Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 3 hours, 6 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE—WEATHER BUREAU.

The following data, covering a period of 21 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month, December, for 21 years.

TEMPERATURE. (1890-1905)

Mean or normal temperature, 72°.

The warmest month was that of 1891, with an average of 74°.

The coldest month was that of 1902, with an average of 71°.

The highest temperature was 84° on Dec. 2, 1890.

The lowest temperature was 55° on Dec. 30, 1900.

PRECIPITATION. (Rain, 1877-1893, and 1904-1905).

Average for the month, 3.53 inches.

Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 15.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 5.86 inches in 1873.

The least monthly precipitation was 1.17 inches in 1888.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 4.30 inches on Dec. 22, 1879.

RELATIVE HUMIDITY.*

Average, 9 a. m., 70.5 per cent; 8 a. m., 73.0 per cent; average 9 p. m., 77.9 per cent. (1893-1905); 8 p. m., 72.5 per cent. (1904-1905).

CLOUDS AND WEATHER. (1890-1905)

Average number of clear days, 12; partly cloudy days, 15; cloudy days, 4.

WIND.

The prevailing winds have been from the northeast (1875-1894, 1904 and 5).

The average hourly velocity of the wind is 8.2 miles (1904 and 5).

The highest velocity of the wind in 1904 and 1905 was 36 miles from the northeast on the 20th, 1904.
