receive reports. The entire force were out doing politics at the various polling places. It was considerable of a change from the activity shown in the two centers the past few days.

DEMOCRATIC AGENT BARRED FROM BOOTH

The only trouble which was reported at the Headquarters of the parties fighting was from the second precinct of the Fourth district this morning. The Democratic watcher, John Lahua was thrown out of the booth on account of the notification of his appointment not being filed with the inspectors 24 hours ahead of the time for the opening of the polls as required by the election law.

County Committee Chairman J. H. Mossman stated this morning that nothing would be done in regard to the matter unless the vote went far different from what he expected. In that case he would protest and obtain a new count before Governor Carter later. He stated that none of the other watchers had been shut out in any other precinct to his knowledge.

THE BATTLE IN THE PRECINCTS

THERE WERE NOT AS BIG CROWDS AT THE OPENING OF THE POLLS AS MANY HAD EXPECTED—VOTING PROCEEDED AT GOOD SPEED AND BY NOON SOMETHING MORE THAN HALF THE VOTE WAS IN AS A RULE—QUIET ELECTION.

There were as a rule smaller crowds at the polling places at the opening of the polls at 8 o'clock this morning than had been expected. It was thought that in those precincts especially where there is a large registration there would be a long line at the opening of the polls, composed in some places of men who wanted to be sure that they would get their votes in, and in others of men organized to keep hurried or belated voters out. But there was nothing of the kind at any of the precincts.

As a rule the line of a dozen or so at the opening of the polls was quickly lengthened by the addition of a great many more within a quarter of an hour. But the average speed of voting, as a rule, gradually increased as the election officials became more familiar with their work.

Without exception up to the hour of going to press there has been no disorder at any of the polling places in the city, and few incidents outside of the dull and prosaic progress of voting, though intense interest in the election and in the atmosphere about the polling places has never been dissipated.

Candidates and party organizers visited the polling places at intervals. The party watchers at each place as a rule did their work with a very quiet, in some cases almost different air.

The Home Rulers were scarcely in evidence in most of the precincts of the Fourth District, and there was only occasionally a polling place where a representative of the Civic Federation proffered the judgment of that organization to the voter.

4th District

FIRST OF THE FOURTH.
Conditions at the polling place of the First Precinct of the Fourth District were perhaps typical of conditions in all the precincts of this region. There was not a large crowd at the opening of the polls, but it increased rapidly during the next half hour. Voting went along without incident, and at noon about 171 of the 374 registered voters of the precinct had voted.

SECOND OF THE FOURTH.
Aside from the disqualification of one of the Democratic watchers at the polling place of this precinct there was nothing out of the ordinary. The Home Rulers had more men here than at most of the other precincts around. Out of 342 registered voters in the precinct, 171 had voted at 12:30 o'clock.

THIRD OF THE FOURTH.
The Third Precinct of the Fourth District is probably the only precinct in the county at which there were neither Democratic or Home Rule watchers, and at which a Democratic or a Home Rule sample ballot could not be procured. Senator Dickey was at the polling place for a while distributing Civic Federation literature.

FOURTH OF THE FOURTH.
The polling place of the Fourth Precinct of the Fourth District is in Thomas Square. About half the vote was in by noon. The Republican watchers were well provided for in a tent that was pitched under the shade of a tree about 100 feet away from the booths.

SEVENTH OF THE FOURTH.
Voting is moving at a good rate in the Seventh Precinct of the Fourth District. The polling place was once C. Q. Yee Hop's market. In the corner store three booths are placed but these are not enough to satisfy the voters and they are, many of them, going to corners in the back store and there squinting and marking their ballots on their knees.

ELEVENTH OF THE FIFTH.
Kahaloa, No. 105 on the list of registered voters in the Eleventh of the Fifth took 37 minutes to mark his ballot and then did not succeed until he had been declared physically disabled and was assisted.

TWELFTH OF THE FIFTH.
A big crowd was in line outside a store on Vineyard street opposite the Vineyard street camp, the polling place of the Twelfth of the Fifth, at 10:25 this morning. At that time 100 votes out of 469 had been recorded, about 40 to the hour. Here the Republicans and Democrats seem to feel equally certain of victory. There is little Home Rule talk. Charlie Clarke claims that 90 of the first 100 votes cast are for Brown and the majority of the Republican ticket. Split tickets are evident and one observer remarked that votes were being cast for "everybody."

