vised laws. The bill passed first reading by title.

Representative Correa introduced a bill which amends section 1 of Act 64 of the session laws of 1905 relating to certificates of Hawaiian birth.

Representative Keauolu introduced two resolutions one to provide \$1000 to build a teacher's cottage at Honouapo and the other providing \$500 to enlarge the warehouse at that place. The first was referred to Committee on Education and the second to the committee on internal improvement.

ADOPTION OF CHILDREN.
Representative Sheldon introduced a bill to amend section 2835 of the revised laws relating to the adoption of children. Passed first reading by title.

Representative Keouli introduced a resolution that \$500 be appropriated for the purpose of erecting a teacher's cottage at Honamau. Referred to the committee on education.

COURT HOUSE FOR HAMAKUA.
Representative Moanuale asked for \$4,000 to build a district court for Hamakua. Resolution referred to committee on improvements.

Representative Kanoho introduced a bill which passed first reading by title providing for the segregation or isolation of any leper by the board of health at any other place than the settlement.

\$40,000 FOR ROADS.
Kalana asked for \$40,000 to repair the government road in South Hilo. Resolution referred to the committee on internal improvements.

The seven bills reported to the house by the printing committee passed first reading by title.

The House took a recess at 11:20 a. m. until 2 p. m.

The Judiciary Committee met at 1 p. m. in the office of W. T. Rawlins.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

"The House will please come to order." The gavel fell, legislators straightened themselves in their chairs and the afternoon session of the fifth day of the 1907 session of the House was opened.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A communication was received by the House from C. L. Holloway stating in full the sums which have been expended under the Loan Act of 1905, the sums still unexpended, and the work completed, under way and those contemplated. Mr. Holloway's report was made in detail.

ISLAND SOLDIERS
LEAVE FOR HOMES

COMPANY I DEPARTS FOR HILO BY THE KINAU TODAY—MAUI COMPANY ALSO DEPARTS.

Company I, of Hilo, and D of Maui, departed by the steamer Kinau for home today. Shortly after 11 o'clock the island companies escorted by Company E and headed by the band, marched from the drill shed grounds through the Capitol grounds to King street and on to the wharf. Members of the legislature were grouped on the steps of the Capitol building, as the soldiers passed. The legislators gave cheers for the gallant soldier boys.

IN THE SENATE

Senator Coelho moved a recess subject to the call of the chair.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

A discussion of the probable effect of Col. McCarthy's bill for reapportionment occupied the attention of the senators prior to reconvening this afternoon and the consensus of opinion was that when the bill reached third reading or before, it would be killed owing to changes made in the apportionment for Kauai and Hawaii.

The clerk read a communication from the House to the effect that Senate bill No. 15 had passed the House in third reading.

Senator McCarthy then moved a reconsideration of the resolution fixing the pay of officers of the senate. This carried and the Senator then moved that the pay of the assistant clerk be fixed at eight dollars per day for the reason that he is both interpreter and clerk. Senator Coelho moved that the pay of the chaplain be \$200 instead of \$150. Both amendments were promptly seconded by Senator Makaka.

Senators Dowsett and Smith opposed the increase of salary to chaplain and the amendment was lost.

Senate bill No. 10 relating to pounds was read the second time and referred to the Ways and Means committee.

Senator Dowsett reported from Ways and Means committee relating to encouragement of diversified industries being particularly associated with the cultivation of grapes. The bill was amended and passed second reading.

Senator Smith reported from the Judiciary committee on the resolution to appoint a tax commission. This was made the order of the day for Wednesday. A recess was then taken on motion of Senator Coelho until 2:30 p. m.

Senator Lane reported that Bills 8 and 21 had been printing. The first was read second time and referred to Ways and Means Committee.

Senate Bill No. 21 practically the same as the joint resolution now in course, referred to the appointment of a tax commission. The bill on motion of Senator Coelho was laid on the table to be considered with the joint resolution.

WARSHIPS OFF FOR HILO TODAY

CROWDS GATHERED AT NAVAL STATION TO WITNESS DEPARTURE OF SQUADRON.

There was a great crowd on the waterfront, in the neighborhood of the United States naval station about 2 o'clock this afternoon to witness the departure of the Japanese training squadron for Hilo.

The flagship Itakushima will be the first to leave. She lies in the middle slip. Then the Matsushima will back out, followed by the Hashidate which lies at the town end of the naval wharves.

Since the squadron has been in port several Japanese have managed to enlist as seamen and freemen aboard the vessels, but it is not known that any of those who came in the ships have left here. The officers of the squadron leave Honolulu with pleasant impressions. At Hilo they will be enthusiastically welcomed. From Hilo the warships go to the Colonies and India.
