PUNAHOU ALUMNI ASSOCIATION MEETS

DELIGHTFUL AFTERNOON SPENT IN ANNUAL REUNION ON COLLEGE GROUNDS.

The annual reunion of the Punahou Alumni Association which was held yesterday afternoon on the grounds of the Oahu College, was attended by perhaps six hundred of the former students of the famous old institution, and was one of the most pleasant gatherings which has ever been held by the association.

For the most part the gathering was social, but at the opening a brief business session was held at which time the following officers for the coming year were elected: Judge Antonio Perry, president; Judge W. L. Whitney, vice president and Mrs. D. Howard Hitchcock, secretary-treasurer.

A number of addresses were made by different members of the association most of which were of decidedly practical value, and looked to the upbuilding and further improvement of the institution which they represent. A. C. Alexander was chairman of the day, and he called upon the various speakers.

President Griffiths of the College, was the first to speak. He told of the progress the school has made in the past year, and of the number of gifts which have made possible a new library and an athletic field; and he suggested where more such gifts could be well utilized. President Griffiths' ambition is to have Oahu College not only a college in name but one in fact, as well.

P. C. Jones next spoke, briefly, giving the financial status of the school, which on the whole was very creditable.

Judge Perry on behalf of the association presented to Mr. and Mrs. E. P. Low a handsome enlargement of a view of the Punahou grounds, as a prize to the parents having the best representation in the College for the past year. Mr. and Mrs. Low have had seven children in the school all the year. A number of other parents had almost as good a record. W. H. Hoogs and J. A. Magoon, each had seven children in school during the year, while H. F. Bertelman, Charles Gay and H. E. Cooper had sent six members of their families.

Mrs. B. F. Dillingham read a very choice piece of poetry which she had written and dedicated to Mrs. Susan L. Mills.

Mrs. Mills was made the recipient of a beautiful picture showing Punahou College and grounds in the early days and responded in a short address of thanks, in which she told of her early experiences at Punahou.

J. A. Wilder, J. Q. Wood and several others made brief talks, after which the guests partook of a feast of delicious fruit, which for many years has been one of the notable events in the reunion of the Association.

During the afternoon there was music by the Waimapu Glee Club the College Glee Club, and the Hawaiian Band, and a number of songs were sung by the company. The afternoon was a most pleasant one for all present.
