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FAGIN JUNK MEN

YOUNGSTERS ENCOURAGED TO THEFT BY THE WILLINGNESS OF JUNK DEALERS TO BUY THEIR PURLOINED GOODS—STOLE BRASS VALVES, TOOLS AND SUPPLIES AND SHEET COPPER—TERRITORY IS NOW IN THE CASE.

Everything seems to point to J. Rosenberg, the junk dealer who was arrested yesterday by the United States authorities on charge of receiving stolen goods, as a Fagin whose encouragement to young boys to become criminals was little less diabolical than that of the famous Dickens character who ran a school of crime. Further investigation has brought to light a great quantity of brass and copper goods that it is claimed could scarcely have been come by honestly.

Among the stuff found secreted under a pile of trash was this morning found some fifty to seventy-five brand new brass valves worth from \$1.50 to \$2.50 per piece, which were identified as having been stolen from the Sewer Department of the Territory. This will bring the Territory, as well as the Federal government into the case, which seems to be closing in very tightly about Rosenberg.

A lot of other tools and supplies in the junk shop are thought to have been stolen from the County Road department, and search warrants will probably be issued and a careful search made for missing property of this kind.

Rosenberg is out on bail of \$2,000 furnished by A. Dowsett. He will probably be given a preliminary hearing on Saturday.

A Jap named Saka, a manufacturer of brass and copper goods, whose place is at the corner of Smith and Pauahi streets, was also arrested on a federal warrant charging him with receiving goods stolen from the U. S. Navy de-

CRUISER MEN HAVE A PARADE

A battalion of Marines, and a battalion of sailors with the marine band, under the command of Captain Lay, and Lieutenant Allen of the West Virginia, formed at the foot of Richards streets this morning, and started out for a practice march. The battalions marched up Richards street to King and turned Ewa into King. The marines were dressed in the regulation field uniform, while the blue jackets wore white, with regulation leggings and carried rifles.

The men presented a very fine appearance, and nearly every one on the line of march came out, and cheered for the boys who defend the flag. The men marched in fours, and were equal to the West Pointers, who have the reputation of being the best drilled body of men in the United States service. The men will be given drills every day while the ships are in port, and it is possible that all the officers and sailors from the "Big Four" will have a parade before the ships leave, was the statement made by one of the officers today. In the event of the four ships taking part in a parade, there will be in the neighborhood of four thousand men in line. A parade like this will not only be a very inspiring sight for the public, but will also be one of the best object lessons that could be given, to show what the Navy could do in the event of having to land a force to protect any city. The men are given a good deal of drilling whenever they get a chance to be ashore, and the march today is the first of the many that will be given before the fleet leave.

RULING SUSTAINED.

The Supreme Court this morning gave a decision in the case of Hoopli Wire (w) v. Waiakua Agricultural Co., Ltd., a corporation, Maria A. Kalamake, Becky Kalamake, a minor, by J. Waiakua Kelki, her guardian, E. K. Kaitaha and Peliki. In the lower court a verdict was directed for defendants and this ruling is sustained. The case was an ejectment suit.

BIERCE VS. HUTCHINS MASON BUNCOED

OLD CASE MAKES A SECOND START ON LONG ROAD TO WASHINGTON.

The Supreme Court gave a decision this morning reviving the famous case of the W. W. Bierce Company against Clinton J. Hutchins, trustee for the Kona Sugar Co., which has already been to Washington once on appeal. Incidentally the court places of record a decision following its Notley case ruling, which held that a Supreme justice was not necessarily disqualified to hear a case in which he had at one time been counsel. Justice Ballou was of counsel in the Bierce case, but sat as justice in the case. The ruling caused a lot of discussion when it was given in the Notley case.

In the decision this morning the court holds that there are undecided points, not ruled upon before and therefore not taken up by the Supreme Court of the United States, which may now be raised.

The suit is for Kona railroad property valued at about \$30,000. The case is the one in behalf of which the Organic Act was suddenly and mysteriously amended by Congress, to allow appeals from here in all cases involving \$5,000 or over.

BISHOP ESTATE IS WORTH \$2,920,572

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES APPROVED THIS MORNING BY JUDGE DE BOLT.

The trustees of the Bernice P. Bishop Estate, E. F. Bishop, S. M. Damon and W. O. Smith, have filed with the Circuit Court their 22nd annual report for the year ending June 30th. Together with the financial report are very voluminous reports from the Principals of the Kamehameha schools, and reports in detail on management of the big property with its varied interests.

The report estimates the estate worth \$2,920,572.96; and shows the income for the year to have been \$380,410.41, which includes \$15,981.62 carried over in cash from the preceding year. The investments, etc., for the year were \$308,788.85, leaving a balance of \$21,621.56.

The master's report was this morning approved by Judge De Bolt.

CAUGHT MURDERER.

YOKOHAMA, Aug. 24.—Shanghai wires under date of August 20th that the U. S. cruiser Galveston, on board which the suspect Adsett is detained was ordered to leave Chefoo. At the same time the British Consul at Chefoo telegraphically asked the Hawaiian authorities for the despatch of a warship and the British sloop Clio arrived at Chefoo. Afterwards, the order for the departure of the Galveston was cancelled and the Clio returned to Wei-hai-wei. The murderer is still on board the American warship at Chefoo. Negotiations are now proceeding as to the surrender of the culprit, a United States citizen, who is charged with having committed the crime in Hongkong, British territory, and who was arrested at Chefoo, Chinese territory.
