# What Rudolph Spreckels Says Abe Ruef Proposed

WANTED SPRECKELS TO ORGANIZE A SYNDICATE TO TAKE AN ISSUE OF BONDS PROMISING TO CREATE CONDITIONS THAT WOULD ENABLE THE SYNDICATE TO GET THE BONDS AT PRACTICALLY ITS OWN PRICE.

SAN FRANCISCO, December 31.—Startling testimony was given by Rudolph Spreckels yesterday in the proceedings before Superior Judge Dunne in which Mayor Eugene E. Schmitz and Abraham Ruef are seeking to set aside the five indictments found against each of them for felony extortion.

Spreckels, who had been called to the witness stand by the defense, testified during his examination that Abraham Ruef had called on him at the time of the municipal bond issue and asked him to form a syndicate to take all the bonds thus authorized. Spreckels was unable to see what guarantee there was that if a syndicate were formed it could secure the bonds, as under the law they must be put up at public auction and sold to the highest bidder.

Ruef informed Spreckels that this could be easily arranged, for he would have a general strike declared on all the street railroads and tie up the different lines. With San Francisco in this condition relative to its passenger transportation the administration boss astutely remarked that no outside capitalist would bid on the city's bonds and the syndicate would have a clear field.

Spreckels also testified from the witness chair that Ruef called on him and made a demand that he be retained as the attorney of the San Francisco Gas and Electric Company.

During the giving of this testimony, which evidently came as a surprise if not a shock to the extortionate boss, he showed much interest and frequently leaned across the table at which the lawyers sat and suggested questions to Henry Aehl, his leading counsel. A little later, however, when it had been shown that these offenses were committed three or more years ago, and prosecution was barred by the statute of limitations, the Mayor's "legal adviser" resumed his normal audacity and admitted that all the charges were true with the exception of that referring to his offer to induce a general strike of the carmen and tie up all the street car lines, that the fraudulent deal in municipal bonds might be effected. This induced extortionist, in his cool impudence, seems willing to admit almost any crime that is three years old and against which the statute of limitations has run, thus enabling him to escape trial for his violations of the law.

# A. P. TAYLOR WILL BE CHIEF DETECTIVE

WELL KNOWN REPORTER OF THE ADVERTISER WILL BE CHIEF ASSISTANT TO NEW SHERIFF.

Albert P. Taylor of the Advertiser force will be made chief of detectives by Sheriff Curtis P. Iaukea. Taylor has decided to accept the appointment and will take charge of the work on January 7. There is to be no office of assistant sheriff, so any work in that line will be performed by the Deputy Sheriff, unless he turns it over to the new chief of detectives. The new appointment will be given a two years leave of absence from the newspaper. He is desired by Sheriff-elect Iaukea to handle the anti-gambling work of the department. Taylor will also look after the haunts of vice and seek to break them up.

In this connection the Advertiser makes the following comment: "In speaking of the Taylor appointment the other evening, Col. Iaukea and W. A. Kinney concurred in the statement that the party and the new Sheriff wanted to make their anti-vice promises good and could think of no one better adapted to the work in hand than the man who had done so much to make the Advertiser's crusade successful."

Taylor came here in 1885 and after serving as private secretary to L. A. Thurston went to Hilo for a time as clerk of the Circuit Court. Taylor went to Manila on the Austrian steamship Siam which was in a typhoon, and returning here, began to work on the reporter force of the Advertiser. He has served that paper with loyalty and great zeal. In politics, according to the Advertiser, he is an independent Republican and was one of the secretaries of the Silver Republican party in the campaign of 1896.

### BOARD WILL MEET FRIDAY.

The meeting of the Board of Supervisors which was to have been held Tuesday in order that the law providing for a meeting on the first Tuesday might be complied with, was not held as Chairman Smith decided that nothing which the Board might do could be legal, as the day was a legal holiday.
