Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time which flows at 1:00 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 9 hours, 6 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. DEPARTMENT OF AGRICULTURE—WEATHER BUREAU.

The following data, covering a period of 32 years, have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month, January for 32 years.

TEMPERATURE. (1896-1906.)

Mean or normal temperature, 71°

The warmest month was that of 1895, with an average of 72°.

The coldest month was that of 1905, with an average of 67°.

The highest temperature was 84° on January 19, 1891.

The lowest temperature was 54° on January 27, 1895.

PRECIPITATION (rain 1875-1894 and 1895-6.)

Average for the month, 3.06 inches.

Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 12.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 10.63 inches in 1879.

The least monthly precipitation was 0.17 inches in 1878.

The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 5.30 inches on January 25, 1878.

IMPORTANT PROVISIONS OF NEW PURE FOOD LAW

MISBRANDED IS TO BE STAMPED ON EVERY PACKAGE THAT HAS NOT COMPLIED WITH CERTAIN PROVISIONS OF THE LAW—INTERESTING DETAILS OF THE LAW THAT HAS JUST GONE INTO OPERATION—LOCAL PEOPLE ARE BOTHERED BY IT.

The new Pure Food Law went into operation January 1. It is a measure that is causing a great deal of confusion and trouble among liquor and grocery dealers. It is especially troublesome to grocery people.

Following are some of the most important provisions of the law:

Sec. 1. That for the purpose of this Act an article shall be deemed to be adulterated:

In case of drugs:

First. If, when a drug is sold under or by a name recognized in the United States Pharmacopoeia or National Formulary, it differs from the standard of strength, quality, as determined by the test laid down in the United States Pharmacopoeia or National Formulary official at the time of investigation. Provided, That no drug defined in the United States Pharmacopoeia or National Formulary shall be deemed to be adulterated under this provision if the standard of strength, quality, or purity be plainly stated upon the bottle, box, or other container thereof although the standard may differ from that determined by the test laid down in the United States Pharmacopoeia or National Formulary.

Second. If its strength or purity fall below the professed standard or quality under which it is sold.

In the case of confectionery:

If it contain terra alba, barytes, talc, chrome yellow, or other mineral substance or poisonous color or flavor, or other ingredient deleterious or detrimental to health, or any vinous, malt or spirituous liquor or compound or narcotic drug.

In the case of food:

First. If any substance has been mixed and packed with it so as to reduce or lower or injuriously affect its quality or strength.

Second. If any substance has been substituted wholly or in part for the article.

Third. If any valuable constituent of the article has been wholly or in part abstracted.

Fourth. If it be mixed, colored, powdered, coated, or stained in a manner whereby damage or inferiority is concealed.

Fifth. If it contain any added poisonous or other added deleterious ingredient which may render such article injurious to health: Provided, That when in the preparation of food products for shipment they are preserved by an external application applied in such manner that the preservative is necessarily removed mechanically, or by maceration in water, or otherwise, and directions for the removal of said preservative shall be printed on the covering or the package, the provisions of this Act shall be construed as applying only when said products are ready for consumption.

Sixth. If it consists in whole or in part of a filthy, decomposed, or putrid animal or vegetable substance, or any portion of an animal unfit for food, whether manufactured or not, or if it is the product of a diseased animal, or one that has died otherwise than by slaughter.

Sec. 2. That the term "misbranded," as used herein, shall apply to all drugs, or articles of food, or articles which enter into the composition of food, the package or label of which shall bear any statement, design, or device regarding such article, or the ingredients or substances contained therein which shall be false or misleading in any particular, and to any food or drug product which is falsely branded as to the State, Territory, or country in which it is manufactured or produced.

That for the purposes of this Act an article shall also be deemed to be misbranded:

In case of drugs:

First. If it be an imitation of or offered for sale under the name of another article.

Second. If the contents of the package as originally put up shall have been removed, in whole or in part, and other contents shall have been placed in such package, or if the package fail to bear a statement on the label of the quantity or proportion of any alcohol, morphine, opium, cocaine, heroin, alpha or beta eucaine, chloroform, cannabis indica, chloral hydrate, or acetanilide, or any derivative or preparation of any of such substance contained therein.

Third. If in package form, and the contents are stated in terms of weight or measure, they are not plainly and correctly stated on the outside of the package.

Fourth. If the package containing it or its label shall bear any statement, design, or device regarding the ingredients or the substances contained therein, which statement, design, or device shall be false or misleading in any particular: Provided, That an article of food which does not contain any added poisonous or deleterious ingredients shall not be deemed to be adulterated or misbranded in the following cases:

First. In the case of mixtures or compounds which may be now or from time to time hereafter known as articles of food, under their own distinctive names, and not an imitation of or offered for sale under the distinctive name of another article, if the name be accompanied on the same label or brand with a statement of the place where said article has been manufactured or produced.

Second. In the case of articles labeled, branded, or tagged so as to plainly indicate that they are compounds, imitations, or blends, and the word "compound," "imitation," or "blend," as the case may be, is plainly stated on the package in which it is offered for sale: Provided, That the term blend as used herein shall be construed to mean a mixture of like substances, not excluding harmless color-

ing or flavoring ingredients used for the purpose of coloring and flavoring only: And provided, further, That nothing in this Act shall be construed as requiring or compelling proprietors or manufacturers of proprietary foods which contain no unwholesome added ingredients to disclose their trade formulas, except in so far as the provisions of this Act may require to secure freedom from alteration or misbranding.

Sec. 3. That no dealer shall be prosecuted under the provisions of this Act when he can establish a guaranty signed by the wholesaler, jobber, manufacturer, or other party residing in the United States, from whom he purchases such articles, to the effect that the same is not adulterated or misbranded within the meaning of this Act, designating it. Said guaranty, to afford protection, shall contain the name and address of the party or parties making the sale of such articles to such dealer, and in such case said party or parties shall be amenable to the prosecutions, fines, and other penalties which would attach, in due course, to the dealer under the provisions of this Act.

Provisions are made for the examination of samples of imported foods and drugs. Furthermore any article that is impure or misbranded that is being conveyed from one state or territory into another, or is for export, or is being imported, may be proceeded against in any district court.

SUICIDE'S VICTIM DEAD

Mrs. Charles James, the wife of the negro who shot her Monday afternoon at their Liliha street home and immediately after put a six-shooter in his mouth and blew out his brains, died at the Queen's hospital last night as the result of the bullet wound in her abdomen. The report of her death was received at the police station just as the coroner's jury was about to meet in regard to the death of the husband and the inquest was postponed in order that it might deal with both deaths at one time.

WAIMEA WATER WORKS.

Tender for handling and laying water pipe for the water works of Waimea, Kauai, were opened at the office of the Superintendent of Public Works yesterday. J. H. Wilson offered to do the work in 120 days for \$790, but E. Omsted wanted only \$501 and 95 days' time.

BABCOCK GETS AWAY.

The ship W. F. Babcock, Captain Stinson, which arrived here from Baltimore on December 14, 189 days out from that port, putting in for provisions, fresh water and medical attendance, got away yesterday afternoon for Portland. She was held here by a series of libels filed by members of her crew.
