REFUSING DUTY DON'T GO IN MANILA

AMERICAN SAILORS CAN'T DISCHARGE THEMSELVES BY THAT MEANS IN PHILIPPINE PORT.

The Manila Cablenews of October 21, last year, says:

It has been laid down as a ruling by the American Consul at this port, Mr. Hartford Beaumont, acting special deputy collector, that no American sailor coming to this port in an American ship can discharge himself by refusing duty. The cause of this ruling is an attempt on the part of a sailor named Tane who arrived here the other day on the American ship Erskine M. Phelps that brought a load of coal for the navy.

The Phelps entered here, and then went over to Cavite to unload her cargo. When it came to working cargo Tane declined with thanks, and said that he had enough reasons for leaving the ship to fill a library. Meanwhile he refused to work and demanded his discharge.

One of the fine points about Manila so far as the American shipmaster is concerned is, that he never knows just what he can do with his crew. As a result Captain Graham brought the man over to the customs house and explained matters to Mr. Beaumont.

Beaumont was judicial and firm. He told the man that refusal of duty was a misdemeanor. Then Tane told a long story that freely translated means that the food was poor on the Phelps and that the fore-castle was dirty, and anyhow he wanted to leave and join the navy. As the man is an intelligent well set up American sailor he will probably have no trouble getting into the navy, but he will not get paid off in this port from the Phelps. He was told that if he would go back to his ship and work on her until she was ready to sail, if the captain was willing, (and Captain Graham said he was) he would then be discharged. That however did not suit Tane so yesterday he took French leave and with a few clothes deserted.

This same difficulty meets every American shipmaster. Sailors insist on leaving their ships and try to use the Insular government as a collecting agency for their pay. The plan is over-worked, and it is stated as a fact that after this any sailor refusing duty will be sent back to his ship with scant ceremony unless his complaint happens to be well founded. Deserters from American ships under the law cannot be punished, but men leaving foreign ships at this port will be apprehended by the police on application by the master.

Lanai Will Not Support Settlers

HOUSE COMMITTEE RETURNS FROM TRIP OF INVESTIGATION WATER INSUFFICIENT.

The House Committee of the Legislature which went to Lanai on Friday to look into the Lanai land matter, reached home about 1 o'clock this morning on the S. S. Likelike, after two days of strenuous investigation on the much discussed island. Most of the time was spent on horseback and some of the party are about all in today as a consequence, though all declare that they enjoyed every minute of the time spent on the island.

As a result of the visit the committee will undoubtedly endorse unreservedly the sale of the public land on Lanai. All of the members were fully convinced that the island is practically worthless from an agricultural standpoint, to any person, owing to the lack of water. Charles Gay, who is the only person engaged in an enterprise on the island, the members say, has scarcely sufficient water for domestic purposes and for his stock.

The investigating party reached the island about 4 o'clock Saturday morning, where they found horses awaiting them, and they rode the seven miles distance from the landing to the ranch houses of Mr. Gay, where they were entertained with breakfast. Afterwards the whole party under their host's escort, again remounted and spent the entire day riding over the island. On Sunday the party again started out early and until 4 o'clock were riding over the part of the territory not visited the day previous.

The members report that there is a great deal of land with splendid soil and, well situated for farming if there could only be a certain supply of water, but according to the report, this is exactly what there can never be, and the island must ever remain a grazing district as at present. Attempts to get water by drilling wells and sinking two deep shafts, have failed to get more than the most meager supply of good water, and at great depths, the water secured is brackish, or very salty. The character of the ground is said to be such that the water from rainfall is so rapidly absorbed, as to make reservoirs for conserving this supply impracticable.

Mr. Gay, who at present owns the entire island, unless he is dispossessed by the courts, owns some thousands of sheep and some cattle, but makes no attempt at agriculture.

Some of the Legislative party had a great deal of sport shooting wild goats, thousands of which live among the mountains, and also wild hogs, of which there appeared to be many.
