He declares that his mother is a Hawaiian, and that his father is a wealthy sugar planter in the islands.

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MANY FAVOR RECOUNT

Where 5,000 votes were cast with such a slight margin of difference between the candidates, and from 400 to 500 ballots rejected it is argued that every effort ought to be made to secure a count of rejected ballots if many were, as claimed, thrown out on groundless technicalities. Other ballots were accepted in other precincts in disregard of the ruling that in some precincts had resulted in ballots being rejected. "You can tell the public," replied the Sheriff, "that I'm out of politics and that I'm going to retire to private life, taking up the practice of law and seeking the business of all my friends and enemies."
