

## A Strategic Victory For A. M. Brown

AFTER LONG ARGUMENT SUPREME COURT DECIDES TO PROCEED WITH THE CANVASS OF THE PAUOA PRECINCT RETURNS—THE POINT WAS WHETHER COURT SHOULD DENY RECOUNT AT THIS STAGE OR GIVE BROWN FURTHER OPPORTUNITY.

Brown won a strategic victory this afternoon before the Supreme Court in his petition for a recount. After a long debate by Kinney and Gear, the Supreme Court decided after a consultation taking some time to proceed with the canvass of votes from the Pauoa precinct.

Kinney opened the debate and took considerable time. Gear followed and then Kinney answered him.

The Supreme Court spent some time in discussing the matter and it was finally announced that they would proceed with the canvassing of the votes in the Pauoa precinct.

The decision was victory in a way for Brown for this morning it looked as if they would throw his petition out.

Before Justice Hartwell George D. Gear and W. A. Kinney, the leading counsel respectively, proceeded with the canvass of the part of the ballots, assigned to the Associate Justice. The court was very informal and but for the fact that there were contesting interests before the tribunal, the meeting in the chambers of the justice might have been regarded as the most friendly proceeding possible. Judge Gear first took up the ballots, then examined them, and then passed them to Kinney. The latter in turn scru-

tinized the ballots and then passed them over to the justice. Both attorneys as well as Justice Hartwell kept a tally of the number of ballots passed for each candidate, as well as a record of those that were challenged for each man. The Honorable Justice probably for the first time during his career on the Supreme bench, had to act in more different roles than a rapid change actor in a performance. He was first the associate justice, clerk, bailiff, tally clerk, stenographer and any thing else that the conditions required. The canvass of the ballots proceeded at a rapid rate, the objections during the first hour being 2 laukea ballots to 1 Brown ballot. The objections were based on various grounds, some for erasures, some for improper marking others for distinguishing marks. The total of objections during the first hour were 6 laukea ballots to 3 Brown ballots. This canvass was completed after 11 o'clock. The Brown-laukea case was taken up again this morning in the Supreme Court. A Lewis Jr., chairman of the 12th Precinct, 5th District, identified the bag containing the ballots and stated that it appeared to be in the same condition as when he last saw it. This

There seems to be quite an awakening in matters pertaining to the development of South Kona. The Kona Development Company, the South Kona Agricultural Company and the West Hawaii Railroad Company have all called meetings. The South Kona Agricultural Company will meet this afternoon.

The notice for the meeting of the Company states that the principal business to come before the meeting is the considering of a mortgage to be placed upon the company's holdings. The meeting of the West Hawaii Railroad Company is for the same purpose and will be held next Tuesday afternoon. The Kona Development Company is called for the purpose of authorizing an issue of bonds to be secured by a deed of trust and a mortgage of its property.

The directors of the companies today stated that they did not know what would take place at the meetings. They will decide upon certain matters at the meeting and until that time they all seem to be very much in the dark.

William H. Cornwell the Home Rule candidate for Supervisor of Maui stated this morning that his attorney, E. M. Watson, will file his petition for a recount on next Monday.

## GENEVIEVE DOWSETT IS DEAD

MRS. GENEVIEVE DOWSETT DUNBAR PASSED AWAY THIS MORNING—BROTHER RECEIVES NEWS

A cablegram was received this morning by David Dowsett announcing the death of his sister, Mrs. Genevieve Dowsett Dunbar, presumably at Belvedere, where she was stopping. Death was caused by heart failure which is thought to have followed an operation.

Mrs. Dunbar was very well known in this city and leaves many friends here to whom the news of her death will come as a great shock. She was about 20 years old and was noted for her beauty and winning ways.

She was educated in San Jose and made her home on the mainland for the greater part of her life, visiting the islands often however. Her last trip to these islands was in last August, she being one of the Manchuria's passengers when that vessel went upon the rocks at Waimanalo. She did not remain here long, however, and left soon to rejoin her husband, Stuart Boyd Dunbar, to whom she was married on August 12.

Mrs. Dunbar came quite prominently into view both on the mainland and in these islands through a romance growing out of her heroic rescue from drowning of Prentice Gray, a young football hero of the University of California. She became engaged to him and then to the amazement of her many friends she married Dunbar saying that she would marry a "man" and not a "cad." This led to the supposition that she had been jilted by Gray.

Mrs. Dunbar leaves six sisters and three brothers, two sisters and a brother being away, and the rest in this city, aside from a number of other relatives. Her sisters are Mrs. Fred Knight, Mrs. G. W. Kirkaldy, Mrs. Dr. Raymond, Mrs. Marion Crook, Mrs. L. A. Parish, and another married sister who is abroad. The brothers are Alka, David and Sam. Her parents are both dead.

