GAY THE STAR LANAI WITNESS

VERY INTERESTING TESTIMONY BROUGHT OUT AT SESSION OF THE HOUSE LANAI COMMITTEE.

The Lanai investigation was resumed last night by the committee on Public Lands.

F. E. Harvey of the Territorial Survey office identified various points on a map of Lanai, and also testified in regard to the water supply on that island.

M. T. Lyons of the Public Lands office stated that shortly after the publication of the Lanai exchange advertisements Mr. Pratt left Honolulu. Lyons took charge of the office during Mr. Pratt's absence and in that time, he said, Mr. Cooper filed the only application that was received.

F. S. Dodge, superintendent of the Bishop Estate said that as long ago as 1901 Mr. Holloway had told him that the government would like to secure the Bishop wharves; the deal had not been made because, Mr. Dodge thought no appropriation for this purpose had been asked for by Mr. Holloway. In 1906 a third party had offered a certain sum for the wharves, it being understood that this property if sold, was to be exchanged for Lanai lands. He afterward learned that the third party was the Territorial Government.

L. M. Vellesen of the Mutual Telephone Co. testified regarding the water supply and the character of land on Lanai. He thought the island is fit only for grazing purposes; he never knew of any crops being grown there. A thousand acres, said Mr. Vellesen, would hardly suffice to support a man.

Charles Gay then appeared before the committee. He stated that he had been engaged in ranching on Lanai about four years and a half.

In 1900 Mr. Pa'ala set a price on Lanai to Mr. Gay of \$600,000; he (Mr. Gay) who at that time was unaware that any portion of the island was government land, offered \$150,000. The deal fell through. At the time of the Pa'ala and Neumann foreclosure Mr. Gay bought Pa'ala's interest (two-thirds) for \$108,000; this comprised about 8,000 acres.

He stated further that to secure all the island exclusive of the government lands and the Gibson and Irwin tracts, he had paid \$159,000.

Mr. Gay said that he had consulted Governor Dole in regard to some agreement whereby the government lands could be consolidated and the Gay ranch lands likewise; in other words by a system of exchange all the government lands and all Mr. Gay's lands could be brought together in two separate divisions of the island. Governor Dole retired before the arrangement could be effected. Afterward Mr. Pratt offered Mr. Gay all the government lands on Lanai for \$150,000, which he (Mr. Gay) rejected as absurd. Afterward Mr. Gay had another conversation with the subject with Governor Carter and Mr. Pratt, and was then informed that negotiations were pending for the acquisition of the Bishop wharves by the government, the price set upon this property being, so Mr. Gay understood, \$135,000. The deal again fell through. Since that time, Gay says, he has not been personally connected with the affair. He stated that at the time he bought the Lanai lands his idea was to eventually acquire the whole island. He now understands that to acquire the whole island with the exception of the Irwin lands, his total outlay will be \$252,000.

If however, Mr. Gay stated, he had known at the time he made the first purchase, the lands he now expects to acquire would cost him \$252,000, he would never have bought any property on Lanai. The whole question seems to hinge upon the possession of the Maunaloa spring; whoever holds the spring, in Mr. Gay's opinion, controls the island, as it is the only dependable source of water on Lanai.

The committee adjourned at 10:15 p. m. until this evening at 7.

WORK OF NUUANU DAM COMMITTEE

IT MET LAST NIGHT AND WENT OVER A GREAT DEAL OF THE CORRESPONDENCE.

There was a full house at the meeting of the committee investigating the Nuuanu dam last night. Messrs. Holloway, Howland and Whitehouse being present by invitation. During the day it had been rumored that a resolution calling off the investigation was to be introduced but a canvass of the members apparently showed such opposition to the move that it was not presented.

The meeting was called to order at 7:45 p. m. when the secretary, R. A. Kearns, read the minutes of the last meeting which were approved.

The secretary read communications from the Superintendent of Public Works forwarding other communications containing data requested.

Representative Hughes suggested that only answers to letters be read as there is such a mass of correspondence that it would take a long time to get through.

The chair remarked that the form of procedure was here and he would aim to follow that plan.

Replying to the chair Mr. Holloway said that the first correspondence with Mr. Kellogg was by cable, a copy of which may not be in the papers handed to the committee.

The active man on the committee last night was Senator Kalama who was busy smoking most of the time

the affair lasted. No witnesses were examined during the hour the letters were being read and the quiet was so deathlike that the dropping of a pin would have disturbed the committee.

At 8:30 the chair requested Superintendent Holloway to have copies of cables to Kellogg ready to submit to the committee on Tuesday night. As testimony was to be taken the witnesses were dismissed.
