TO ASSIST THE BAND GETTING HOME

FIRST STEP TAKEN BY THE HAWAII PROMOTION COMMITTEE, YESTERDAY.

The Hawaii Promotion Committee met yesterday afternoon and took the first definite steps towards bringing the Hawaiian band home. The committee telephoned to George W. Smith, chairman of the Board of Supervisors and asked him to attend the meeting.

Mr. Smith explained to the meeting that the Board of Supervisors had no power to send the boys money. After further discussion the following resolution was passed:

"Whereas the Hawaiian band, now on the mainland, is in needy circumstances due to conditions beyond their control, and whereas funds to enable them to return to their homes are not available from the County Treasury, therefore

"Resolved, That the Hawaii Promotion Committee recommends that a sufficient amount be taken from the funds contributed by the citizens of Hawaii for the relief of needy Hawaiians in San Francisco to enable Captain Berger and his band to return to their homes.

"Resolved, That a copy of this resolution be sent to the Chamber of Commerce and the Merchants' Association with a request for early action on their part."

MIGHT HAVE SUNK OUTSIDE

SHERIDAN RISKED OPENING HER WOUNDS BY LETTING GO BIG ANCHOR IN DEEP WATER.

Along the waterfront there are numerous sea captains and others who are telling each other just how the accident to the Sheridan's windlass yesterday could have been avoided and how the Buford, Sheridan and Slocum should have made their get-away for San Francisco, somewhat after the manner of folks who are telling each other how Brown could have been elected if he had taken their advice supposing it had ever been offered.

"There was no necessity of anchoring the Sheridan outside," said one of the best posted on seafaring matters. "The Buford should have gone out first and dropped her anchor and waited there while the tugs took out the Sheridan. The Buford could have been all ready to get the big towing line on to the crippled Sheridan while the tugs held her. Another thing, it was a dangerous piece of business letting go the big anchor in too deep water, for the Sheridan wears a great cement plaster on the inside which might have been cracked up by the strain, opening the wounds she received on the Barber's Point reef."

It is fully expected that the tug Slocum and the transport Buford will get away early tomorrow morning for San Francisco with the Sheridan in tow. The Buford carries 100 tons of extra coal for the use of the Slocum should the tug require it.

When the Sheridan dropped her anchor outside yesterday she let it go in too much water and the result was that she drifted in, fanned by the southerly breeze, until her great hook came to the rescue and caught on the higher ground.

AMOROUS KOREAN PROMPTLY CONVICTED

YEE MARN YONG FOUND GUILTY BY THE JURY YESTERDAY AFTER BEING OUT TEN MINUTES.

After being out only ten minutes the jury in Judge Lindsay's court yesterday afternoon returned a verdict of guilt against Yee Marn Yong charged with assault with a dangerous weapon with intent to commit murder.

On March 12 the defendant shot a fellow countryman named Chung Sung Duck, three times, mistaking him for another Korean named Choy Uk Chay of whom the defendant was jealous as the outcome of an unlawful love affair.

More than usual interest was given the case from the fact that Yee Marn made a sensational statement to his attorneys Lightfoot and Noar that Assistant Sheriff Henry Vida had forced an alleged confession from him by the administration of the "water cure." The case was taken before the supervisors for an investigation of the charges. The charges were not sustained. During the trial of the case before Judge Lindsay there was considerable effort made to do politics.

W. S. Fleming and J. W. Cathcart conducted the prosecution, J. Lightfoot noted exceptions to the verdict and gave notice of motion for a new trial.