## Rev. Desha Not To Leave His Pulpit

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Rev. Stephen L. Desha is not to retire from the pulpit of Hall Church even for a year. Rev. Timoteo is to continue in his present work as traveling evangelist for the Hawaiian Board. All this was decided on finally at a meeting of the Hawaiian Board held last Tuesday.

For some time the Hawaiian Board has thought it would be to the best interests of all concerned if Rev. Desha could be induced to surrender his pulpit for a year and take up the work of the Hawaiian Board throughout the islands. In this belief it commissioner Rev. W. D. Westervelt, who was going to Hilo on other matters, to consult with the Hall Church and its pastor, The Church after consideration passed a resolution granting Rev. Desha a year's leave of absence at his request, provided the Rev. Timoteo was willing to take up the work of the church during that time. After consultation and consideration, Rev. Timoteo decided that he was not willing to undertake the work at this time. Thereupon the whole plan was abandoned, and Rev. Desha continues with his church.

"The feeling in Hall Church at the present time," said Rev. W. D. Westervelt, "is a splendid feeling of harmony. It is a better feeling than existed some time ago, though there has been splendid feeling between church and pastor for some time. I think that Rev. Desha himself has a new and enthusiastic energy in the work of his church, and the church has a new feeling of devotion to its pastor and his work. I think that the outlook is the most hopeful and encouraging that could possibly be."

## SUVERIC DUE WITH AZOREANS

QUARANTINE AND IMMIGRATION DEPARTMENTS READY TO HANDLE NEW CITIZENS.

The British steamship Suveric is now 50 days out of Funchal with immigrants for Hawaii from the Azores and is due to arrive at any time.

Her reception by the United States Marine Hospital Service and the U. S. Immigration Department will be similar to the reception given any other vessel arriving here with immigrants. The Hospital Service will first take charge, the doctors boarding the Suveric outside the harbor and making a thorough examination. If there should be cases of any dangerous illness on board the vessel would be quarantined, as would be the case with any other boat.

Upon being passed by the doctors the Suveric will be docked at whatever wharf nearest the immigration station happens to be unoccupied at the time of her arrival and the immigrants will be received in the immigration station grounds and held subject to the routine inspection and subjection to any inquiry that may have to be made, special or otherwise.

U. S. Immigration Commissioner-General F. P. Sargent will personally inspect the immigrants.

## IROQUOIS MAY GO TO MIDWAY

RUMOR THAT SHE WILL SOON RELIEVE MARINES AT THAT LONELY STATION.

There is some talk among the United States marines at this station to the effect that the U. S. S. Iroquois, Captain Carter, may soon be ordered to Midway with a detachment of marines, to arrive from the Coast, to relieve the men now on duty at Midway.

Admiral Vory was seen in regard to the rumor and while he had received no information on the subject he did not think it likely that the Iroquois would have to go to Midway for some time. Captain Carter said he had heard the rumor, but in the absence of orders, there was no saying what would be done.

### ECHO FROM NEWCASTLE.

The barkentine Echo, Captain Lawson, arrived off port this morning after a good run of forty days from Newcastle with coal for Eleese, Kaula, she has already beaten the ship St. Frances on the run from Newcastle by 21 days and the bark Carlton by 15 days. She was sighted 5 miles off Koko Head at daylight. The Intrepid went out to her and brought her off Waikiki.

## GENERAL RAIN ALL OVER THIS ISLAND

REPORTS FROM OUT OF TOWN PLACES SHOW A GENERAL PRECIPITATION.

According to the indications at the Weather Bureau the rain storm which has been raging here since Wednesday, last is not yet over. They look for a further precipitation this evening or late this afternoon. During the storm so far there has been a fall of 4.16 inches of rain.

The rain started in the east and gradually worked around by the south to the northwest. The hardest shower came during 13 minutes following 6:28 p. m. Wednesday when there was a fall of .63 of an inch. The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any consecutive 24 hours was on November 30, 1880, when 5.24 inches fell.

Reports from out of town this morning show that the rain was general all over this island. At Waiailua it has rained steadily but not at any time hard. It is thought that between three and four inches of rain fell at Oahu Plantation they received 3 1-2 inches. At Kahuku they got 5:30 inches and at Ewa 3.85 inches.

The sugar men are all pleased with the rain for it insures a much better prospect for next year's crop. The rain is full of promise for the past two years have been "tourist winters" with little rain.
