## FATHER JAMES TO BISHOP RESTARICK

FATHER JAMES REPLIES TO THE BISHOP'S LETTER OF THIS MORNING.

Right Rev. Bishop Restarick.  
Dear sir:—I see with pleasure your long article in this morning's paper, and you are getting over your dislike of religious controversy. It is indeed very important for yourself and for your flock to know on what ground you are standing.  
You appeal to history and quote many books which you believe to consolidate your position. I could quote many more authors to affirm the Catholic position, but I do not wish to abuse the patience of the printers as well as of the readers.

Do you really believe that history is an argument against dogmatical theology?  
History registers men's doings, good or bad, their successes and their failures. Now does success change a bad cause into a good one? History if much, may furnish us a second class argument, but the first class argument is furnished by theology. What does Holy Scripture say? Jesus Christ built one, just one Church, as a large electric power-house, to furnish supernatural light and supernatural strength to the whole world. He provided St. Peter as manager of the whole plant, obliging all men to obey him and his helpers ever as to himself. Now the important thing is for everybody to be connected with this supernatural plant in which Christ has stored up the merits of his blessed passion. You may yourself or the management as well may cut the connecting wire, and although you keep in your house the electric lamps or the dynamo, they are now unable to give you the light and power you need. Just so at the time England separated from Rome. All the externalities they kept, could not supply the real, though invisible, because supernatural, defect. Call the Church a Kingdom, then Holy Scripture represents it as a monarchy. It is not made to lean on secular power. Authority is not acquired by the election of the citizens as in a republic.

Now, no historical quotation can be constructed as to upset this fundamental teaching of Holy Scripture.  
As to the difficulty you derive from St. Paul's dispute with St. Peter, I have a treatise on it which I am willing to hand over for reading to anybody who wishes to call on me. If your historical argument holds good, then all the sects which pretend to be the true Church are right. They show success instead of decadence. History more or less old reports them existing and holding prayer meetings. They take the Bible and explain it their way. Now, Rev. and dear sir, without questioning your good faith, I must repeat that the English Church since it separated from Rome accepted a new constitution centering in the temporal sovereign. This was officially done by Henry VIII. and his Parliament. Such is the notion of true history and I do not see by what argument you can get around this fact.

ONLY THREE MEN TO BE RETAINED—REVES WILL PROBABLY SUCCEED CAPT. LARSEN.

Prominent Democrats stated this morning at the police station. The only man who will be retained are Captain Parker and his son and Jack Kalakela. Kalakela will be given a position as a special probably.  
No successor to Harry Murray has as yet been named. Several have been considered but as yet no choice has been made.  
L. B. Reves will probably be waterfront policeman succeeding Captain Larsen. Reves is backed up by the Seaman's Institute and has letters from many people in town. His appointment is almost assured. Reves is at present a conductor on the Rapid Transit.  
There will be no such position as Assistant Sheriff, the special work is to be done by A. P. Taylor who will be known as the Chief of Detectives.

## BABCOCK EXPECTS TO SAIL TODAY

The ship Babcock, she who has gone through so many trying experiences within the last 200 days, really expects to leave port today to resume her voyage to Astoria. Captain Stinson was expecting to get out this morning but his hopes were not realized; now he plans to get away this afternoon. He wants to leave while he has a crew for the longer a vessel stays in port the less chance has she of retaining her crew.

WILL GET OUT NEXT WEEK.  
The premises lately occupied by the Pacific Hardware Company have not as yet been entirely vacated. It will probably be some time next week before all of the stock purchased by E. O. Hall & Son and Theo. H. Davies & Co. is removed. The premises have not as yet been rented to any other parties.

## PRATT WILL ASK FOR LARGE APPROPRIATION

WANTS \$70,000 FOR EXCLUSIVE USE OF SURVEY DEPARTMENT AND AN INCREASE FOR OFFICE.

About \$54,000 additional appropriation for the operation of the Land Department is to be asked by Land Commissioner Pratt. The bulk of this money is designed for the use of the Survey Department in making surveys of the government lands. The last legislature appropriated \$29,000 for the survey department but Commissioner Pratt considers that this amount is inadequate to the needs of that branch of the land work. He will therefore, ask that that particular item be increased to \$70,000 by the coming legislature.  
The idea in having the appropriation increased is to enable the survey department to make the surveys of the public lands at least a year before the expiration of the various leases. By performing this work in advance of the lapse of the leases the Land Department will be in a position to open up any particular piece of land promptly. Pratt says that his department has been handicapped in this respect for lack of funds. He considers that by securing the means for enabling the survey department to do its work in advance of the opening of lands, the public can be better served. This appropriation has nothing whatever to do with the operations of the land department.

In addition to the \$47,000 increase of the \$23,000 of the last period, Pratt intends to ask for an appropriation of about \$6,000 to \$7,000 for the expenses of his office. This money will be used for the services of an additional clerk, for advertising the opening of lands, for travelling expenses of his department and for other details incidental to the opening of public lands.

## COURTS RESUME SESSIONS TODAY

WITH THE EXCEPTION OF JUDGE LINDSAY ALL OF THE JUDGES HELD COURT.

There was a general resumption of business by the courts this morning. Judge De Bolt of the first circuit has held sessions during the holidays but the other departments took vacations.  
The Supreme Court took up the hearing of several cases. One was the argument in the case of the Territory vs. the Gunst, Eakin Cigar Company relative to the gift enterprise of the tobacco company. E. S. Derby appeared for the company and First Deputy Attorney General Prosser and C. F. Clemons for the Territory.

Judge Robinson resumed the hearing of the Kay vs. Whiting suit for \$5,000 damages, with a jury. Judge Robinson continued the decision in the case of Kay vs. the Cigarette Company to recover on a \$7,000 note until Saturday.  
The court denied the motion to strike out the answer of the defendant and for a default judgment, in the case of P. A. Kerkert vs. George D. Gear, to recover on an alleged promissory note.  
In the case of Yonutaro Oto vs. the Oahu Railway and Land Company the defendant withdrew its demurrer and filed its answer to the suit for damages for the death of a child of plaintiff.  
The motion to dismiss the appeal in the case of Tong Koon Chan vs. Jessie K. Kaae was withdrawn from the calendar, as the defendant will give notice of intention to withdraw the appeal.

Judge Lindsay held no court as he did not return from Kauai.  
Before Judge De Bolt the hearing of the C. B. Malle land case whereby the plaintiff seeks to recover \$14,000 worth of property sold for delinquent taxes, was resumed this morning, with the plaintiff on the stand.  
Sam Wong paid \$60 into the court as the first installment of his overdue alimony.  
The petition for allowance of final accounts in the estate of Robert Keopoo was allowed by Judge De Bolt today.

A motion to set aside a default and judgment in a divorce of Maria Heale Linau vs. David Linau was continued until January 4 at 9 a. m. by Judge De Bolt this morning.  
U. S. Judge Dole held no court this morning.

## S. S. W. G. HALL AGAIN IN SERVICE

BACK ON KAUAI RUN AFTER COMPLETE OVERHAULING—NEW ENGINES AND GOOD AS NEW.

The Inter-Island steamship W. G. Hall, Captain Thompson, goes out on her old run to Kauai ports at 5 o'clock this afternoon after a long rest during which she has been completely overhauled and put in a condition in every way as good as when she was new. She has new engines and improved equipment, new boilers and is resplendent in new paint and varnish.
