## HONOLULU BOY IS HONORED

TEAM MATES OF JUDD ELECT HIM TO THE CAPTAINCY OF THE U. P. BASEBALL NINE.

The Philadelphia Evening Telegraph contains the following about a well-known Honolulu boy:

Gerritt P. Judd, the Honolulu athlete, was yesterday elected captain of the Pennsylvania baseball team to succeed Emlen Hare.

Judd played center field on the 'Varsity last year, and was one of the most consistent batters.

He was born in Honolulu, but prepared at Hotchkiss School, where he played shortstop on the baseball team for three years. Last fall he entered Pennsylvania and was a candidate for shortstop, but was finally shifted to the outfield. The prospects for a winning team are particularly bright, as only three veterans are missing. They are ex-Captain Hare, Left Field Adams and Pitcher Hay.

The old men are Fennel, first base; Geinath, second base; Yerkes, shortstop; Thomas, third base; Captain Judd, center field, and Webb, right field.

Judd received a large majority and his election is a popular one. Judd's home run, in the last Princeton game, won the game for Pennsylvania and put the center fielder in the good graces of his teammates, which resulted in his election.

being pronounced and while his attorney had been making the plea for leniency. The Korean stood motionless and gave no marked sign of emotion other than a nervous twitching about the lips but it was apparent that the man was under great mental excitement, although Oriental stoicism enabled him to conceal his discomfiture.

In passing sentence the court said in part "It is due to no credit on your part that the man shot did not die and had that occurred the court would probably now be passing sentence of death upon you instead of the present offence. The court is fully satisfied that you went there to put that man to death. You have had a fair trial, ably assisted by counsel who did their best to defend you. The verdict that the jury returned here was the only verdict to have been brought in."

While it is true that the Koreans have arrived here but only a short time, it is clear to the court that you are a man of special intelligence and should have known better than to commit the crime you did. We Americans, put great value on human life and you Koreans while you dwell in our midst will must learn to respect the law. The court can see no grounds for leniency in the least. The sentence of this court is that you be imprisoned at hard labor for a term of five years and to pay a fine of \$1.


IN ITS HONOLULU CORRESPONDENCE IT GIVES WHAT PURPORTS TO BE AN ACCOUNT OF AN ALLEGED INCIDENT OF WHICH STORIES HAVE BEEN CIRCULATING FROM MOUTH TO MOUTH IN HONOLULU FOR A CONSIDERABLE TIME.

The San Francisco Examiner of November 1, publishes the following under big headlines. Stories regarding the incidents alleged have been current in Honolulu and circulated by word of mouth for some time:

HONOLULU, T. H., October 23.—The charges of Mrs. Julia Afong, widow of the well-known wealthy Chinese, who died recently in Macao, against certain of her sons-in-law consist of intimidation in an attempt to extort her to surrender the control of certain wealth and also a brutal assault upon her and upon her Japanese attendant. The charge have caused a great sensation here, owing to the prominence of all of the parties involved. The matter will be considered by the grand jury.

A. S. Humphreys, a former Circuit Judge of the Territory; F. B. McStockler, prominent in the sugar industry; J. A. Magoon, a prominent attorney, and J. M. Riggs, formerly jury commissioner, are the men who are concerned in her charges. According to the statements made by Mrs. Afong the four men, accompanied by their wives, who are her daughters, visited her country residence about three miles from Honolulu on the afternoon of October 19th and there some of the men brutally assaulted Fujl, a Japan-

ment has caused a severe shock to her health.

Another sensational feature about the case is the assault upon Fujl. He is charged with having secured an undue influence over Mrs. Afong and, according to reports, she has given him large sums of money. It was for the purpose of securing the Japanese and forcing him to leave the Afong premises that the alleged beating was given. The man is reported to have departed for Japan with \$500, but from whom he received this money is not stated.

STATES FUJI CAUSED TROUBLE. One source of friction in the Afong family was the influence that Fujl was alleged to have secured over Mrs. Afong. It was reported at one time that she had married him.

Under the trust deed given by the late Afong about sixteen years ago, when he left Honolulu for China, his property is held in trust for the benefit of his wife and his fifteen children. Mrs. Afong has assumed the control of the income of the property. Last week Mrs. J. M. Riggs, one of her daughters, instituted proceedings against her to prevent her disposing of any of the \$200,000 that has accumulated under the trust deed.

Afong is understood to have left no will and efforts are now under way. It is claimed, to secure some of his property in China. It is claimed, however, that Afong had another wife and that in event of litigation family skeletons will be dragged into light.
