WILL NOT SUSPEND THE DAM WORK

GOVERNOR DECIDES AFTER CONFERENCE WITH OFFICIALS TO ALLOW WORK TO PROCEED.

The Nuuanu dam matter is still "in the air." That is, the Governor has decided to allow Contractor Whitehouse to continue for the present with the work.

Governor Carter held a conference with Superintendent of Public Works Holloway and Assistant Superintendent Howland yesterday afternoon, following the Executive's announcement that he would have such conference with them. Holloway and Howland, relative to the advisability of shutting down work and possibly cancelling the contract with Whitehouse. As the result of that conference it has been decided to allow the work to continue for the present. It was recommended by both Holloway and Howland that the interests of the public could be better served by having the work continue than by shutting down work under the existing conditions at the dam.

"At that conference," said the Governor this morning, "it was stated that the very vitals of the dam were exposed and would if further construction of the dam were to be stopped, the work as it now stands would be subject to damage by further storms. It was estimated that such damage might be as high as \$7,000 in event of the work being stopped now. The contractor has been working much more satisfactorily lately, so it was deemed best not to suspend the work for the present, but to allow the present work to be finished. About three weeks time will be required to finish the present line of work."

The Governor did not state, however, what action might be taken by him at the end of the three weeks.

Superintendent Holloway expressed himself as being rather desirous of having the contract cancelled and the work of constructing the dam put in charge of the Public Works department. He said that practically all of both sides of the dam have now been finished and that there remains the work of joining the sides. The distance between them is about 240 feet. Holloway said that Contractor Whitehouse had been directed three or four times to construct the fumes, but he had, thus far, failed to do so.
