**CHINA SAILS FOR COAST TOMORROW**

**LINER HELD OFF PORT—CHINESE DIES ABOARD—327 JAPANESE FOR HONOLULU.**  
Folks preparing mail for the coast were kept in suspense today on account of sickness aboard the P. M. S. S. China which was sighted coming from Oriental ports at 7 o'clock this morning. It was thought she would enter early and get away for San Francisco this afternoon.  
The liner, however, remained outside all the forenoon and there was much scurrying of the quarantine launch between her and the city.  
Yesterday a Chinese steamer passenger died and the doctor aboard deemed the case a suspicious circumstance. The U. S. Quarantine officials here considered an autopsy necessary and this took time. The case was thought to be one of bubonic plague but turned out to be a combination of pneumonia, liver complaint and old age.  
The P. M. S. S. Korea, from the coast sighted long after the China was reported, came into the harbor at noon, leaving the China outside.  
The China entered port at 2 o'clock this afternoon, docking at the Channel wharf. She sails for San Francisco at 9 o'clock tomorrow morning.  
The China, Captain Friele brings 527 Japanese for Honolulu. She has one one of the smallest cabin lists on record, there being but five persons going through first class.  
The China left Hongkong January 22 and had a pleasant passage. Her Japanese steamer passengers were taken to the immigration station this afternoon.

SAN FRANCISCO, February 2.—As the climax of a decidedly ordinary card offered by the Occidental Club at Dreamland Rink last night, Dick Sullivan easily defeated Frank Mayfield, gaining the decision in four rounds. Sullivan, who claims the title of Hawaiian champion, had the class and won as he pleased.  
In fact, the last round looked very much as if Sullivan was not letting himself go very far. Mayfield showed a willingness to fight, but Sullivan's plan of letting his opponent lead and then catching him as he came in with a left uppercut, was hard on the less experienced boy.
