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CORREA WON CASE

JUDGE DE BOLT PROMPTLY THROWS OUT MRS. CORREA'S SUIT FOR DIVORCE.

Mrs. Adelaide V. Correa lost her suit for divorce from her husband Antonio G. Correa, the attorney, by a decision of Judge De Bolt this morning.

The end of the case came suddenly and somewhat unexpectedly to those who had been following it. A small amount of evidence was heard for the defense this morning upon the convening of court at 9:30 o'clock, and then contrary to expectations attorneys for both sides waived arguments and submitted the case on its merits.

Judge De Bolt handed down his decision without leaving the bench. He stated that inasmuch as the testimony in the case had been very contradictory, he did not think any good could come from his reviewing it, and he felt sure in his own mind that the libellant had failed to make her case, and he thereupon found judgment for the libellee.

Mrs. Correa was suing her husband on sensational grounds for complete separation, and the case had been on for several days. The bill of complaint claimed that Correa had failed to support her properly, and that he had therefore been unable to provide for his wife as fully as formerly. The charges of cruelty made by Mrs. Correa were not very well substantiated.

The case has attracted a good deal of interest especially among the Portuguese, among whom both parties to the case were quite prominent.

CHARGE FRAUD AND COLLUSION

PAVING THE WAY FOR REOPENING OF THE AFONG LITIGATION.

A formal opening of the way for the expected new Afong litigation has been made by the sending of notices to all the parties, by Thompson & Clemons, counsel of Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Burns, of the withdrawal of Mr. and Mrs. Burns from the agreement of compromise made last month.

The agreement in question was between Mrs. Julia Afong on the one hand and the following on the other: Albert F. Afong, A. Henry Afong, Mary C. Afong, Julia H. Johnstone, Alice L. Hutchingson, Helen G. Henshall, Nancy L. McStocker, Carrie B. Riggs, Emiline M. Magoon, Marie K. Humphreys, Melaine B. Brewster, Etta P. Whiting, Martha M. Dougherty, Tony Andrew, John Alfred Magoon, A. S. Humphreys, Frank B. McStocker, J. Morton Riggs, James W. W. Brewster, Arthur Johnstone, William H. Whiting, Andrew J. Dougherty, Elizabeth Afong, May Francis Henry Afong, Afong and Julia A. Afong.

The grounds for withdrawal of the signatures from the agreement are given as follows: "Said signatures having been procured through and by misrepresentation, fraud and collusion and without consideration and said purported agreement not having been signed by all the parties contemplated as parties signatory thereto."

STRATHCONA GOING EAST.

NEW YORK, Aug. 29.—Lord Strathcona, lord high commissioner of Canada, who has just returned for England on the steamer Oceanic, is completing his 151st round trip across the Atlantic. This means that when he has finished his present trip he will have made 302 voyages across the ocean. Lord Strathcona is eighty years old and made his first ocean voyage when still a child.

TITLE TO MAHUKA

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT WILL PROBABLY BRING FRIENDLY CONDEMNATION SUIT.

District Attorney Breckons and Captain Otwell have been working on the Mahuka site title, and it is probable, as stated in The Star some time ago, that there will have to be a friendly condemnation suit to straighten out the matter of title. The record title is not in very satisfactory condition, and the federal government is very strict indeed in such matters.

Examinations of the title show that there are various inaccuracies in the descriptions of boundaries, and there may be some difficulty in correcting them. This, however, will not effect the carrying out of the federal purchase of the lot, as far as is known, though it is highly probable that the title as offered will be refused, and a suit instated upon, with many possibly interested parties as defendants, to get a court decree which will make the title absolutely beyond attack.

This is the policy pursued by the federal government in several other cases where purchases of lands have been made, at Pearl Harbor and Waikeiki. Uncle Sam has not much liking, generally speaking, for the record titles here, as the old records based upon probate and other proceedings have been found unreliable. The Torrens Land Court, it is claimed, is straightening out much of the trouble. When it comes to a purchase of real estate, the federal government likes to settle everything by a friendly condemnation suit, which brings a court decree settling all matters of ownership.

FREAR GIVES HILO HIS REASONS

THE TURNING DOWN OF THE \$20,000 APPROPRIATION FOR HILO WHARF.

HILO, September 12.—On Monday morning last, the Herald sent a wireless message to the Governor asking regarding the Hilo wharf appropriation, to which the following reply was received by the Kinau yesterday.

Dear Sir: Replying to your wireless of this date, "Kindly mail Herald Kinau reasons influencing against Hilo wharf construction," I have to say that there were many reasons which influenced me in this matter, the statement of which would require more time than I can afford at present, and the statement for publication of some of which would not seem best, for the present at least.

In general, it seemed unwise to spend considerably more than \$20,000 for this purpose when there appeared to be no pressing necessity, and the early construction of the Hilo Breakwater might show that the expenditure, if made at all, might much better be made in some other locality, or under a different method in the present locality of the government wharf. This is all I care to say at present.

MAUNA LOA ACTIVE?

At 6:40 o'clock on Tuesday evening Mauna Loa was reported to be again active. The first word came from E. H. Cabt, manager of the Hawaiian Mahogany Company, who notified G. H. Vicens, that he had seen what appeared to be two distinct outbreaks. This was followed by dense smoke and clouds.

Five minutes later Mr. Bruce Carrwright Jr., from the Volcano House telephoned to Demosthenes Lycurgus, in Hilo, that he had also seen fire from Mauna Loa. The light, as seen from the Volcano House, was soon obscured by smoke and clouds.

At Kau there were no indications of any activity.

A report at 6 o'clock last evening says there was a severe electric storm on Tuesday between Mauna Loa and Mauna Kea, with black thunderclouds. This may have been mistaken for the fire and smoke.—Hawaii Herald.

BIG DEAL IN WATER

HAMAKUA DITCH COMPANY CONTRACTS TO SUPPLY TEN MILLION GALLONS DAILY.

Four lengthy articles of agreement were filed in the Bureau of Conveyances this morning by which the Hamakua Ditch Co., Ltd., contracts with the Honouaa Sugar Company and the Pacific Sugar Mill, for furnishing not less than ten millions gallons of water daily for a period of thirty years to the plantations of the sugar companies.

The leases are to pay \$3,500 for each 365 millions of gallons furnished, and they are entitled to use several times the minimum of water the contracts call for.

The contract provides for a portion of the water to be delivered within twenty months after the work on the Hamakua lower ditch is begun, and all within 16 months after the first delivery.

There are many conditions regarding rights of way, etc. and the right to sub contracting water.
