Governor Is Pleased With Guard

REVIEWED MILITIA AT ENCAMPMENT—SAYS THAT HE LIKED THE GENERAL CONDITIONS.

Governor Carter has expressed himself as well pleased with the showing made by the National Guard at Lelihu last week. The Governor reviewed the guard on Saturday. He said that he was very well pleased with the general conduct and conditions of the encampment with the clean appearance made by the men and the general excellence of the place.

HAWAIIAN SUGAR HAS A SURPLUS

ANNUAL MEETING HELD TODAY—REPORT OF MANAGER BALDWIN—OVER \$800,000 SURPLUS.

The annual meeting of the Hawaiian Sugar Company was held this morning. The most interesting feature of the proceedings was the reading of the annual report of Manager B. D. Baldwin relative to what had been accomplished with Makawell Plantation for the year ending December 31, 1906.

His report was as follows: "The past year at Makawell has been exceptionally dry and the total deliveries of water from our two ditches reached a mark as low as forty-five million gallons per day. Our cane fields have suffered greatly for the lack of water and we were especially hard pressed during the summer months, when matters were made worse by a demand for water by the rice planters in Hanapepe valley, which we were obliged to give them. The leaf-hopper pest did considerable damage to some of our fields of plant cane in the beginning of the year, but the severity of the attack was for a short period and we have not been bothered to any extent by this pest since."

"I am glad to report that this crop just harvested has overrun the estimate and has yielded a total, including the Gay & Robinson sugars, of 26,844 tons of sugar. The total yield of this crop although the area was a little larger, was not as high as the 1905 crop, which was due to the severe attacks of the leaf-hoppers as they never left the fields during its entire growth."

IMPROVEMENTS. "The expenditures for permanent improvements for the past year were \$56,229. Of this \$25,000 was spent for the construction of new railroads and the material for the same and the balance was spent of which the most important items are as follows: the construction of laborers' quarters, one 20 ton Baldwin locomotive, live stock, construction of new fences and the material for a 40x120 foot warehouse at the Makawell Landing."

"At a meeting held in Honolulu October 3rd, 1906, and also at a meeting held September 21st by the Directors of Hawaiian Sugar Co., it was decided that a dynamo be installed near the Mill, to be operated by a Pelton wheel to furnish lighting for the Mill, etc., as the present plant was entirely too small. It was also decided to equip our lighterage outfit at the Makawell Landing so that we could handle from 500 to 750 tons sugar per day, as it is necessary to handle this amount in order to make direct shipment of sugar from Makawell Landing by American-Hawaiian steamers via the Tehuantepec route. We have ordered a 35 H. P. gasolene launch from San Francisco and are having three boats made in Honolulu. It is hoped that the above equipment will be here in time so that we can handle the first American-Hawaiian steamer to arrive here in February, 1907."

"Outside of the above new dynamo and improved lighterage equipment and possibly the extension of our railroads, there will be very little spent on improvements for the coming year."

SUGAR FACTORY. "The crop just harvested is the first we have taken off by the roller system at Makawell. It is gratifying to report that the results have been very satisfactory and the cost of manufacture has been reduced greatly. We are well pleased with our twelve roller Mill which has proved itself to be strong and well made in every instance. The new copper coils which were installed in our 15-foot vacuum pan have made this pan now a uqick boiler and a steam saver. The automatic feeders in the fire room are giving good satisfaction and have enabled us to reduce the expense in this department. Altogether our factory is now in better shape and I think the cost of manufacture for the crop now being harvested, will be less than it was last year."

"The above shows a larger rainfall at the three stations on the plantation and Hanapepe ditch than we had in 1905, but this rainfall was not well distributed as more than half of the rain fell during the months of January, November and December at the stations on the plantation and more than one-third of the rainfall at Hanapepe ditch fell during the same period."

Treasurer J. P. Cooke reported that the assets amounted to \$2,968,875.73, including the growing crops which are valued at \$612,358.59, and the sugar in the mill and in transit which amounts to \$213,427.58.

The liabilities are represented by \$2,000,000 of capital stock, \$500,000 of bonds and various other smaller debts, which leave the surplus at \$300,500.55.
