HAD ORDERS TO KEEP ON BOARD

BUT CONSULTATION RESULTS IN TRANSPORT THOMAS' TROOPS COMING ASHORE.

The officers and men of the Twenty-sixth Infantry, two troops of the Tenth Cavalry, 171 recruits for the Tenth Cavalry and more than 100 saloon passengers arrived here yesterday on the transport Thomas. The infantrymen are destined for Manila, and the cavalrymen disembarked at Honolulu. Among the cabin passengers are Colonel Daniel H. Brusca, of the Twenty-fourth Infantry, and Major Z. W. Torrey, Inspector-General.

As the transport docked, at 3:20 o'clock, the band of the 26th Infantry played and the crowd on the wharf took notice, critically wondering if it was as good as Berger's band. First Lieutenant R. K. Spiller is the new quartermaster captain aboard the troopship. Captain Lynam remains the navigating master.

When the vessel docked a couple of newspapermen got aboard and discovered that orders had been issued that no one should be allowed ashore from the boat, nor should anyone from ashore be allowed aboard the transport.

A notice was posted on the bulletin board, outside the office of the quartermaster captain on the Thomas, to the effect that, owing to sickness in Honolulu, the vessel should be kept in quarantine. Everybody aboard looked gloomy at the prospect of being cooped aboard during what would otherwise be a breathing spell in Honolulu. This was an order that greatly surprised the Army officials here and a consultation was held and it was concluded that the order of quarantine issued by the transport service San Francisco headquarters probably referred to the return trip of the Thomas. At any rate it was to Captain Humphreys of Honolulu and he told the folks to walk ashore, which they did most gladsomely.

Incidentally, though the incident may be heard from later officially, while the discussion as to what should be done was progressing, the representative of the Honolulu postoffice and therefore of the United States mail was kept waiting exactly thirty minutes at the head of the gangway, not being allowed aboard. At the same time the transport's dirty linen was freely dumped on the wharf in bags and the laundryman beat the U. S. mail off the wharf by an hour.

Later the entire Twenty-sixth Infantry marched through the principal streets, led by their band, and the men stepped out as if glad to be ashore.

The transport sails for Manila tomorrow morning at 11 o'clock.

WIRELESS SHOOTING MATCH IS ASSURED

ARRANGEMENTS ABOUT COMPLETED FOR CONTEST WITH MAUI TEAM.

Final arrangements are being made by the Hawaiian Gun Club for the match with the Maui team which is to be conducted by wireless telegraphy. The Maui aggregation of shooters have entered enthusiastically into the spirit of the scheme, and have fixed on the 23rd of this month as the date of holding the shoot. There still remains some details to be decided upon, but for the most part the arrangements have been made.

The shoot is to be a 50-bird match, and each club will probably put in eight men, although there is just a possibility that a six man snoot may be decided upon. The teams are to shoot simultaneously and under like conditions as regards distance, angles, etc., according to the Interstate Association of Trap Shooters' rules. The results will be transmitted back and forth by wireless.

The personnel of the Maui team has not as yet been received, but will probably be received by the next boat. The local shooters who will take part are for the most part known, and are as follows: J. W. Harvey, D. L. Austin, K. B. Porter, L. C. King, J. A. Robb, and Irwin Spalding. The other two members will be selected from the following: W. E. Wall, J. E. Whitney, A. Waterhouse and E. I. Spalding.

GRAND JURY INVESTIGATION.

The Territorial grand jury was busy yesterday investigating complaints made against J. F. Colbron's resort at Pearl City. It was claimed that improper happenings were permitted to go on at that saloon. Colbron married Mary Jane Gilman recently. DUNNING AT LOCAL CAMP

THE MAJOR WILL SAIL, FROM SAN FRANCISCO ON 15TH WITH NEW TROOPS.

SAN FRANCISCO, June 2.—Major Samuel W. Dunning, adjutant-general of the Pacific division, United States Army has just received orders which will take him from San Francisco. He will sail for Honolulu with a battalion of the Twentieth Infantry from Monterey, leaving here on June 15th. The Twentieth goes to relieve the Tenth, which has been ordered to Alaska, and Major Dunning will be placed in command of Camp McKinley, at Honolulu. The order is almost as much of a surprise to his wide circle of friends. While still a Captain, he was detailed as assistant adjutant-general in August, 1901, and came to this city in March, 1903, as military secretary of the Department of California. Later he was transferred to the Pacific division, at which station he has since remained. Major and Mrs. Dunning are well known in society, and after the fire, which destroyed their home and household goods, they moved to Burlingame.

KEI HIN BANK CASE OUT OF THE COURT

SOME SENSATIONAL ALLEGATIONS WERE MADE, BUT SETTLED WITHOUT TRIAL.

That suit against the Kei Hin Bank of an accounting, came to an end this morning, when M. Kawasaki, the plaintiff, filed a notice of discontinuance. It was claimed that the Kei Hin Bank secured control of considerable money during its operations in Honolulu, and Kawasaki made some sensational allegations in his complaint. But the matter appears to have been settled out of court.

The ejectment case of Gaspar vs. Mary Low et al is still on trial before Judge Lindsay today. Wade Warren Thayer attorney for plaintiff and defendant-in-error in the case of Wo Sing Co. vs. Yuen Akau doing business under the name of Y. Akau, has asked that the Supreme Court deny the petition of defendant and plaintiff-in-error in the appeal from his first circuit court.
