Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 9 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE-WEATHER BUREAU.

The following data, covering a period of 21 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month, December, for 21 years.

TEMPERATURE. (1890-1905)

Mean or normal temperature, 72°.

The warmest month was that of 1891, with an average of 74°.

The coldest month was that of 1902, with an average of 71°.

The highest temperature was 84° on Dec. 2, 1890.

The lowest temperature was 55° on Dec. 30, 1900.

PRECIPITATION (Rain 1877-1893, and 1904-1905).

Average for the month, 3.53 inches.

Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 15.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 5.56 inches in 1879.

The least monthly precipitation was 1.17 inches in 1888.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 4.30 inches on Dec. 22, 1879.

RELATIVE HUMIDITY.

Average, 9 a. m., 70.5 per cent; 3 p. m., 73.9 per cent; (1890-1903); 8 p. m., 72.5 per cent (1904-1905).

CLOUDS AND WEATHER. (1890-1905)

Average number of clear days, 12; partly cloudy days, 15; cloudy days, 4.

WIND.

The prevailing winds have been from the northeast (1878-1894), 1904 and 5).

The average hourly velocity of the wind is 8.2 miles (1904 and 5).

The highest velocity of the wind in 1904 and 1905 was 36 miles from the northeast on the 29th, 1904.

# WORK CONTINUES WITHOUT MONEY

PRESIDENT PINKHAM IS ABLE TO HAVE THE HEALTH MEASURES KEPT UP WHILE WAITING.

Despite the fact that there has been no money available for the board of health to carry on its fumigating and general sanitary measures since December 1, President Pinkham has not allowed his force to abandon this highly important work.

In one or two minor details the board of health force has discontinued work but in the main, the work is being conducted as usual. President Pinkham ran along for months before without any money until at last finally did come and as his men are loyal enough to him and to the public service to risk the chances of receiving pay, there is no occasion for the work stopping now.

President Pinkham thinks that the work done by his department in the cleaning and fumigation of rooms about the city contributed most materially to stamping out the plague. The purpose now is to keep the health conditions up to the point where the city will be free from a recurrence of epidemic diseases.

Secretary Gilman of the shippers' wharf committee has not succeeded yet in getting a meeting of that organization but a quorum will undoubtedly be held some time this week when the question of providing funds to aid the board of health in this work, will be settled. There is no doubt but the funds required by the board of health will be provided by the committee. There is sufficient money on hand to do so. President Pinkham will soon be able to conduct the general sanitary work without any handicap in the way of lack of funds.


