Edward Hore, has been admitted to the bar of the Territory, his oath having been placed on record with the Circuit clerk.

In the bankruptcy case of John C. Abreu, the accounts of the trustee, C. S. Dole were approved and ordered closed and the trustee discharged.

A cable has been received from Editor Shiozawa of Hawaii Shippo, stating that he would return by the America Maru, due September 13.

Captain Von Oterendorp will leave for San Francisco on the Sierra tomorrow after a visit here. His daughter, Mrs. Emil Berndt, will go with him.

T. C. McGuire rouled a total of 1230 pins yesterday afternoon in six games breaking all records that have been made before here. His average was 265 for each game.

Hee Leong, a small Chinese merchant, filed a petition of voluntary bankruptcy this morning. The indebtedness is small and the assets as declared nil.

The appointment of Chester A. Doyle as Japanese Interpreter by Judge De Bolt, was this morning confirmed by Chief Justice Hartwell, of the Supreme Court, and the new appointee was sworn in.

Antonio G. Correa has filed his answer to his wife Adelaide V. Correa's amended libel for divorce denying all of the sensational allegations of the bill relating to desertion, non-support, cruelty, abuse, etc.

In the case of Wing Wo Lung & Co., bankrupts, in the United States District Court, J. F. Morgan, trustee was this morning discharged, his accounts being accepted and approved and ordered closed.

A libel for divorce has been filed in the Circuit Court by John K. Hiram Jr., against Annie K. Hiram on grounds of desertion. The petitioner resides in Honolulu while his wife is said to live at Waialua. They were married in 1898, but have not lived together since 1901. Two children are the result of the union.

Consumption is again the only contagious disease that appears in the mortuary report. There were nine cases during the last half of August. The mortuary report shows 65 deaths and 112 births during August. There were 125 marriages reported. Consumption led as a cause of death, with 14 cases. The death rate is 19.84.

Kim Yong Hum, the Korean who was brought down from Maui on Sunday by Marshal Hendry on charge of counterfeiting, was given a hearing this morning before U. S. Commissioner Hatch, who bound him over to the October term of Court under \$2,500 bail. The prisoner was unable to raise the amount and was remanded to jail.

THE GRAND JURY IS SWORN IN

JUDGE LINDSAY DELIVERS CHARGE AND APPOINTS DAVID THURM AS FOREMAN.

The Grand Jury of the Circuit Court for the September term was organized in Judge Lindsay's court this morning, as were each of the trial juries of the several judges of the court.

The roll of Grand Jurors was called and eighteen of the twenty-three whose names had been drawn, who had received the summons were present. Of this number F. T. P. Waterhouse, a member of the Board of Health; and James L. McLean, a jury commissioner, were excused on account of their positions, while Charles Koelling was excused by the court on account of business reasons.

After reading his charge to the Grand Jury, Judge Lindsay named David S. Thurm as foreman of the body, and S. W. Kaleikini as bailiff, after which they retired to their room to take up their deliberations. No special matters were treated in the charge.

The trial venire of Judge Robinson and Judge De Bolt were summoned and afterwards dismissed for the day. They will likely not be called on again for a day or two.

There are no cases of importance to come up within the next few days.

The prosecution of all the criminal cases for the present term of Circuit Court will be handled by County Attorney John W. Cathcart, who agreed to take the work ordinarily looked after by the Attorney General's department as a favor to Attorney General Hemenway whose force has not been entirely appointed and is not organized as yet.

HOT TIME ON STEAMSHIP ASIA

AN INSANE JAPANESE GAVE PASSENGERS A SCARE AND FOUGHT OFFICERS.

SAN FRANCISCO, Aug. 19.—The officials of the Occidental & Oriental Steamship Company are trying to find out who was responsible for sending to Japan on the last trip from here of the liner Asia, two insane Japanese. They were both steerage passengers. One was suffering from a mild and harmless form of dementia, but the other was a terror that Capt. Gaukroger and his officers will never forget. Their recollections will be shared by the passengers.

The strange actions of the little brown man were noticed shortly after the liner started on its way across the Pacific, but it was not until two days out from this port that the real excitement began. The Japanese, whose insanity was of a violent form, appeared that afternoon on the saloon deck with a wild yell and charged a group of passengers, who fled in all directions. The piercing screams of a woman brought all hands to the scene of the disturbance and there they found the Japanese armed with a shuffle board defying the universe.

"I'll get the beggars," volunteered a big quartermaster approaching the little maniac. "Swish" went the weapon through the air and "Bat" landed on the quartermaster's head, putting that mariner soundly to sleep. Pleased with his work, the Japanese shrieked out another few lines of defiance and started around the deck at full gallop with Capt. Gaukroger and part of the Asia's crew after him. After half an hour of exciting chasing the skipper and his men closed in on the little brown man to a place of safety, where after another demonstration of violence he was placed in a strait jacket.

George C. Sea, office deputy of High Sheriff Henry, will leave this evening with his wife for a several weeks vacation trip which will be spent on Molokai, Maui, and possibly some of the other islands. This is the first vacation which this popular official has had for several years, and as his health is not good, he expects to derive much benefit from the trip.

The Withof admiralty case, which is a libel by the former mate of the barkentine Fullerton for \$15,000 damages which he claims by reason of injuries received which resulted in the loss of an arm, will probably be submitted to Judge Dole in the U. S. District Court this afternoon. The final arguments are being made for the defense by Attorney Lewis. The case has been in progress for several weeks.

COUNTY IS SHORT OF ROAD WORKERS

WENTY-TWO OF THE PRISON GANG SUDDENLY WITHDRAWN THIS MORNING.

The sending of 22 convicts to Hawaii this evening to build the new crater road, has seriously interfered with the County road work. This morning the work at the Moiliili quarries was not resumed owing to the fact that the prisoners were not sent out and Road Supervisor Sam Johnson had not been notified that the men were to be taken off so soon.

The removal of the convicts will be a matter which will be seriously felt by the County which is shy on road funds and is dependent in no small degree on the cutting off of a bunch of the superfluous lunas who are foisted on poor Sam Johnson by the politicians of the County Board of Supervisors. In about double the number required, Sam can't kick because he puts his head in jeopardy if he does; in fact it said that his head is not very secure anyhow and that several Supervisors who have political axes to grind would be only too glad to see him officially decapitated.

RAPID TRANSIT PREPARES CHANGES

NOTICE SENT TO THE BOARD OF SUPERVISORS OF SWITCH CHANGES.

A letter has been received by the Board of Supervisors from Manager Ballentyne of the Rapid Transit Company stating that as permission had been granted to the Company by Superintendent of Public Works Hollaway to lay new sidings and to remove some of the present ones, they intended to start work at once.

A new siding will be laid on Liliha street between King and Kukui, and the present one on Liliha street above School street will be removed. The siding on Hotel near River street will also be removed. A new switch will be built on Beretania street Walkiki of Makiki, and the present siding on Beretania street near the Kamoli church will be removed.

The Board of Supervisors will hold a meeting tomorrow night at the regular time, to take up some bills that have to be passed, and to discuss their regular routine business.