THIRTEENTH OF THE FIFTH.
The Thirteenth of the Fifth started in doing politics right on the stroke of 8 this morning. A long line of voters was strung around the grass then in a most fantastic shape. It took the first man up just 17 minutes to cast his ballot. After that the process moved toward the booth rapidly. There were a large number of runners at this booth.

EIGHTH OF THE FOURTH.
There are registered in the Eighth Precinct of the Fourth District 340 voters. Votes are being cast in an otherwise unoccupied store near the Central Fire station on Fort street. Here there are but three booths and at 10:55 o'clock this morning the votes cast numbered 115. Twenty-five men were in line awaiting their turns at the booths and over 100 men stood about outside.

NINTH OF THE FOURTH.
The registration list shows 454 voters in the Ninth of the Fourth. The polling place is situated at the Nuuanu Avenue terminus of the defunct Pacific Heights electric road. At 10:45 o'clock this morning 167 had cast their ballots. Voting up to that time was going very slow. Four gentlemen from Punchbowl at one time occupied the booths and held them for 30 minutes.

DEMOCRATIC GLEE CLUB.
The Democratic County Committee has a glee club going about from one polling place to another giving short concerts at each one. The club is in a three seated survey and plays while en route as well as after a booth is reached.

INVIGORATING.
There is a peculiar attraction about Halewa that appeals to particular people. The golf links and the Tennis Court are rather better than is usually found here and the cuisine and appointments superior to that offered by hotel managers anywhere. THE G. O. P. "CALLED" THE COLOR SCHEME

(Continued from page one.)

Deputy Sheriff. The Democrats were shown enough to secure a copy of the original ballot and issued samples in yellow paper, with the cross marked behind each Democratic or endorsed candidate. A great lead was thus given their runners.

The first set of ballots were changed and a new set substituted whereby the order of the various offices was changed as follows: District Supervisors, Supervisor-at-Large, County Sheriff, Deputy Sheriff, County Auditor, County Clerk, County Attorney and County Treasurer. This new arrangement which is the order in which the offices appear on the official ballots today, entirely upset the calculations and instructions of the Democrats. The Republicans appear to have turned the tables on their opponents. Every voter can take a sample ballot into the booth with him to aid him in marking his ticket.

In addition to the sample ballots the Republicans issued a little card giving the names of the various candidates. Across the card ran streaks of color which corresponded with the colors of the official ballots. In other words, the ballots for the Delegate are pink in color. On this card is a streak of pink and printed on this color is the name of Kalamianole. No other name appears. Under the pink streak is a blue streak, the color of the Senatorial ticket. The names of three Republican senatorial candidates appear on this blue streak. Underneath the blue streak is a white streak, the color of the representative ticket. The names of the Republican representatives are printed, while at the bottom of the ticket which is entirely in green the color of the official County ballot, appear the names of the Republican County nominees. By the use of this colored card complete directions for voting a straight ticket is given the voter, in addition to his use of sample ballots.

Unless the Democrats find some way of instructing their men and giving them something to guide them, the good guess at the official color scheme that the Republicans have made will give them marked advantage in handling their men.

CANDIDATE'S WORK VERY HARD TODAY

DIFFERENT CANDIDATES FOR OFFICE ARE CHASING ABOUT FROM ONE PRECINCT TO ANOTHER.

The various candidates for office are as scarce as the proverbial hen's teeth this morning about the streets of the city. The places in which they were wont to gather to discuss politics with this or that person are today either deserted or filled by men with strange faces. The candidates are at the polling places and that means that they are all over town. If a man tells you to go to the fourth precinct to find a certain man, when you reach there he is generally several blocks away. The men who had business with the candidates this morning had a hard time of it.

There was a report started this morning that Brown had left for Ewa and other out of town precincts but this proved later to not be so. He was simply traveling about from precinct to precinct in the city and working hard trying at the last moment to influence a few votes.

McClanahan, Kubio, and all of the others were driven about from place to place today arguing here, pleading there, and covering the entire field. Today is the hardest day of the campaign but it will soon be over.
